City Dads Deny Use Of Tape Recorder In Local Meetings

The local City Council denied Publisher, Ross Middleton of the News-Sun, the right to use a tape recorder in a City meeting Monday night at the City Hall. An appointed spokesman, Wendell Clayton, said the group had discussed Middleton's use of a tape recorder at the city meetings and had gone so far as to seek advice from a Littlefield Attorney, as to whether they could legally deny him the right to use a recorder in city meetings if they wished to. He further stated that the council was in agreement with the denial of its use.

Middleton was allowed to set in on the meeting, but without the use of the recorder.

After informing Middleton of their decision the group went on record denying anyone the use of tape recorders at the City meetings. Alderman Richard Stockstill made the motion which was seconded by Donald Runyon and was passed unanimously.

Howard Kenyon, bond consultant, associated with the Texas Municipal Bond Company of Lubbock, was present and presented the facets involved in a re-fund of city bonds.

Following his short Review, Chesney made a motion that the group enter into contract with the Texas Municipal bond company for a study of the city bonds. Parish seconded the motion which passed.

A motion was made by Runyon and seconded by Clayton to give permission to Ben Zemen to Conduct a Driver's school in Earth. The purpose of the school would be to teach Spanish-American workers the rules and Regulations for Driving in Texas. Four voted for the motion and Stockstill opposed it.

City Water Superintendent, Sammy McGuire asked if city officials planned to stick to the ordinance on plumbing inspection without any exception to the rule. The group voted unanimously to abide by the ordinance without exception.

City Marshal, Troy Coon met with the group and asked for a salary raise. The motion was made by Runyon and seconded by Parish to give Coon a raise. He was given a Twenty Dollar per month raise.

The group voted to purchase 10 meter boxes and 12 sewer

saddles for use in the sanitation Department. And voted to secure the aid of Hershal Hulsey for a couple to assist Sammy McGuire in patching holes in the paving over town.

The City Dads voted unanimously to allow a table to be set up in the City Hall for the purpose of collecting funds for the Red Cross drive.

Only one bid was submitted for the job of painting the interior of the city hall. This bid was submitted by the G and C Builders Supply of Earth in the amount

of \$420.00. The bid was approved by the group.

A lengthy discussion over the installation of a 6 inch sewer line and a 2 inch water line to blocks 10 and 11 in the Taylor Addition resulted in vote of four for laying the line and Stockstill against.

Those present were Mayor Marshall Kelley, and aldermen Wendell Clayton, Dub Chesney, Donald Runyon, Richard Stockstill and Eldon Parish. Also City Secretary Ruby Anderson, Troy Coon, Sammy McGuire and Ross Middleton.

Comprehensive Plans For Earth Explained By Planning Consultant

Approximately 20 people were present Monday night at 8 p. m.

to hear Ken Larsen of the Kenneth W. Larsen Associates, planning consultants, of Albuquerque, explain the proposed scope of services of a comprehensive plan for Earth, which the City Council had invited Larsen to explain to Earth residents.

Larsen opened the meeting by explaining what the comprehensive plan for Earth would include and showed slides of other cities using the plan and the various improvements made.

He said Earth's plan would include maps, surveys, studies and reports of the historical development, characteristics, environment, economy and population also land use survey, neighborhood analysis, thoroughfares, transportation, central Business District study and report.

He also explained the study of water, sewer and drainage survey which would include a general plan and maps to indicate the improvements and extensions to the sewage system to meet existing and forecasted needs for 1986 with a listing of the recommended projects. The plan covers a 20 year span.

The plan would also include a recommendation for the situation of a city park.

A thorough survey and analysis of public buildings and homes in the plan, also a zoning ordinance will be drawn up and ready for passage by the Council.

The comprehensive plan would also show ways in which a city

could participate in the Federal Urban Renewal Plan.

The estimated total project cost for the comprehensive plan for Earth, which would include the survey, maps, studies and reports is estimated at \$11,820 plus additional \$1,666,788 if a planning consultant is provided to meet with the city council or planning commission for a period of one year following the completion of the comprehensive plan.

The balance of the cost of the survey is expected to be financed through a Federal Grant in accordance with the planning assistance program provided for by the Federal Housing Act, if the city accepts this project.

Sewage Contract Let

According to Floyd Crawford, Springlake mayor, the Sewage contract was let last week.

He reported that most of the material has already been gathered, and construction should begin in a few days, if the weather permits.

Orville Drake and Luther Vaughn are the contractors, and will do the construction themselves.

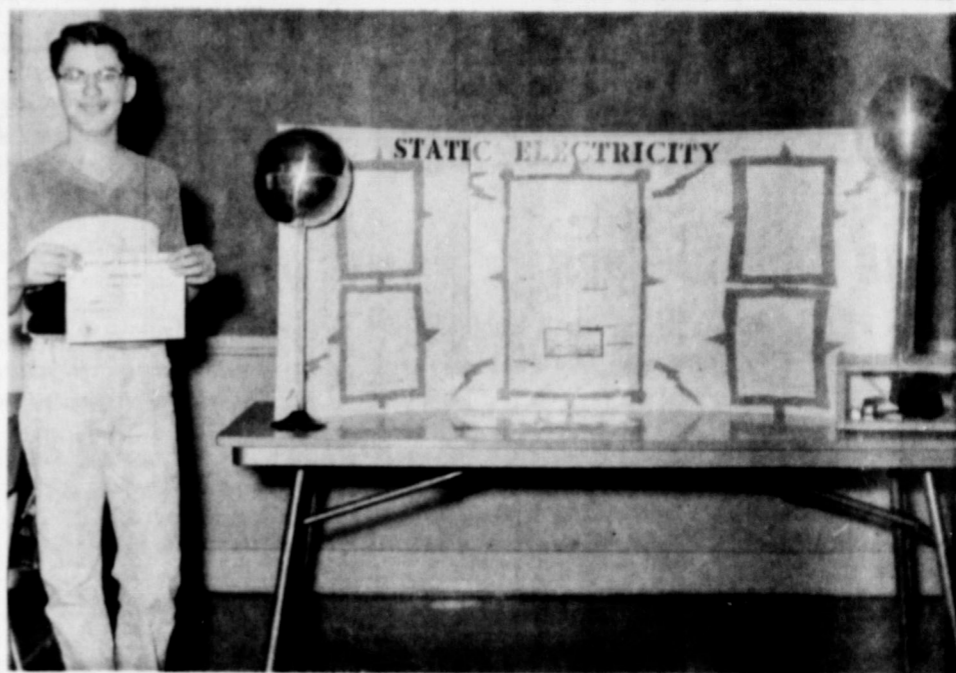
Crawford stated, "I don't know how long the sewage system will take for completion, but it shouldn't be too long. However, we may be delayed in getting the disposal plant."

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EDITORIAL---

The Door Is Open, Or The Door Is Closed

What makes good reporters so hard-nosed about open meetings?

Few sights are more distressing to public officials than the reporter who comes into a public meeting, takes out pad and pencil, and takes voluminous notes -- particularly notes about "controversial" matters. If the discussion gets particularly hot and heavy, the chairman may exercise a great deal of ingenuity and force to terminate the discussion.

He may say, "We want this off the record." The reporter, if he is a good one and has been properly trained, will then stand up and remind the chairman that there is no magic spigot which -- during a public meeting -- can turn public information off and on. He may say that his newspaper doesn't recognize the validity of the phrase "off the record" when uttered by officials at public meetings.

The chairman may decide to "go into executive session." Again, the cantankerous reporter will rise to object, reminding the chairman that an executive session cannot be regarded as a haven of safety for any and all controversial discussion and that he intends to sit in on the meeting to use his own good judgment about printing what goes on.

The inventive chairman may move for a "study session," "brainstorming session," or a "committee of the whole" to consider the matter later, in private. The tax-paid attorney may even come up with a legal opinion that such committee meetings are not technically "public meetings," that no formal action is to be taken, and therefore the press and the public can be excluded. But again, the reporter shows up at the door, declaring that where public business is being discussed, he has a right to be with his pad and pencil.

There's no doubt about it: Newspapers cause problems for public officials. It's been that way every since the English newspaper publisher, John Wilkes, in 1771 won his battle for the right of printers to carry full proceedings of the House of Com-

mons. It was cantankerous printers in the Colonies, such as Benjamin Harris and James Franklin, who went ahead and printed the truth, insisting that they had a right to do this without previous "clearing" by government censors. Indeed, the American Revolution was largely brought about by talented and outspoken printers and pamphleteers.

Where does the cantankerous reporter get the idea he has a right to cover public meetings.

It comes straight out of the First Amendment to the U. S. Constitution, guaranteeing a free press, and from the essential nature of our political system. In many states, it also comes from "open meeting" and "open record" statutes, although some newspapermen regard such statutes as unnecessary because of the First Amendment's guarantee of free speech and press. It also comes from our common law -- the body of unwritten traditions which form the well-spring for our written laws. Editors know that the easiest way -- at least on the local level -- to open up "secret" meetings is simply to report that secret meetings occurred, perhaps with appropriate editorial comment.

729 Countians Register During Registration Period

As the deadline for the free voter registration came to an end Thursday night, 729 countians had registered to vote during the fifteen day period.

Herbert Dunn, Lamb County tax assessor/collector reported that 175 persons registered at his office during the last two days of the 15 day period to bring the number registering at his office to 450 for the entire time. Dunn said that 31 registered at his office Thursday night between 5 p.m. and when he closed the office around 10 p.m.

In addition to those registering at the County Tax Office, another 279 residents registered at the city halls throughout the county with 100 at the Olton city hall, 96 at Earth, 42 registering at the Sudan city hall, and 41 at the city hall in Amherst.

Dunn stated that the 729 figure was higher than expected as it was originally estimated that between 500 and 600 Lamb residents would take advantage of the free voter registration period.

The 729 brought the total of

registered voters in Lamb County up to 4,963 as 4,156 residents had paid their poll tax and an additional 78 had applied for exemptions upon reaching 21.

Dunn said this will mean that well over 5,000 Lamb County residents will be eligible to vote in the upcoming elections as the 4,963 figure does not include all those persons 60 years of age or older who are not required to either pay a poll tax or to register during the recent voter registration period.

Dunn said that his office had sent in the final report on the voter registration to the Attorney General's office last Friday.

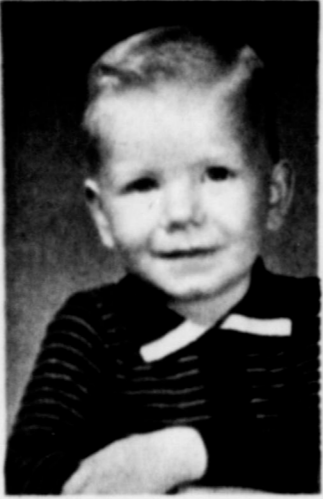

The following designated area being excluded: the same being and is a tract of land, approximately ten (10) acres out of Section 67, Block 2, North Parish Addition, known as "The Earth Rodeo Grounds" and the FFA Stock Barn.

Section 2: Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or shall fail to comply therewith or with any of the requirements thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be liable to a fine, and upon conviction of any such violation shall be fined in any sum of not more than \$200.00; and each day any such violation shall be permitted to exist shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

Section 3: The Ordinance rule requiring the reading of an ordinance on three separate days be and the same is hereby suspended and this Ordinance shall become effective as provided by the Charter of the City of

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING NO. 49 PASSED MARCH 6, 1961 BY THE CITY OF EARTH, TEXAS; GOVERNING ALL CONSUMER ELECTRICAL INSTALLATIONS AND PROVIDING FOR LICENSE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF EARTH, TEXAS AS FOLLOWS: That Part 2 of section IV of Ordinance 49 heretofore passed by the City Commission of the City of Earth, Texas on the 6th day of March 1961, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

License fee to be \$25.00 (twenty-five) per year from January 1, to December 31st, with a 30 day grace period for renewing licenses, after first passing one of five written tests to be given before license can be issued. Licenses to install antenna systems only, will be \$10.00 (ten) per year, with no written test required.

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING JUNK HEAPS, TRASH HEAPS, COLLECTIONS OF METAL SALVAGE, AUTOMOBILE WRECKING YEARS, AND COLLEC-

TIONS OF SCRAP METAL WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF EARTH, TEXAS, PROVIDING A PENALTY, DECLARING AN EMERGENCY, AND CONTAINING A SAVINGS CLAUSE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE City Council of the City of Earth:

SECTION 1. That for the purpose of promoting health, safety and morals and the general welfare of the community, that no junk heaps, trash heaps, collections of metal salvage, automobile wrecking yards, or collections of scrap metal shall be placed or maintained within the city limits of the City of Earth, Texas, except that any existing collections of metal salvage or automobile wrecking yards may continue to be maintained if enclosed by a solid fence of wood, metal, masonry, or other approved building material to a height of not less than six feet above ground level, and the City Council here now declares that it would have passed each and every provision of this ordinance irrespective of any other provision therein.

SECTION 2. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or shall fail to comply therewith or with any of the requirements thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be liable to a fine, and upon conviction of any such violation shall be fined in any sum of not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20.00); and each day any such violation shall be permitted to exist shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 3. The Ordinance rule requiring the reading of an ordinance on three separate

days be and the same is hereby suspended and this Ordinance shall become effective as provided by the Charter of the City of Earth.

QUIRING THE READING OF AN ORDINANCE ON THREE SEPARATE DAYS

SECTION 2: Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or shall fail to comply therewith or with any of the requirements thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be liable to a fine, and upon conviction of any such violation shall be fined in any sum of not

more than \$200.00; and each day any such violation shall be permitted to exist shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 3: The Ordinance rule requiring the reading of an ordinance on three separate days be and the same is hereby suspended and this Ordinance shall become effective as provided by the Charter of the City of Earth.

I wish to announce my candidacy for the office of County School Superintendent of Lamb County. I was born in Lamb County and attended the public schools here. I believe that I am qualified by both experience and education, as I attended McMurry College, Southern Methodist University, Texas Tech College, Cambridge University, West Texas State University, and Southern Methodist School of Law, to fill this office and to bring to it a larger scope of service and guidance to the Schools of Lamb County.

I am for the continuation of the office and the implementing of more and better service to the tax paying citizens of this community. I am convinced that this office can and should be of great benefit to the schools of the county. For every dollar of tax money invested there should be a dollar of benefit to the educational systems of the county. The person elected to this office should work in cooperation with the independent school districts, county, state, and national boards of education.
