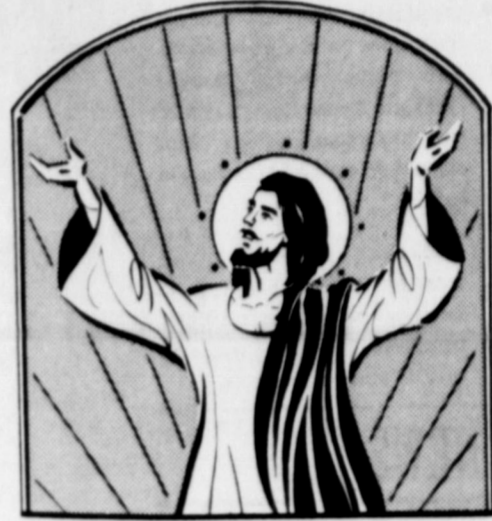

Local Minor League Goes To State

The local Springlake-Earth Minor League All-Stars team won Regional Championship of the Anton Region in a tournament April 8-9-10 played at Anton. The team is coached by Bob Belew and Norman Clayton.

The local hustling team will play in the State Tournament at Levelland, April 14-15-16. The S-E team drew a bye for Wednesday. They will play their first game Thursday at 9:00 a. m. The tournament will be played in the Texas Dome at Levelland.

Norman Clayton said his team was a hard playing team with a tremendous desire to win. "They strive to play as a team effort, each one playing in the best interest of the team, no individual ball playing." He said, "Belew and I never depend on any one or two boys, and had several boys who handle the ball well, so we plan different strategy for different games."

This is the first year the Minor team has played in a tournament.

In the Regional tournament at Anton, the local boys drew a bye and didn't play until Friday.

They played Anton Friday. The game was an easy victory for the local team as they were hitting the basket well and had tremendous speed.

They took the lead in the very beginning and never once yielded it to Anton. At the end of the first quarter the score was 11-0.

The game continued with S-E gaining a greater score. At half time the score board read 19-4.

In the third quarter and final quarter, Anton gained points and slimmed down the margin a bit. When the final buzzer sounded the score was 28-17 in Springlake-Earth's favor.

Anton won their game with Snyder and Springlake-Earth were forced to play Anton for the second time. This time for the Championship game. This game was a much harder game.

The game started out with Anton gaining a fast lead. They led most of the time, however,

the lead swapped back and forth and the two teams were tied at half time, according to Clayton.

The game was so tight, either team could have been winner. However, with only 6 seconds left in the game, with the score 19-20 in S-E's favor, an Anton player fowled a local S-E player. The two free shots went through the goal jumping the lead Springlake-Earth 22 and Anton 19, just as the buzzer sounded and the game was over.

That hard played game won the Regional Championship for the local team and gained them eligibility to compete in the State Tournament.

School Board Elects New Officers

The board of Trustees of Springlake-Earth School met Monday in a regular meeting. Votes in the election were canvassed and approved as presented.

New board members were sworn in. Those sworn in were Harlon "Fuzzy" Watson, John Bridges and Donald Clayton.

The board elected new officers for the forthcoming year. They are president, Ray Joe Riley and vice president, John Bridges, Dwane Jones was elected Secretary, with Eddie Haydon named assistant secretary.

Members of the board reviewed the present enrollment figures and found it had climbed. The current enrollment now stands at 783 as compared to 777 last month.

The trustees revised the '75-'76 school calendar. They deleted two days from the present schedule which had 182 school days. Two days had been allowed in case of bad weather. Since the winter was mild, it was unnecessary to turn out school this winter, and the board voted to delete the two days from the calendar. Which in essence means that school will be out May 26, on Wednesday, instead of Friday.

Superintendent Bill Mann said teachers would not be out as

they would have a work day the following day.

A three men committee was appointed to investigate the cost of either purchasing or leasing a pickup for use by the Agriculture Department. The three appointed are John Bridges, Kenny Hamilton and Eddie Haydon.

A discussion on the sale and purchase of electric typewriters was held. The opinion was that additional information was needed before a decision could be made.

The group reviewed the summer Drivers Education program, High School Principal, Bob May will instruct the classes. Classroom instructions will be completed by May 26. Classes will be held each day at the end of the school day. The lab portion of the class will be started after May 26.

Minutes were read and approved and current bills were reviewed and okayed for payment.

Mr. and Mrs. Michael Caudill met with the board for the purpose of discussing a discipline problem.

The board noted with pride that the Literary UIL Contest held at Kress was won by Springlake-Earth, both in High School and in Elementary.

bers of the Board include Dewitt Kelley, Ray Joe Riley, Bob Phelps, Eddie Sam Jones and Bruce Bridges.

Ice cream was served to all who attended.

County Commissioners Discuss Waste Disposal

At the invitation of Judge Ruth Kirby on behalf of the Lamb County Commissioners' Court, representatives from the cities of Littlefield, Earth, Amherst, Sudan and Springlake participated in an informal breakfast meeting on Friday to discuss city and county solid waste disposal problems and requirements under regulations issued by the Texas Department of Health Resources in January, 1976.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss and consider the need for a solid waste study which would examine all of the various alternatives and associated costs for complying with the new regulations so that the most economically feasible method might be chosen.

Mike Lumsden, community development planner for the South Plains Association of Governments, SPAG, met with the group and offered to work with the county and any interested city governments in dealing with the problem. The study would be provided by SPAG at no cost to the county or cities since each government is a member of the association. Also present were Kenneth Plunkett, Texas Department of Health Resources, and Tim Shaunty, Texas A&M Extension Service.

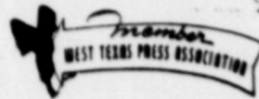
Jack Peel, County Commissioner for Precinct 3, closed the meeting with a promise for continued city-county cooperation on mutual problems.

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Many Offices Contested In May Primary

The office of county judge, tax assessor-collector, sheriff, commissioner precinct 3, justice of peace, and district attorney are all contested races this year.

Ruth Kirby who was appointed Lamb County Judge by the Commissioners' Court in January is opposed on the Democratic ticket by Glenn Batson. Nlah Rodgers is a candidate for tax assessor-collector. Herbert Dunn who has been in this office for 24 years is the incumbent.

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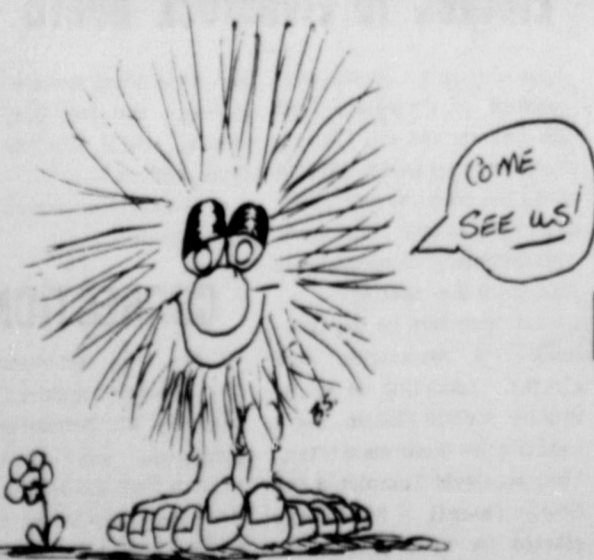

All children who are 7-12 years of age by August 1 are eligible to sign up to play.

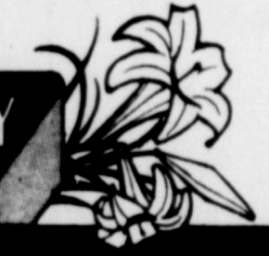

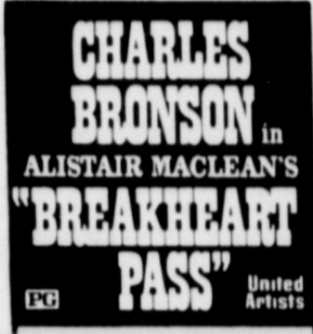

Twin-Seeded Sorghum Going Commercial

The grain sorghum industry is expected to receive another production boost soon with the release of twin-seeded breeding materials by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The materials are going to commercial seed companies, where two to three years will be required to produce enough planting seed for sale to sorghum growers.

Dr. Fred Miller, the Experiment Station's research leader on the project, says the release designated as TPIIR, marks the third major advance in sorghum improvement over the past 35-40 years. First, there were the varieties developed especially for mechanical harvesting, then the hybrids of the 1950's. Now it's twin-seeding.

How much yield increase is expected from this latest advance?

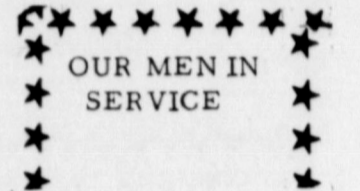
Twin-flowering, which leads

to twin-seeding, would seem to mean a 100 per cent jump in grain output. But Miller says nature is not that cooperative. A 20 per cent yield increase is more realistic.

There are promising possibilities, however. On carefully controlled test plots, Miller and his associates have grown some hybrids that are nearly 100 per cent more productive than single-seeded types. A few first-generation hybrids have performed about 50 per cent better than single-seeders.

TPIIR is the result of four years of research, started by crossing a three-foot combine type with an Ethiopian variety. Further crossing and re-crossing eventually came up with TPIIR. In the process, Miller managed to work in such traits as resistance to disease and greenbugs, good grain quality and lodging resistance.

Government Agencies To Reduce Paperwork Of Small Business

A drive begun more than 18 months ago by the Small Business Administration to lighten the paperwork forced on small business by the Government is beginning to bear fruit, the Regional Director of the Small Business Administration said here today.

Fred S. Neumann, the SBA official, said the Occupational Safety and Health section of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in Wash-

ington had established an SBA staff to work with the small businessman and his problems. Neumann also said an office of Small Business had been set up in the Federal Energy Administration and charged with advising small business on fuel supplies, energy conservation and complaints. In addition, a senior ombudsman has been assigned from SBA to work with the Commission on Federal Paperwork.

The SBA official pointed out that the Washington action is among the first taken to reduce what he called the "enormous clog" of government paperwork that is required of the small businessman.

"These agencies are eager to hear from the small business community on specific paperwork problems," he said.

Neumann pointed out that when the federal regulators planned and set up new occupational safety and environmental regulations they rarely consulted with the small business community to find out how the new rules would affect small business.

"They just didn't consider the impact on the hundreds of small firms in the same industry," he said.

The action taken by the three Washington agencies is the direct result of efforts made by the SBA to induce government agencies to develop a sympathetic view toward small business, Neumann said.

Several other agencies have recently taken positive action to reach small business people. The Federal Energy Administration has set up a staff to advise small business on fuel supplies, energy conservation, airing of small business complaints, suggestions, etc.:

It can be truly said that banking in America was born of the Revolution. For most of the struggle for independence, the lack of money often posed a greater danger than the British armies and navy.

The year 1780 started ominously for the colonies. To fight the war, the country had almost exhausted its resources and finances through lotteries and loans, and Congress found that its paper money was virtually worthless.

A group of Philadelphia citizens decided to undertake a salvaging action, and on June 8, 1780 they founded the Bank of Philadelphia. While the bank began rather modestly, the same group initiated a larger subscription for 300,000 Pounds (the Colonies still were using Pounds, instead of dollars; that would come later) after the fall of Charleston to the British.

Its money bought beef, flour, pork, salt, sugar, rum and other supplies for the Continental army. By the time the bank wound up its business in late 1784, it had provided the army with some one million rations.

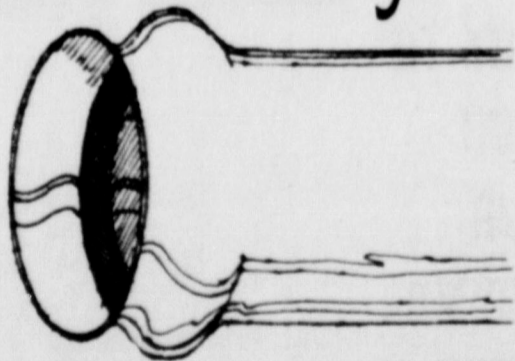

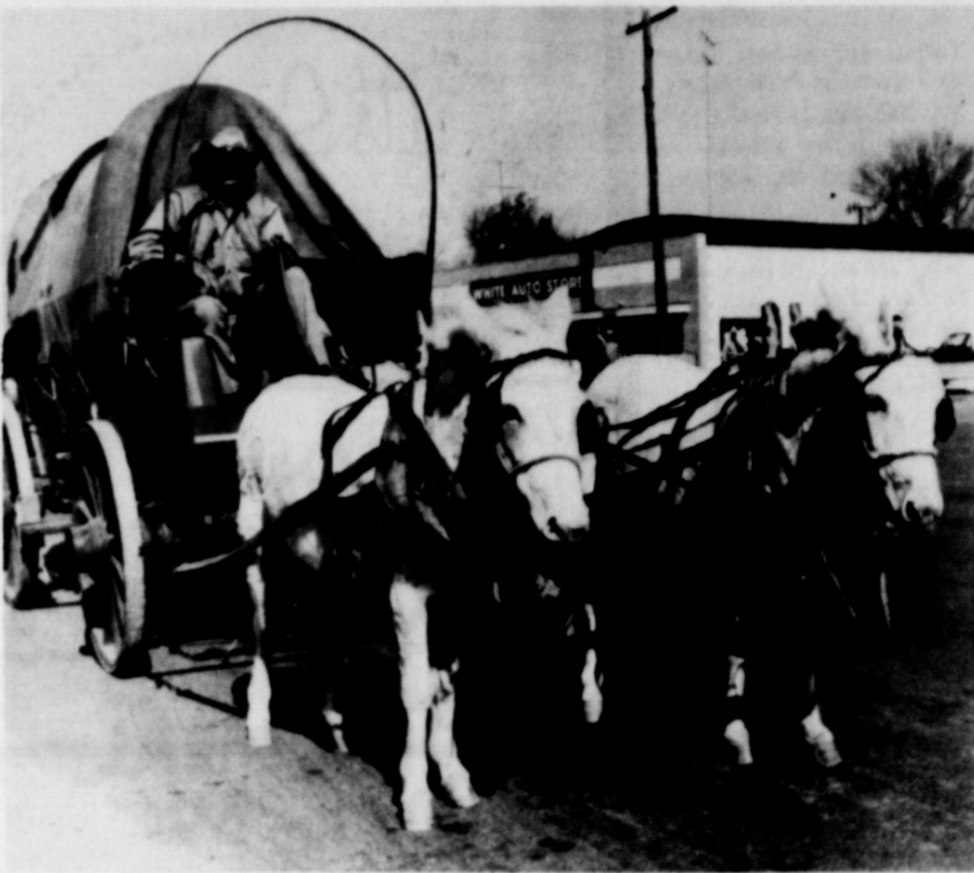

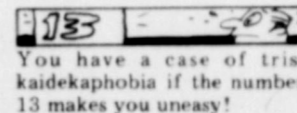

Homeless Pets Pay - With Lives

More than 13 million dogs and cats were destroyed last year at animal shelters in the United States because nobody wanted them.

And you can add another five million to that figure to take into account those strays that are never caught and meet their death by starvation, disease or under the wheels of a vehicle.

What's the solution to this tragedy? "Pet owners are chiefly to blame," contends Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "They let their pets stray so they often become lost. But the worst part is that pet owners take no precaution against accidental breeding of their animals."

To avoid accidental breeding, owners should either keep their animals confined or should have them neutered, advises the Texas A&M University System veterinarian. Special attention should be given to spaying female pets.

"Spaying is a surgical operation performed by a veterinarian that takes away the female's ability to reproduce," points out Armstrong. "Unfortunately, the average pet owner is often unwilling to spend the time and money necessary to have this operation performed."

An alternative to the spaying operation may exist in a birth control pill that is now being developed.

Life stuffed out in a tangled mess under the wheels of a car. Or starving animals wandering along roadsides frantically looking for something to eat. Or the 13 million dead animals hauled out of animal shelters each year.

"Pets need love and affection and they belong in a good home. Unless owners take the responsibility to keep their pets from straying and breeding accidentally, the grim statistics will continue to grow," emphasizes Armstrong.
