"These agencies are eager to work problems," he said, Neumann pointed out that

when the federal regulators planned and set up new occupational safety and environmental regulations they rarely consulted with the small business community to find out how the new rules would affect small business.

"They just didn't consider the impact on the hundreds of small firms in the same industry, "he said.

The action taken by the three Washington agencies is the direct result of efforts made by the SBA to induce government agencies to develop a sympathetic view toward small business, Neumann said.


