NASA Space Program At SEHS

Springlake-Earth School will host the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's mobile lecture-demonstration program at 10 a.m., December 15, 1972.

Representing the Manned Spacecraft Center, Houston, Texas, the program will be conducted by Nelson J. Ehrlich. A member of the Oklahoma State University faculty, he has served as a Space Science Specialist for two years, in addition to seven years as a science teacher in public schools.

Mr. Ehrlich received his Master of Science degree, and has completed his course work toward a Ph.D. at Oklahoma State University.

The NASA Space Science Education Project or "Space-Mobile," as it has commonly become known during the past nine years, is a national program which is taken directly to students in their schools. Transported in a conventional panel truck, many scale models of launch vehicles, spacecrafts, satellites, electronic equipment, audiovisuals, and other equipment items are used for realistic and understandable demonstrations of many scientific principles and concepts involved in space exploration.

Last year, 7,520 programs were arranged and presented to an audience of more than two million students. Programs are supported regionally from various NASA centers. With four of the mobile units, the Manned Spacecraft Center conducts programs in an 8-state region of 870,000 square miles or about one-fourth of the land of the United States. It includes the states of Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, South Dako-

ta, North Dakota, Colorado, and New Mexico. Scheduling of the schools within each state is normally handled by the State Department of Education.

A typical program lasts for about one hour and is presented in the school auditorium to an assembly of several hundred students. Discussions and demonstrations include aeronautical research, propulsion, orbits, probes, space communications, human factors, and manned space flight. Other topics include SKYLAB, NASA's next program to build and fly a prototype space station as an orbital workshop and laboratory for scientific experiments and work, and the Space Shuttle, a reusable spacecraft with landing capabilities much like a conventional spacecraft.

Following the auditorium program, the lecturer is available for classroom visits for further in-depth discussions of space topics directly related to specific disciplines or to the special interests of the students.

The high school band will be having several fund raising projects between now and April to help pay for the expense of this trip.

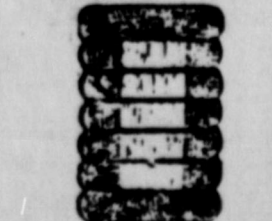

'Brown Recluse' Spider Bites Farmer Resident Council Meets

A Brown Recluse spider has been identified by a Littlefield doctor as the species which bit Mrs. Wayne Moore Friday morning, Nov. 18 as she carried a trashcan to the alley to deposit it in a barrel.

Mrs. Moore is the former Glenda Williamson of Earth.

Mrs. Moore said she remembered feeling a sting "something like a mosquito bite," but she didn't think much about it until about five hours later when she became nauseated and dizzy and felt pain in her arm.

Upon inspection of her arm, she noticed a big black knot between her elbow and shoulder. She was immediately taken to Littlefield where she was hospitalized.

Mrs. Moore said her arm turned black from the top of her shoulder to her elbow, due to the poison breaking down the blood cells. Another poison pocket broke open Monday she said and she was told that she probably would have two open sores.

Informed by her doctor that she was "lucky to be alive" she was also told that if she had come sooner that she would not have been so sick.

"They really do make you sick, too. My head hurt, my arm hurt, I just hurt all over and was sick at my stomach. It affects your muscles too."

Mrs. Moore was hospitalized until Wednesday, Nov. 22.

The Brown Recluse is a relatively new comer to this area, with only rumors last year of some being spotted in the area.

But, definite identification was made of a spider that was killed in the Moore home, so the Brown Recluse is most certainly in the area.

Caution should be used when working outside and every resident should be on the lookout for the little brown spider about the size of a quarter that has a body shaped like a fiddle. He

Furniture Polishes Must Have Childproof Containers

The typical American home is a potential death trap for the unsuspecting child and the unwary adult. According to the Public Health Service, each year 500,000 children swallow a poisonous household product which has been left within their reach, and 500 die.

A recent move by the Food and Drug Administration is a step in the right direction to overcome this hazard. Manufacturers of certain liquid furniture polishes now have to package their products in childproof containers.

The regulation covers liquid furniture polishes that contain at least 10 per cent mineral seal oil, which is a crude form of mineral oil used to put a shine on furniture. When swallowed by children such polishes can cause lung diseases.

Furniture polish packages must pass two tests under the new regulations. First, a sample of children under five years old must not be able to open the package 85 per cent of the time, but a panel of adults must be able to open it 90 per cent of the time. The second test stipulates that the opening of the container must restrict the flow of polish so that only about a half teaspoon can be obtained from one shake or squeeze of the opened container.

The FDA is moving to require childproof containers as these are toxic products containing turpentine or petroleum distillates, methyl alcohol and sulfuric acid. Common household substances that would be affected include paint thinners, solvents, auto gasoline antifreeze and certain liquid drain cleaners. These toxic or caustic products, if accidentally consumed can cause serious injury or death. Severe damage to throat and stomach, permanent blindness, and lung disease often result. Some are dangerously caustic if merely dropped on the skin. The warning labels now attached to these products aren't very effective in alerting inquisitive toddlers and pre-schoolers. Also, the appearance, color, and sometimes masked fragrance can trap a child into a fatal error.

The new FDA ruling in regard to furniture polish containers and others they may pose will reduce the danger to the consumer—but only the consumer himself can eliminate hazards. When you use toxic products, read the directions and warning statements carefully before each use—don't rely on your memory. Use only as directed, as experimenting can be dangerous. If you must transfer the contents into a new container, label it clearly; never put poisons in food or beverage containers. It's a good idea to destroy empty containers and not leave them around for children or pets to discover. Children are experts at finding household hazards, so store them out of their reach and keep all poisons under lock and key.

Bill Clayton of Spring- Wednesday was elected of Directors and mem- ber of the Interstate Conference on Water Problems. The conclusion of its three- day session in Austin, Texas, was a longtime mem- ber of the Texas Legislature. Clayton has authority on state and federal water problems, serv- ing as chairman of the Con- ference, an organization com- posed of state and federal water administrators and legislators throughout the nation.

Clayton and federal officials of the Conference open their sessions Thursday and Friday. The sessions Friday will be devoted to the chair- man's report to the Conference and to become an effective water program before the Congress by presenting congressional committees and by lending their expertise to congressional members.

The 50 states have a great amount of knowledge and data concerning their water resources and have a familiarity with their water problems that is translating to the Con- ference," said Clayton. "Through organization, we can effectively believe, serve our state and the nation as a whole in presenting our views on water, land use and related subjects."

Clayton said the Conference will hold a series of seminars early next year in Washington, D.C. Members of the Senate, House, and congressional staffs.

Boll Weevil Eradication Steps Depicted In New Producers Film

RALEIGH--A new Cotton Incorporated color film on the pilot boll weevil eradication experiment is ready for showing to producers.

The 20-minute documentary was given its premiere showing here Dec. 1 at a special "cotton momentum" meeting of cotton industry leaders and USDA officials with the directors and staff of Cotton Incorporated, the research, sales and marketing company sponsored by growers through their dollar-per-bale program.

Fred Abel, Cotton Incorporated's manager of research implementation, said the film shows how all the various control techniques were applied and how cooperating agencies coordinated complex plans to handle the many facets of the experiment.

The film, produced in cooperation with USDA and the state of Mississippi, tells the story of the eradication experiment from inception through the completion of the first year's cycle.

The two-year experiment, covering some 23,000 cotton acres centered around Prentiss, Miss., will end next summer.

D. George A. Slater, Cotton Incorporated's manager of entomology research, introduced the first public screening of the film and pointed out that it also spells out ways for producers to increase profits by using new money-saving weevil control measures.

Slater appears in the film to emphasize Cotton Incorporated's recommendations for producer use of diapause control measures, pheromone (sex) trap and trap crop techniques developed in the eradication experiment.

Abel said booking of the film for showing to producer groups will begin immediately, without charge, on a first-come, first-served basis.

New Textbooks Approved

New textbooks in 18 subjects were approved by State Board of Education for use in classrooms next September. Sample copies of the books will go to all school districts beginning December 1, and local textbook committees will recommend selections to local school boards from the state adoption list.

The \$18.6 million adoption includes, for the first time, material for state-supported kindergartens. Other subject areas include reading in grades four, five and six; fifth grade history; American history and civil government, eighth grade high school world geography studies; American history; civil government; economics; trigonometry; homemaking; business education; typewriting; health education; graphic arts trades; French and German, all for high schools.

New books will be adopted for four- or five-year periods. Total textbook bill for 1973-74 will be about \$26 million, including new copies of books already approved.
