





### A Brown Recluse spider has

been identified by a Littlefield doctor as the species which bit Mrs. Wayne Moore Friday morning, Nov. 18 as she carried a trashcan to the alley to deposit it in a barrel.

Mrs. Moore is the former Glenda Williamson of Earth. Mrs. Moore said she remembered feeling a sting "something like a mosquite bite," but she didn't think much about it until about five hours later when she became nause ated and dizzy and felt pain in her arm.

Upon inspection of her arm. she noticed a big plack knot between her elbow and shoulder. She was immediately taken to Littlefield where she was hospitalized.

Mrs. Moore said her arm turned black from the top of her shoulder to her elbow, due to the poison breaking down the blood cells. Another poison pocket broke open Monday she said and she was told that she probably would have two open sores.

Informed by her doctor that she was "lucky to be alive" she was also told that if she had come sooner that she would not have been so sick.

"They really do make you sick, too. My head hurt, my arm hurt, 1 just hurt all over and was sick at my stemach. It affects your muscles too. Mrs. Moore washospitalized until Wednesday, Nov. 22. The Brown Recluse is a relatively new comer to this area, with only rumors last





## Furniture Polishes Must Have Childproof Containers

A recent move by the Food and Drug Administration is a step in the right direction to overcome this hazard. Manufacturers of certain liquid furniture polishes now have to package their products in

childproof containers. The regulation covers liquid furniture polishes that contain at least 10 per cent mineral seal oil, which is a crude form of mineral oil used to put a shine on furniture. When swallowed by children such polishes can cause lung diseases.

Furniture polish packages must pass two tests under the new regulations. First, a sample of children under five years old must not be able to open the package 85 per cent of the time, but a panel of adults must be able to open it 90 per cent of the time. The second test stipulates that the opening of the container must restrict the flow of polish so that only about a half teaspoon can be obtained from one shake or squeeze of the opened container.

The FDA is moving to require ch ldproof containers as these for toxic products containing turpentine or petroleum distillates, methyl alcohol and sulfuric acid, Common household substances that would be affected include paint thimers, solvents, auto gasoline antifreeze and certain liquid drain cleaners. These toxic or caustic products, if accidentally consumed can cause ser ious injury or death. Severe

## New Textbooks Approved

New textbooks in 18 subjects were approved by State Board of Education for use in classrooms next September. Sample copies of the books will go to all school districts beginning December 1, and local textbook committees will recommend selections to local school boards from the state adoption list.

The \$18.6 milli on adoption includes, for the first time, material for state-supported kindergartens. Other subject areas include reading in grades four. five and six; fifth grade history: American history and civil government, eighth grade; high school world geography studies; American history; civil government; economics; trigonometry; homemaking; business education; typewriting; health education; graphic arts trades; French and German, all for high schools.

New books will be adopted for four-or-five-year periods. Totaltextbook bill for 1973-74 will be about \$26 million, including new copies of books already approved.




