Ronnie Haberer Delivers First Bale of Cotton for Area

The first load of cotton for the 1964 season in the Earth trade area rolled onto the Campbell Cotton Gin lot in the Dodd community at 3:50 P.M. Monday, September 7. It was grown by Ronnie Haberer, who farms two miles west of Dodd.

Early Monday morning, Haberer started harvest crews to gathering cotton. The 1990 pound load of seed cotton was harvested from approximately four acres of a 30 acre field of cotton. It ginned out at 547 pounds, yielded 830 pounds of seed, and tested out at Strict Middling with 31/32" staple.

Haberer, pre-irrigated his land before planting his DeKalb 302 cotton on April 24. He fertilized with 200 pounds of 16-20-0 Amino-Phos per acre.

For the first bale, Haberer received a check in the amount of \$328.00, having been paid a premium price of 59¢ a pound for his cotton, and \$100.00 a ton for the seed. To farther show appreciation for receiving the seasons first bale the able crew ginned his cotton free of charge.

This years first bale of cotton brought in on September 7, in comparison to the past six years can be noted in the following chart giving year, name of cotton grower and date cotton was ginned.

Sandy Sanderson Brings In First Bale To City Gins

Barton Bros. Gin Co., Inc. received the first bale of cotton for gins located within the city limits of Earth, at 7 P.M. on Monday, delivered by Sandy Sanderson, who farms 6 miles west of Earth.

The first bale in the trade area had arrived only 3 hours earlier at the Campbell Cotton Gin in the Dodd community. Both bales were grown from DeKalb 302 seed.

The bale weighed 622 pounds and was ginned from a load of seed cotton weighing 2440 lbs. It had a turn out of 25.44%, and yielded 1020 pounds of seed.

Sanderson started his harvest crews picking about 3 P.M. in waist high cotton. They covered approximately 8 acres to get the load.

Sanderson, pre-watered his

land before planting his DeKalb 302 cotton April 21. He watered it twice since planting and at present it stands waist high. For fertilizing his crop he used 40-40-13 liquid Sol-U-Phos and side dressed with 60 pounds of aqua nitrogen per acre.

Phillips graduated from Lakeview High School in San Angelo then attended college in San Angelo College and Abilene Christian College.

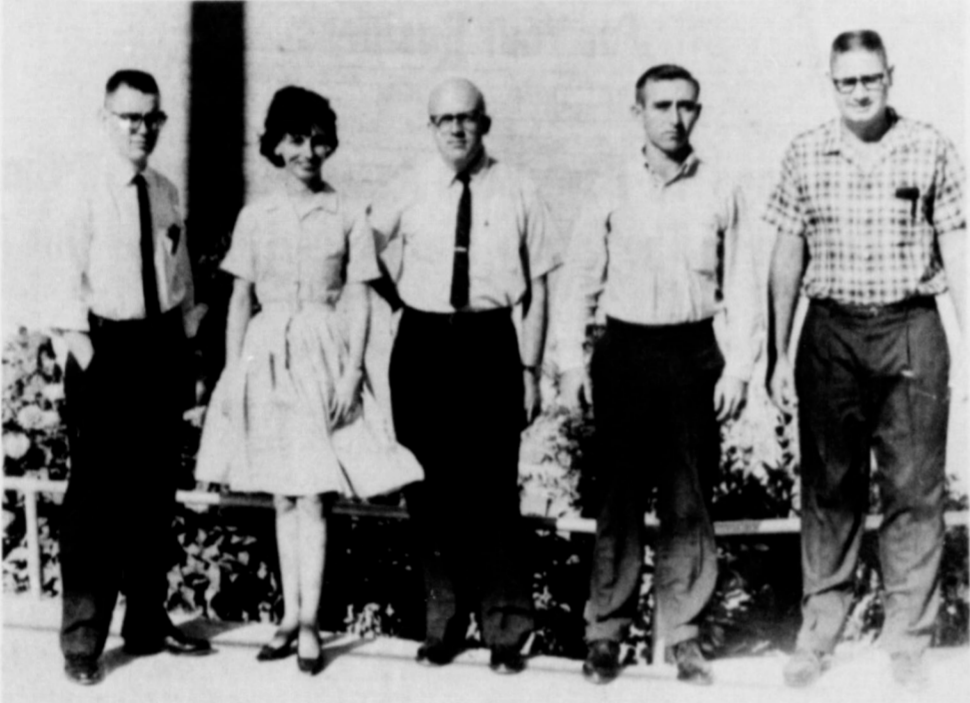
He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. M. R. Phillips, pastor of the Church of Christ of Earth.

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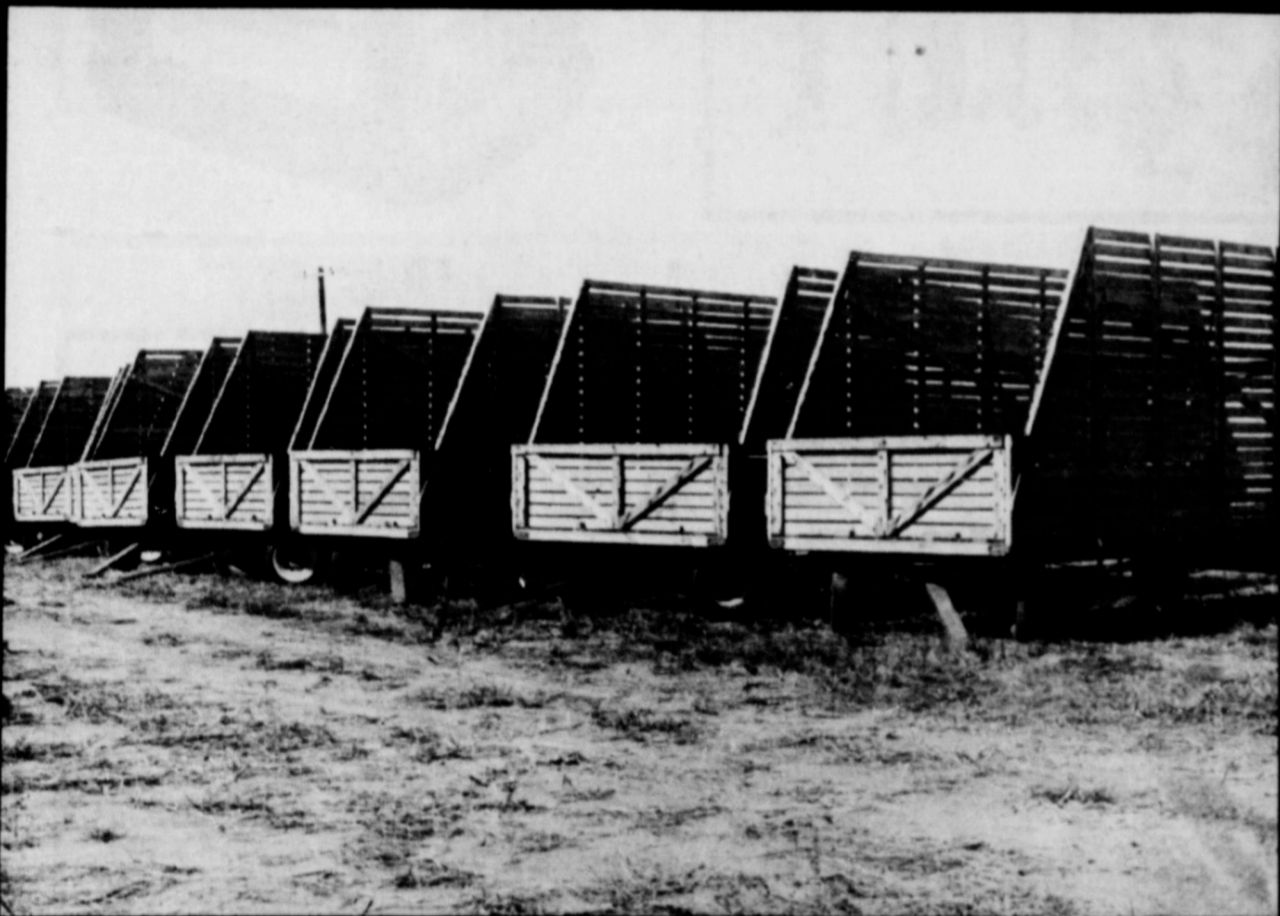

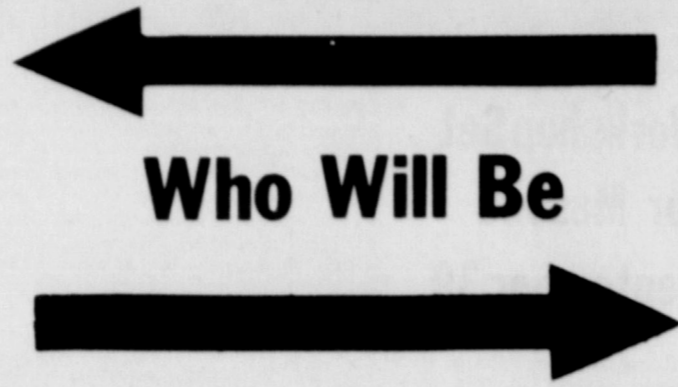

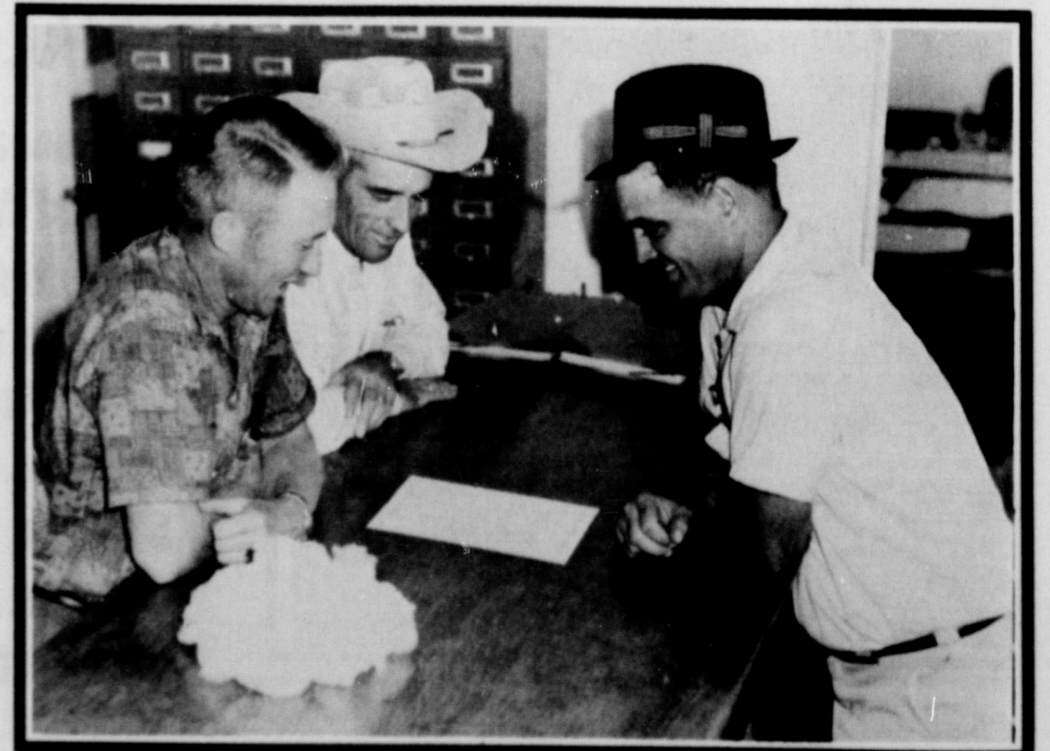

Wolverines Dominate Play-Beating Idalou 22-19

The green and gold team of Springlake played a game Friday night that they can be mighty proud of. From the opening kickoff to the final whistle, the Wolverines used sheer power to down the highly rated Wildcats of Idalou 22-19.

Springlake took the opening kickoff and behind the hard running of Thomas Gregory, Richard Mitchell, Jerry Don Sanders, and Logan Armstrong, whacked their way to the Idalou 16 yard line before being checked on a clipping penalty. A field goal attempt by Sanders was blocked and the Wildcats took over.

The Wolverines, however, were not to be denied. The entire forward wall lashed out with power that held the Wildcats for no gain in three attempts, forcing Idalou to punt. A clipping penalty, on the punt, forced the Wolverines back to their own 20 yard line.

Once more the Wolverines started moving, first through the air and then on the ground. Jerry Don Sanders mixed his plays well, keeping the Wildcats guessing what would come next. In 11 plays the Wolverines scored on the first play of the second quarter. A 32 yard run over left tackle by Richard Mitchell, a 14 yard drive by Gregory, and a 13 yard pass from Jerry Don Sanders to end Floyd Henderson were the big plays that put the Wolverines into scoring position. The pay off came on a pass from Sanders to Thomas Gregory in the end zone. Sanders kicked for the extra point and the Wolverines had a 6-0 lead with 11:52 left in the first half.

The Wolverines were in complete control of the ball during the first half. The Wildcats were held to three first downs and 13 yards rushing, compared to 12 first downs and 151 yards on the ground for the Wolverines. The deepest penetration by the Wildcats was to the Wolverine 26.

The most exciting play of the first half was a beautiful 85 yd. run by Jerry Don Sanders, on a punt by Weems that was rubbed out by a clipping penalty late in the second quarter.

Idalou came to life early in the third quarter and covered 77 yards in three plays on a run by fullback Johnny Wood, who broke into open country and ran 67 yards for Idalou's first touchdown. Chris Weems kicked the extra point and Idalou had a 7-6 lead with 10:43 left in the quarter.

A rapid exchange of fumbles was the next item of activity, then the breaks fell toward the Wolverines late in the third quarter. A blocked field goal attempt by Sanders failed and the Wildcats took over on their 18 yard line. On the first play Wood fumbled and the little center, Bobby Coker recovered the ball on the 16 yard line. From there, the Wolverines tallied in four plays, with Richard Mitchell crashing over from the one yard line. Sanders carried around the end for the extra point and the score was 14-7 with 1:10 left in the third quarter.

Idalou ran into a stubborn forward wall and was forced to punt. Mike Caplinger dropped back to punt, he bobbled the snap and was plowed under on the Wildcat 14 yard line by little Bobby Coker. It took the Wolverines only five plays to move into pay dirt, with Sanders plowing over the right side of the line for the final four yards. Richard Mitchell plunged for the two extra points and it was 22-7 with 9:36 left in the game.

On the kickoff after touchdown, Chris Weems showed the Wolverines the speed that made him one of the most feared open field runners in class A football in 1963. Weems gathered in the kickoff on his 15 and returned the ball down the right side of the field for a touchdown. An attempted pass for the extra point failed and Springlake held a 22-13 lead.

On a series of plays, eating up all the time the Wolverines could, Sanders was forced to punt. The ball rolled dead on the Idalou 21 yard line. The cats were off and running, fighting both the stubborn Wolverine line and the clock. A 44 yard pass and run play from Raymond Ater to Bobby Meador set up the last scoring attempt for the Wildcats. The pay off came from the seven when Ater pitched a pass to Meador in the end zone with 27 seconds left in the game. The pass for two points was no good and Springlake had a 22-19 lead.

As expected, Idalou tried an offside kick, but Richard Mitchell fell on the ball on the Wolverine 40 yard line. Taking no chances, Jerry Don Sanders took the snap from center and fell to the ground, running out the clock.

Richard Mitchell, 185 pound junior fullback led the Wolverines attack with 100 yards in 20 carries, Thomas Gregory, Senior halfback assisted with 77 yards in 18 carries, while Jerry Don Sanders finished with 53 yards in 16 carries and sophomore halfback Logan Armstrong had 18 yards in five carries. Gregory caught 5 of the 9 Springlake pass completions for another 38 yards.

This week the Wolverines will meet another power house, the Seagraves Eagles, who last week won their game 36-0 over the Jim Ned Indians. Let's all trim out and back the Wolverines all the way.

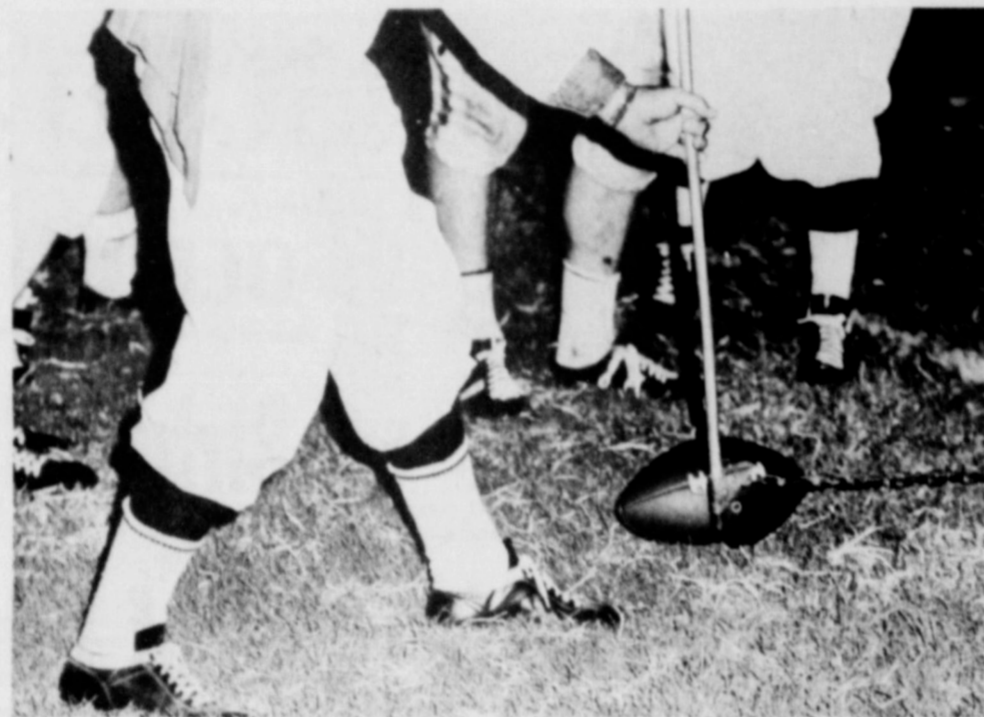

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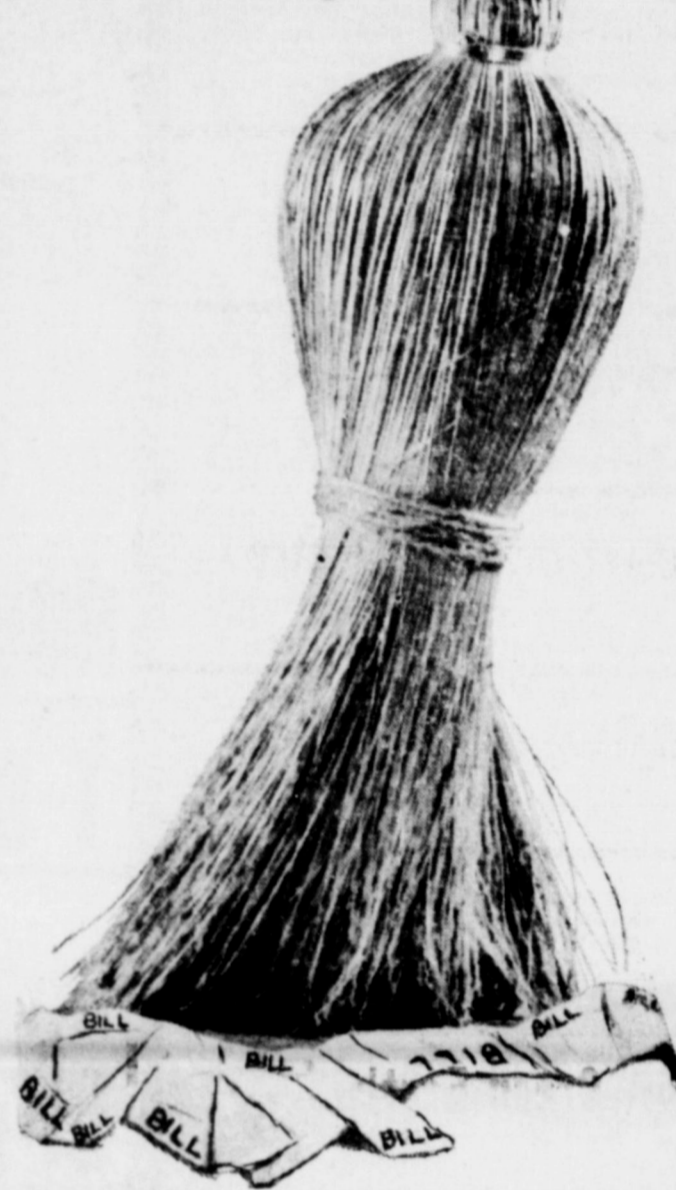

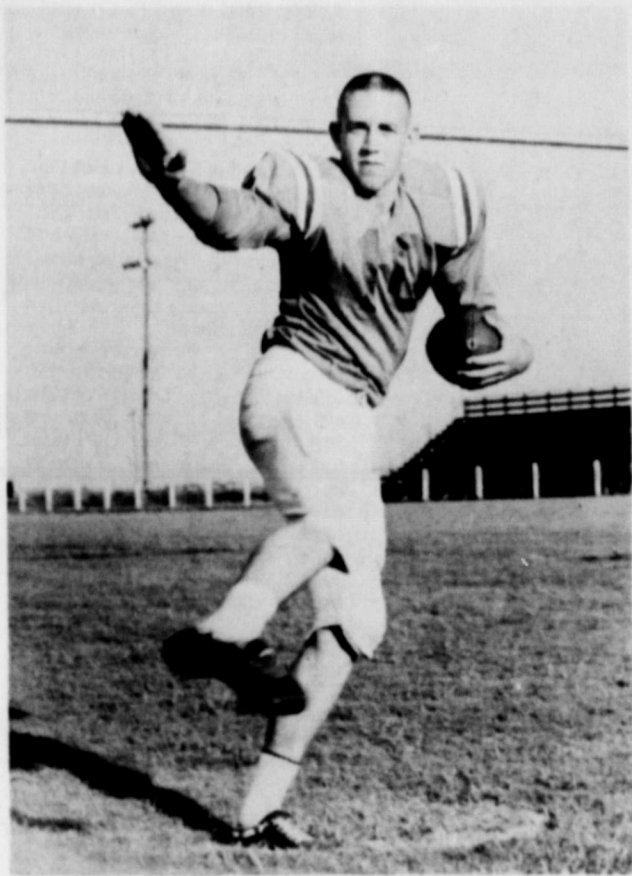
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STARS OF THE WEEK

County Cuts '65 Budget

A session of the county commissioners court held Monday, August 31, resulted in plans for trimming Lamb County expenditures in 1965 approximately \$9,000.

In addition to hearing budget needs for the 1965 budget, the commissioners set Monday, Sept. 14 as date for a public airing of the budget, starting at 2 p.m. in the courthouse.

Very little change is proposed in the new budget which calls for total expenditures of \$738,972--40 as compared to this year's budgeted expenses of \$747,857--95. The proposed total is \$8,885.55 below this year's budget and only about \$2,600 above the 1963 budget.

The county's assessed valuation has been estimated at \$27,521,601, which is practically identical to the one listed for the 1964 budget. The total assessed valuation in Lamb County is based on approximately 25 percent of the true or market value of property assessed.

Continuation of the 95-cent tax levy per \$100 valuation is proposed in the new budget. This is the same tax rate that has been in effect for the past six years.

Budgeted expenditures by the various funds as proposed for the budget are as follows: Jury Fund, \$4,800 (unchanged); Road & Bridge Fund, \$303,200 (unchanged); General Fund, \$116,200 (decrease of \$1,000); Officers Salary Fund, \$162,558.92 (unchanged); Interest & Sinking Fund, \$152,108.90 (decrease of \$3,193.55); and Permanent Improvement Fund, \$104.58 (decrease of \$4,692).

The total net outstanding bond and time warrant debt of Lamb County on Jan. 1, 1964 was \$746,000. It is estimated that on Jan. 1, 1965, the bond indebtedness will be reduced to \$617,000 and that during the 1965 budget year a total of \$30,000 will be paid on principal and \$16,212.50 will be paid on interest.

The commissioners also approved the request from District Attorney Jack Young for the purchase of an electric typewriter and filing cabinet, with the cost shared by Lamb, Palmer and Bailey counties. Lamb County's share will be \$277.36.
