

## Friday Big Day For Springlake Ex's Wolverines Trim Friona 20-6 Farwell Next

### THIRD ANNUAL HOMECOMING STARTS TODAY

The Springlake Wolverines rolled over the Friona Chiefs 20 to 6 on the Chiefs field last Friday night in the next to the last district 3-A game of the season. The Wolverine's attack rolled well in the first quarter, racking up three first downs and a touchdown and extra point, but then sputtered and all but died out while former Springlake coach, Collie Huffman's Chiefs held the Wolverines scoreless until the final quarter and scored a touchdown themselves in the second quarter to leave the field at half time trailing only 7 to 6. No doubt coach Huffman, who led Springlake to district title last year, would have loved to have beaten his former charges, but it was not to be, as the Wolverines finally untracked themselves in the final quarter.

The game opened with Friona fumbling the opening kick off and Jimmy Herring, Springlake fullback, fell on it on Friona's 45 yard line. Springlake could not take advantage of the break and it was not until near the end of the first quarter the Wolverines drove 53 yards over left guard and cut right after getting into the secondary for a nice touchdown run. Joe Ed Wheat kicked the extra point.

In the second quarter Friona took a short punt on Springlake's 32 yard line and drove for their only score of the game. On the opening play of the drive half back Weldon Fairchild raced 22 yards from which point Springlake was penalized for four successive downs for being offside. Finally with the ball on the half yard line Larry Fairchild went over for the touchdown. Had it not been for the penalties the Wolverines would have held for downs. Friona missed the extra point and the half ended with Springlake holding a narrow one point edge.

In the second half Springlake dominated the game completely, allowing the Chiefs to handle the ball only ten downs in the entire half. Late in the third quarter the Wolverines started a 66 yard drive which ended in a touchdown at the beginning of the last quarter. In this drive Jimmy Herring carried the ball nine out of 11 plays and went over from the one for his second score of the night. Joe Ed Wheat again kicked the extra point.

Mid-way in the final quarter Springlake recovered a Friona fumble on the Chiefs 40 and rolled for the final score with Max Goforth passing ten yards to A. C. Lewis for the touchdown. Wheat missed the point and that ended the scoring for the night.

Jimmy Herring was the leading groundgainer of the night, gaining 170 yards in 24 carries for an average of a little over seven yards per carry. Jimmy was again mentioned in the Lubbock and Amarillo papers as one of the outstanding backs of the area for the week.

It was great news to Springlake fans to hear that Farwell beat Sudan last week 20 to 19, and thus gave Springlake still a chance at the district title. If Springlake beats Farwell here on the home field Friday night it will throw the district into a three way tie for first place. The district champ will then be decided by a draw between the three schools. However, if Springlake should lose, Farwell will be the undisputed champ. Sudan and Springlake have only a tie in overall play to mar an otherwise perfect season. Springlake has its job cut out for Friday night.

Let us all be at Springlake field at 8:00 p.m. Friday to root our Wolverines on to victory. This is the one they must win. Let's give them all the encouragement we can by all being there and yelling hard for a victory and still a chance at the district title.

Burial was in the Old Emma Cemetery, south of Ralls under the direction of Rex Funeral Home.

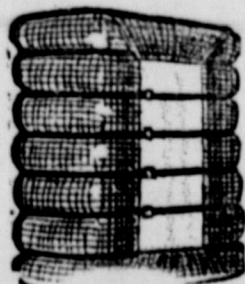
### Fire Destroys 4-Room House

8. In seeking solutions to problems of regional scope, are we making the most effective use of local, state and Federal governmental units? Of regional research and educational institutions?

These, of course are deadline schedules the postmaster pointed out. Postal patrons are being advised that even earlier mailings will be an aid to the postal service, as well as provide an additional measure of insurance of delivery by Christmas.

Armstrong plans to add a garage porch and utility room.

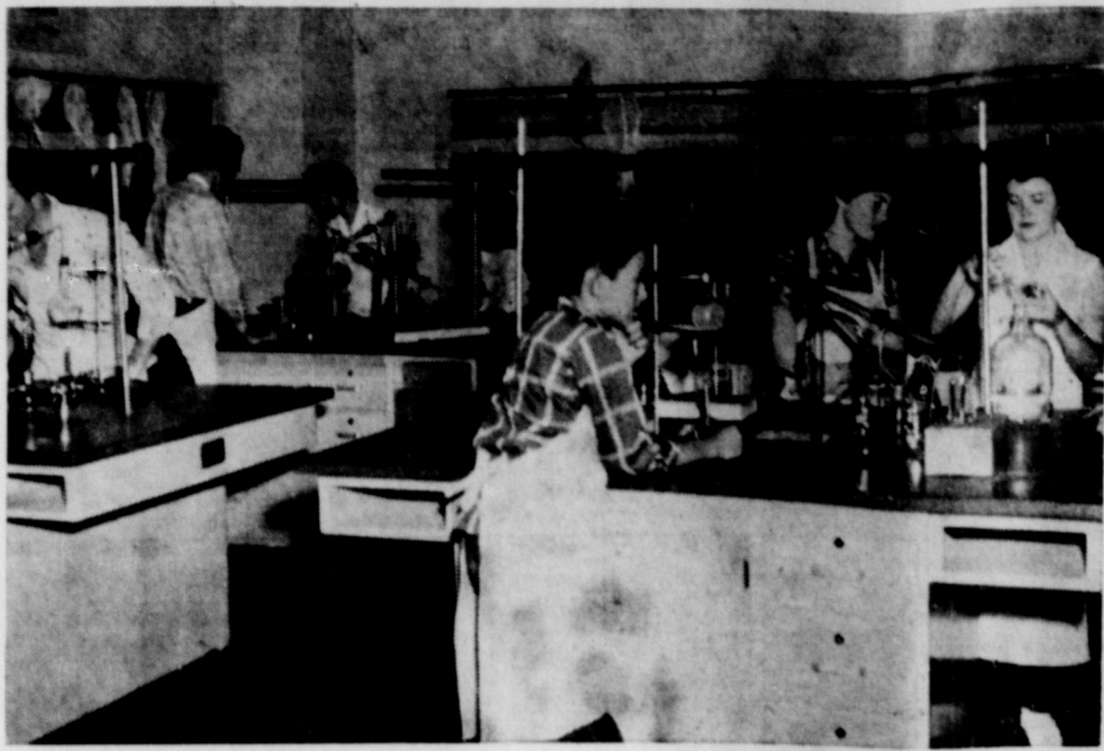
# Science Department Now Has Better Equipment

One major development in the Springlake High School is the Science Department. Until recently there has been very little to encourage a student to enroll in any kind of science, since we had no laboratory.

Science in High School is being stressed in many fields of industry and most colleges require a lab-science for entrance.

During the past two years the Springlake school board has purchased equipment for the science department, including four student laboratory units that will accommodate sixteen students at a time. A demonstration table, a supply of chemicals and apparatus. We now have 93 students enrolled in science courses, compared with 30 to 40 before the installation of the laboratory equipment.

We have made a big step forward and are striving to make a stronger course in the big field of science.

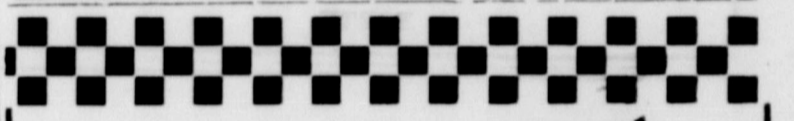

**Check Yourself and Check Accidents**

"Check yourself, and check accidents."

That, in a nutshell, is the advice J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, handed motorists and pedestrians today. Seeking support in the remaining days of TSA's October safety-after-dark program, Musick pointed out that more than 50 per cent of the pedestrian accident happen between 5 and 8 p.m.

"Twilight and darkness intensifies all traffic problems, but it makes conditions especially hazardous for pedestrians and bike riders. It conceals them from drivers and puts the responsibility for their safety directly on their own shoulders," Musick said.

To reduce the odds against them, Musick had these four safety tips for each pedestrian and cyclist:

For walkers: 1. Always walk on the sidewalk when possible. If there is no sidewalk, walk on the left shoulder of the road, facing traffic.

2. In urban areas, always cross at intersections. At night cross at lighted intersection.

3. Remember, pedestrians in dark clothing are difficult for motorists to see. When walking at night it's a good idea to wear light or reflectorized clothing. Better still, carry a flashlight, or something white, or reflectorized.

4. Don't trust your judgement too far in estimating the speed of an approaching car by its headlights. Never cross a street or highway unless you are absolutely certain you have ample time to reach the other side safely.

For cyclists: 1. A good headlight and tail light, or reflector, are essentials for night riding.

2. Make your bicycle still more visible to motorists by trimming it with white or reflectorized material. Wear white or reflectorized clothing.

3. Be alert at all times for holes or ruts in the road. Fallen branches or any object might cause you to loose control of your bicycle.

4. Never 'cut-up' on a bicycle, any more than you would with a shotgun, and never carry passengers.

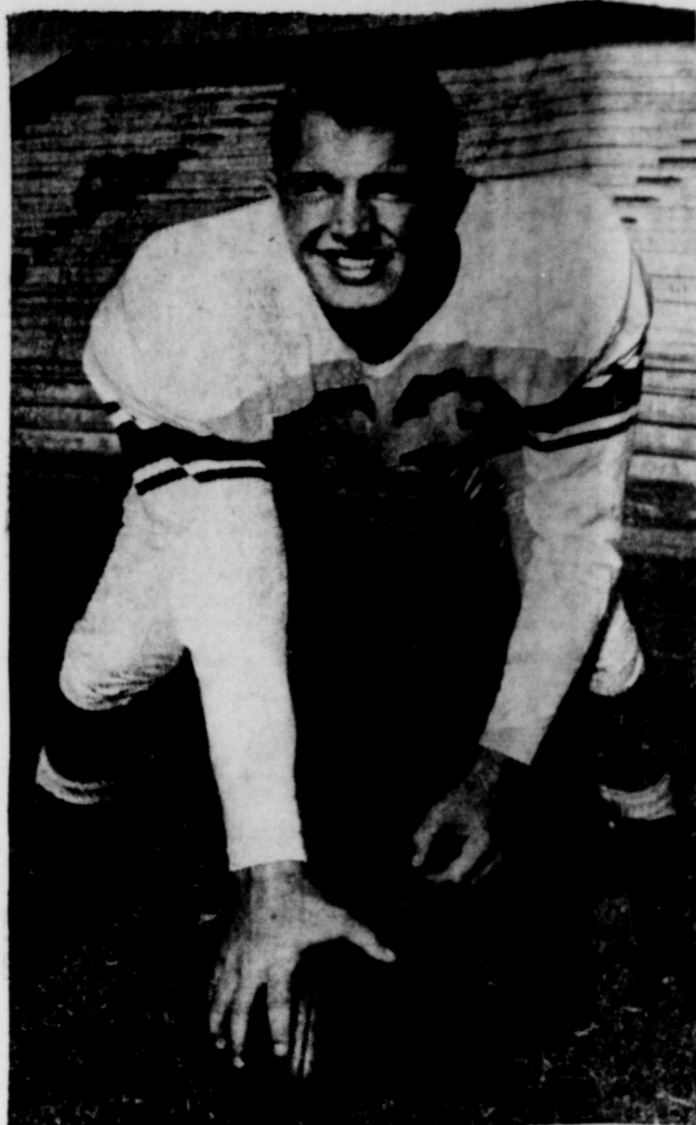

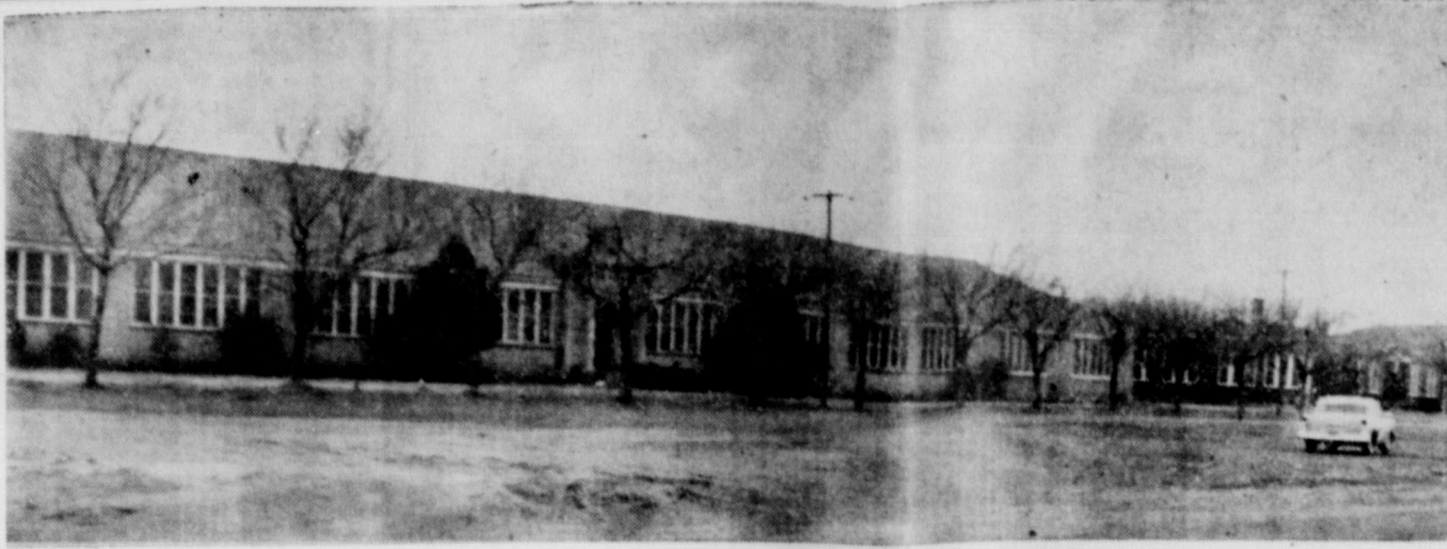
## Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Texas — General Election results, nationally have added new suspense to the already tense issue of who will succeed Texas' Governor-Elect Price Daniel as U. S. Senator.

At stake is whether Democrats or Republicans will control the U. S. Senate, when Congress convenes on January 3.

Democrats now have a precarious 49-46 member advantage. But it would be 48 to 48 if a Republican replaced Democratic Senator Daniel.

GOP Vice President Nixon can vote in case of a tie. Therefore this one vote, which Texas could bestow upon him . . . in a round-about way . . . could determine the balance of power. Most important of all, it could decide which party could organize the Senate and appoint the all-important com-

mittee chairmen.

This possibility puts Gov. Allan Shivers in the national spotlight again, and Senator Daniel.

Texas' conflicting election laws have clouded the issue as to whether Governor Shivers legally can call a special election before January 15. That's when Daniel takes office as governor. This because Daniel's letter of resignation from the Senate specifies January 15 as the effective date of his resignation.

Shivers contends that inasmuch as Daniel did not resign, effective-

Immediately, there is no vacancy until January 15. Daniel argues that Shivers has the power to call an election. Both point to different provisions of the poorly drawn election code.

Unless Congress is in session, a governor cannot make an appointment to fill a vacancy. Therefore, should Senator Daniel resign effective today, Shivers could not name a successor until January 3, opening day of the new Congress.

Shivers feels that Daniel should resign outright, thus paving the way for an immediate election. The governor is required to call an election within 90 days from the effective date of the resignation, and not before 30 days have elapsed. This means that the governor could call for an election in December — or he could designate a January or February date.

Whatever course Daniel pursues Shivers undoubtedly will have a chance to appoint a temporary replacement. First, because Shivers is not likely to call for a December election. Second, if Daniel submits a new resignation before January 2, effective immediately, Shivers automatically can name a successor on January 3. And third, if Daniel sticks to the January 15 date, Shivers will have from 12:01 a.m. on the 15th until Daniel is inaugurated at 12 noon, to name a successor.

**DROUGHT AUTHORITY GIVEN**  
Governor Shivers has been au-

thorized to designate Texas farmers eligible for reduced railroad rates.

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson asked the governors of seven drought-stricken states to designate persons qualifying for this aid.

Railroads have offered free transportation for cattle shipped

from dry areas to western grazing areas. Designated persons also receive a 50 per cent reduction in rates on hay shipped from western states to drought regions.

### SHIVERS BUYS HOME

When Governor Shivers becomes MR. Shivers next January, his family will move from one historic Austin mansion to another.

He has purchased Woodlawn, a 103-year-old residence bought by Governor Elisha M. Pease when Pease retired from office. Seller was R. Niles Graham, grandson of Governor Pease.

Known locally as "The Pease Mansion," the 17-room antebellum home still contains century-old furnishings. Its new owners plan only such remodeling necessary to accommodate their family.

**CONSTRUCTION SPIRALING**  
An all-time record for 1956 with

a healthy boom carrying over into '57 is foreseen for the Texas construction industry.

Awards through October totaled \$1,049,179,948. This was only slightly less than the total for the whole 12 months of 1953, the highest previous year.

October awards of more than \$84,000,000 did not include a Texas Highway Department contract letting. This means the November figure, with two months of road contracts, likely will be large.

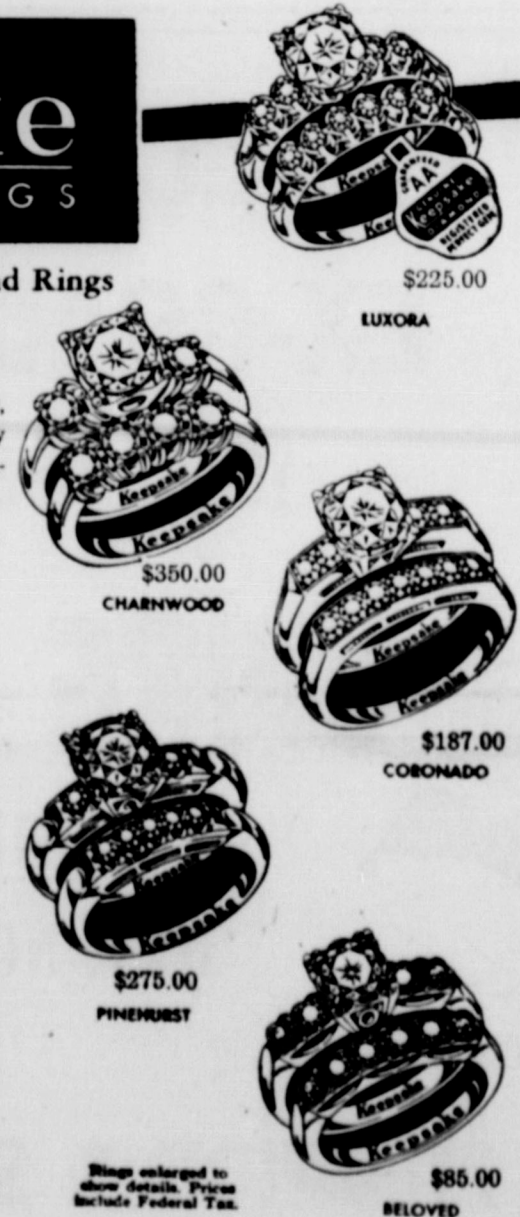

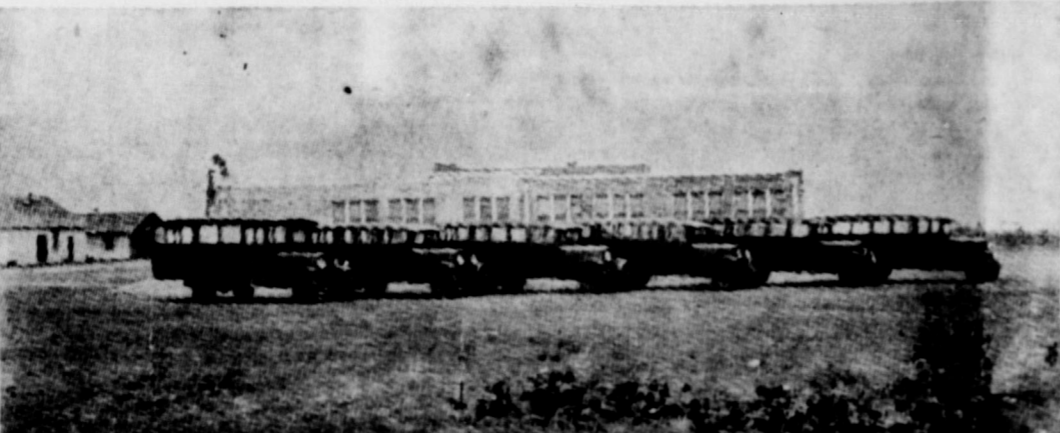

## More Highlights And Sidelights

### FARM INCOME UP

Improved methods have kept Texas' overall farm income up, despite drought setbacks.

Cash income for January through September totaled \$1,108,000,000, an increase of \$12,000,000 from last year, reports the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Average for the dry years of 1951-55 was six per cent above 1947-49.

Irrigation, conservation and improved crop varieties are credit for the increase. Some areas, the bureau noted, have not had a major crop in five years. Offsetting these are such areas as the Panhandle-South plains region where "spectacular results" have been achieved with irrigation.

### BOND ELECTION UPHELD

State Supreme Court has upheld and clarified a new law for unlimited issuance of bonds by school districts.

Validity of some \$75,000,000 in school bonds was affected by a test case from Hamilton County.

Voting in bond elections is limited by the Constitution to property-tax payers. An act for school bond elections passed by the last legislature further restricted voting to those who had rendered property on the county tax roll.

High court ruling removed this restriction but upheld constitutionality of the rest of the law.

### SHORT SNORTS

November 29 has been proclaimed

as Texas' Thanksgiving Day by Governor Shivers. This is in accordance with legislative action setting the last Thursday in November as the state's official holiday. Federally, November 22 will be observed.

Construction of a \$30,000,000 federal dam and reservoir at San Angelo has been approved conditionally by the State Water Board. Law requires recommendation by the governor also before the project can be undertaken by the Department of Interior.

U. S. Department of Agriculture has upped its estimate of Texas 1956 cotton crop to 3,600,000 bales, a 140,000-bale increase over last month's prediction. But the new total is still under last year's crop of 4,029,000 bales.

Dollar value of Texas farm and ranch land increased one per cent during the past year, compared to a three per cent gain for the nation. Average acre value of Texas rural land was estimated by USDA at \$63.13. National average was set at \$88.65.

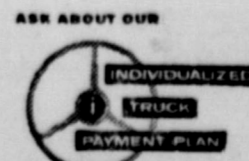

**Pretty Party Parfait**  
 RECIPE OF THE MONTH



By BETTY BARCLAY

Whipped cream, tinted pink and flavored with peppermint, separates the layers of dark chocolate sponge in a party dessert that's beautiful to behold and downright wonderful to eat. The parfait is best when served well chilled which makes it a perfect choice for entertaining because you can prepare it early in the day.

**Chocolate Sponge Parfait**

- 1 envelope (1 tablespoon) gelatin
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 2 squares unsweetened chocolate
- 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 3 egg whites, unbeaten
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup tender-thin flaked coconut
- 1/2 to 3/4 cup chilled whipping cream
- Red coloring
- Peppermint extract

Mix gelatin, 1/3 cup of the sugar, salt, and milk in top of double boiler. Add chocolate. Cook over hot water until chocolate is melted and gelatin is thoroughly dissolved. Blend well

with egg beater. Pour slowly over egg yolks, stirring constantly. Return mixture to double boiler and cook three minutes longer, stirring constantly. Cool, then chill until slightly thickened.

Beat egg whites until foamy throughout. Add remaining 1/3 cup sugar gradually and continue beating until mixture will stand in stiff peaks. Fold in chocolate mixture gradually, blending well. Add vanilla and coconut.

Place cream in small bowl. Add few drops red coloring to tint a delicate pink. Beat with egg beater until fluffy and thick. Then fold in few drops peppermint extract.

Place alternate layers of chocolate mixture and peppermint whipped cream in parfait glasses. Chill just before serving, top with additional whipped cream and crushed red peppermint candies. Makes nine servings.

Another request of the Legislature, this one from Huntsville, will be laid before both houses in Austin, come January. Asked for will be \$82,000 to add three new wings to the Sam Houston Memorial Museum, plus a \$3,000 appropriation increase for maintenance.

**GAS PRICING FORMULA**

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd has filed a "friend of the court" brief in the case of Panhandle Eastern Pipeline Co. vs the City of Detroit. He wants the Supreme Court to review a decision by the court of appeals for the District of Columbia.

Shepperd's complaint is that the appeals court decision compels the FPC to use gas pricing formula that penalizes small producers. "The Federal Government should not have the power to fix Texas natural gas prices," Shepperd contended, "but if they assert that power, then the FPC should determine local prices on a local basis."

**FARMERS AT WORK**

Widespread rains, though generally light, put farmers to work

day and night. It was a chance to get winter crops in before the soil dried out again. But it wasn't soon enough, say agriculture experts, to prevent a hard winter for livestock owners.

"It's pretty late in the year for enough winter grazing to be produced... herds will require heavy supplemental feeding," said a spokesman for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "But with additional moisture, farmers and ranchers can begin their 'come-back' next spring and summer."

Frank A. Driskill is the new administrative assistant to Land Commissioner Earl Rudder. Driskill, a Crockett businessman, succeeded Douglas Weitzel who went to Longview as an investigator in the district attorney's office... Sites will be Dallas, Houston, Corpus Christi, San Antonio, El Paso and Point O'Connor on the Gulf Coast. Air will be tested for sources and types of contamination... State assistance for Austin finances was suggested by a Travis County grand jury last week. It noted that the city furnishes police and fire protection and other governmental services to state institutions and buildings — all except from city taxes... Texas contributions of \$5,000 have been sent to Europe to help feed refugees in Hungary, according to John Gillies, Texas Director of the Chris-

tian Rural Overseas Program... created... Lawrence E. Ledbett, superintendent of the Capitol building and grounds, has retired after 38 years of state service. He was among 17 long-time employees of the Board of Control to retire at the same time. A new policy of that department makes retirement compulsory at the age of 72. Those leaving ranged in age from 70 to 82.

## Texas Research Foundation Land Put in Condition

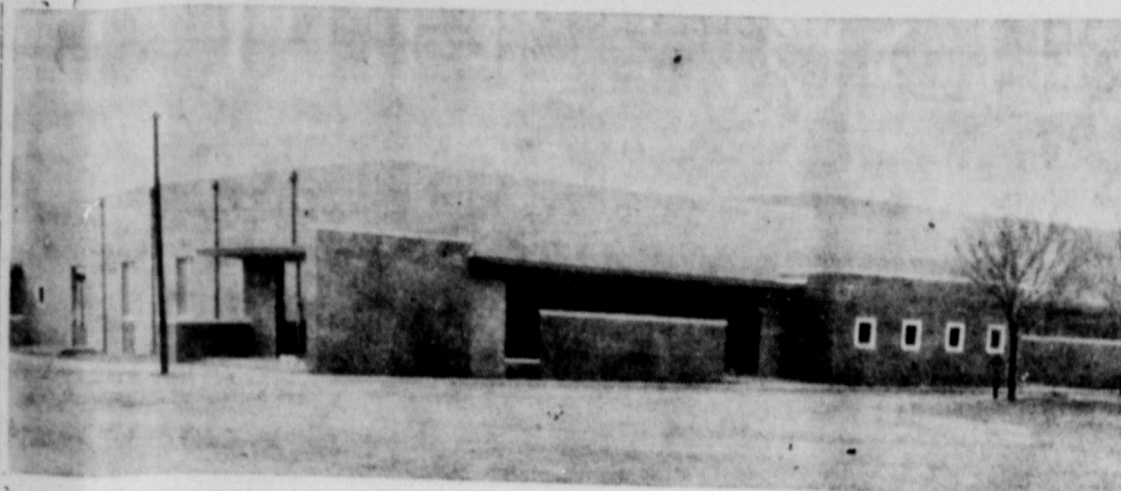
The Men's Club of Halfway are showing keen interest in the agricultural research program on the 310 acre site of the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation at Halfway.
