



Science in High School is be ing stressed in many fields of industry and most colleges require a lab-science for entrance.

During the past two years the Springlake school board has purchased equipment for the science department, including four student laboratory units that will accomodate sixteen students at a time. Check Yourself and Check Accidents

"Check yourself, and check accidents.

That, in a nutshell, is the advice J. O. Muscick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Asociation, handed motorist and pedestrians today. Seeking support in the remaining days of TSA's October safety-afterdark program, Muscick pointed out that more than 50 per cent of the pedestrian accident happen between 5 and 8 p.m.

"Twilight and darkness intensifies all traffic problems, but it makes conditions especially hazar dous for pedestrians and bike rid ers. It conceals them from drivers and puts the responsibility for their safety directly on their own shoulders," Musick said.

To reduce the odds against thm, Muscick had these four safety ips for each pedestrian and cyclist

For walkers: 1. Always walk on the sidewalk when possible. If the ere is no sidewalk, walk on the le ft shoulder of the road, facing tra ffic

2. In urban areas, always cross at intersections. At night cross at lighted intersection

3. Remember, pedestrians in dark clothing are difficult for motor ists to see. When walking at night it's a good idea to wear light on reflectorized clothing. Better still carry a flashlight, or something white, or reflectorized.

4. Don't trust your judgement too far in estimating the speed of an approaching car by its headlights.Never cross a street or highway unless you are absolutely certain you have ample time to reach the other side safely.


