

ed a dog ordinance which appears elsewhere in this issue. Regardless of whether you own a dog or not, you are urged to read this ordin ance and keep a copy of it, because a large part of it concerns the dread disease of rabies. It sets out the duties of individual citizens in helping prevent or ontrol an outbreak of rables.

When all individualy claimed logs are registered and inoculated (as the ordinance provides), the excess dog population will be promptly disposed of, thus lessening the risk of an outbreak. In their present uncontrolled state, these surplus dogs are a serious health hazard, in adition to being a nuis-

This ordinance became effective February 6, 1957), however .no prosecution for violations can legally be instituted for a period of 30 days.

In order to facilitate prompt compliance with the vaccination and registration provisions of the ordinance, it has been arranged to have a licensed veterinarian at the Ctiy Fire Station on February 15, 1957 from 1 to 6 p.m. to administer rables shots.

He especially requests that all dogs be brought in by adults and NOT by children. It is feared that in the confusion children might be bitten. One year inoculation and city registration will cost

If you want to protect your dog, do not fail to comply with this ordinance On and after March 6. 1957 all dogs found loose WITH-OUT registration tags attached will be presumed to be non-owned. It will then be the duty of the Dog Officer to make prompt disposal of them.

The City Committisn issued the work order January 31 to Brodie Construction Company of Amarillo.

This project has been under con struction for some time and bonds were voted in 1956 for the work, but has been pending confirmation from the Housing and Home Finance Agency before the actual work could be started.

Springlake has been without public waterworks facilities since its incorporation in 1955. The amount of the job is estimated at \$50,000 and will include a well, booster pumps, storage tanks, distribution mains and services, and water meters.

The project is schedued to be finished in 45 days, although they have a 90 day extension on the contract, according to Hershal Sanders, Mayor of Springlake.



ITS THE LAW in TEXAS

INCOME TAX INFORMATION

Under the provisions of the fedpersons who have a gross income over \$600 must file tax returns, except if the taxpayer is 65 or older he need not file a return unless he has gross income over \$1.200. This is because persons who are 65 or older have two exemptions which automatically eliminate any tax eligibility for income unde \$12,00.

All federal tax returns for individuals must be filed on or before April 15. Although many persons believe that a tax return need only be postmarked by the due date, such is not the intent of the statute. Tax returns are supposed to be in the office of the Internal Revenue Service by the due date specified.

Tax forms and instructions will be received by most persons during January. The instructions being distrubuted this year contain the following statement. "The Internal Revenue Service will mail Form 1040 ES, as far as is practo each person who may need it. Anyone else required to file should obtain the form from an Internal Revenue Service office in time to file by April 15, 1957."

Declarations of estimated tax are required from all persons who except gross income of more than \$400, plus \$600 times the number of exemptions which may be claimed of more than \$100 of the income will not be subject to with-

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
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
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
