The Springlake-Earth Independent School District today announced the free lunch policy for Springtake-Earth school children unable to pay the full price.

Local School Officials have adopted the following family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardship are urged to apply for free lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the elementary principal's office and the school nurses' office. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple and easy to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardship which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under the provisions of the policy, the school nurse will review the applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local school nurse, he may make a request either orally or in writing to the superindent of schools for a hearing to appea. the decision, William L. Mann, superintendent of schools, whose address is Box 436, Earth, Texas, has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

There will be no identification of or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

The survey was conducted by Dr. Wayne A. Hayenga, economist and project leader in farm management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Sixty-four per cent of some





Once a harvest-aid chemical is applied, the crop will be ready to harvest in 7 to 10 days. A combine equipped with a sunflower header attachment should be immediately available, because delays could be when cut open with a knife costly in terms of seed loss due to shattering and bird feeding. 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
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
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

Dr. Taylor says one of the most important aspects of judging protein is an evaluation of the amount of protein actually utilized by the body compared to the amount of intake. Using a scale with egg protein rated at 100, Dr. Taylor says beef would rate at 80 and corn and milo at 56. Citing statistics based on feeding out a 650 pound steer with a ton of grain, Dr. Taylor says the human body would actually utilize exactly the same weight of protein whether consuming the 160 pounds of protein in the feed or the 112 pounds in the fittished steer. 
