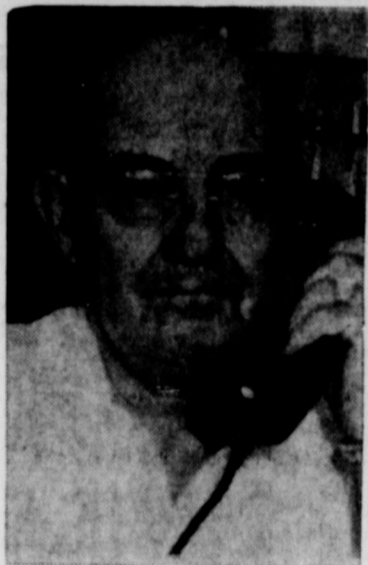

Funeral services for Spencer Clay Beavers, 69, were read in the First Methodist Church of Muleshoe Tuesday at 2:30 p.m. with Rev. Clarence Stevens, pastor officiating.

Burial was in Bailey County Memorial Cemetery under the direction of Singleton Funeral Home, Home.

Beaver died suddenly at his home in Earth at 2:30 Sunday morning of a heart attack. He was recuperating from an eye operation performed April 30.

Born in Denton County December 27, 1887, Beavers, with his family, moved to the vicinity of Muleshoe in 1920 where he lived since. He was in the Phillips Wholesale business for a number of years. He later owned a grocery store and auto parts business before moving to Earth last July where he owned and operated the Beavers Auto Parts until his death. ### Telephone Engineers Studying Springlake Project Possibilities

Three representatives of General Telephone Company, J. L. (Dusty) Kemper, division manager, and Floyd Jordan of the engineering department, both of Brownfield and Fred Mathis, district manager, of Littlefield were in Springlake Wednesday to look over the area, and to impress the Survey Committee and mayor with the necessity of a through analysis of the costs involved in the project before feasibility could be determined or any rates could be discussed.

Kemper told news reporters he could not give any definite time as to when Springlake City Commission could expect General Telephone representatives to be fully armed with cost information and ready to begin negotiations, but he pointed out he was making every effort to give Springlake's project priority, and hope it would not be too long.

Springlake subscribers surveyed listed 77 rural telephones needed and 59 for the city.

Kemper said there were at present six circuits into Springlake. Five of the six circuits now serve forty telephones. The remaining circuit serves the pay telephones.

Kemper, determined to give engineers a chance to study all possible angles of the project before making any statement as to what the Telephone Company could or couldn't do, said, "If the project proves feasible we will be just as anxious to provide the service as Springlake will be to get it."

### Earth Chamber of Commerce Proves Determination in City's Behalf

In September, 1955, several individuals and business men made known their desire to further the growth and to make Earth a better City in which to live and do business, by associating themselves together for the common good.

After organization problems were solved, the Earth Chamber of Commerce was granted a Charter on February 6, 1956.

The results of the first all-important problem to be brought before the organization can be seen today. It was the widening and curbing of Main Street, at which time the Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce voted to have a Paving Assessment Ordinance drawn to be presented to the City for passage, so that no time would be lost in obtaining easements and condemnation of property along the Highway Right-of-way.

The first Annual Banquet was held on April 24, 1956, with a total number of 36 present for the dinner. Just one year later, with the Chamber of Commerce firmly established as a going concern, the Annual Banquet was held on April 9, 1957 with a total of 146 members, residents and guests present for the dinner. This is an indication of the growth and strength that has been added since the organization was formed.

For the past nine months, the Chamber of Commerce office has been open to the public under the management of a paid secretary. The office is used as a clearing house on general information to local citizens, visitors, tourists and mail inquiries. In addition to the many other office activities and duties involved, The Earth Chamber of Commerce and The Littlefield Chamber of Commerce being the only two in Lamb County with paid employees.

The Chamber of Commerce has been under the supervision of a Board of Directors elected from the membership. At present, plans are being made for committees on various activities to be appointed from the membership.

The Board of Directors held their regular meeting Friday, May 10 and also a called meeting Tuesday, May 14. The purpose of these meetings were to begin plans for the 15th Annual Earth Rodeo. The importance of an extensive booster trip was discussed. The Chamber of Commerce will begin a fund drive immediately for the purpose of purchasing decorations and street banners to decorate the City for this important Rodeo event.

The following items are taken from the Program of Work For Earth for 1957. Designed By The Chamber of Commerce For Progress: To publish brochures and distribute to prospective industries; distribute brochures to newcomers through local merchants; answer inquiries enclosing brochures. To publicize EARTH through the sale and distribution of special metal tags attached to license plates of automobiles; continue distribution throughout the year. To meet and welcome all visiting groups visiting our town from other cities.

To assist groups and clubs requesting help in promoting projects and programs.

To work for organizing a City Federation of all clubs of Earth and its territory.

To formulate plans for advertising billboards for Earth on all highways into Earth.

To visit and welcome all new residents into the City of Earth.

To publish a regular report to keep members better informed on the activities of the Chamber of Commerce and the Community.

Provide free data to the many inquiries received in the Chamber office.

To secure the support of local Churches for Civic projects.

To work toward improving the City Park for more recreational facilities.

To encourage more interest in the need for recreation for the youth of this area.

To assist and encourage the completion of the Swimming Pool Project.

To urge citizens to have more trash cans, in the alleys, and to have a cover on each one to keep trash out of the alleys.

To sponsor an annual Paint-Up-Clean-Up Campaign.

To assist the City in any way possible in plans for making the City of Earth a better place in which to earn our living, and enjoy living in a prosperous town.

To work for a better unification of City and Citizens both in spirit and fact.

To check with proper officials on the possibility of wet Garbage pickup in the City.

To work for the continued enforcement of licensing all dogs.

To urge the formulating of adequate plans by the City for spraying for insect control, and assist in any way possible.

To encourage the repair and purchase of additional paved streets.

To work for a North and South bus transportation route to and from Earth.

To encourage Stop Signs placed on dangerous intersections within the City.

To continue the numbering of houses in the City of Earth until all houses and businesses have been numbered.

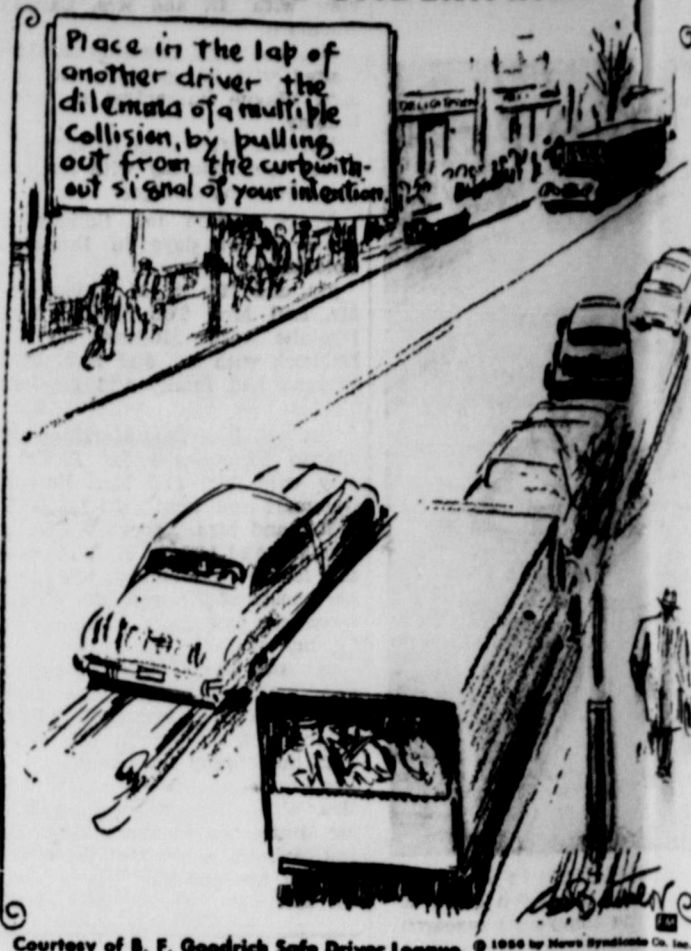
## Armed Forces Day, May 18

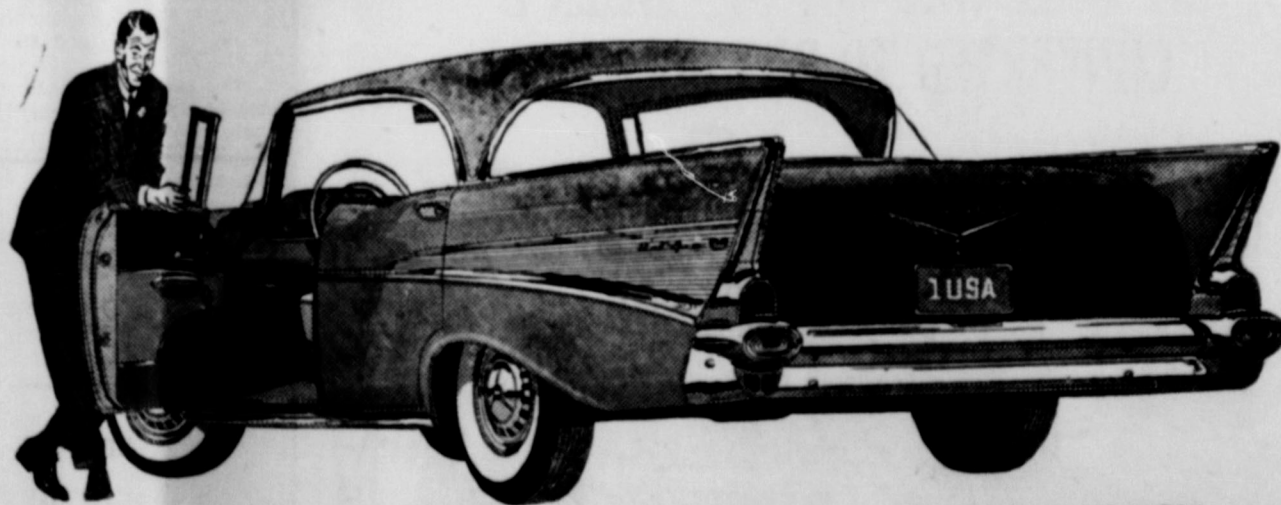

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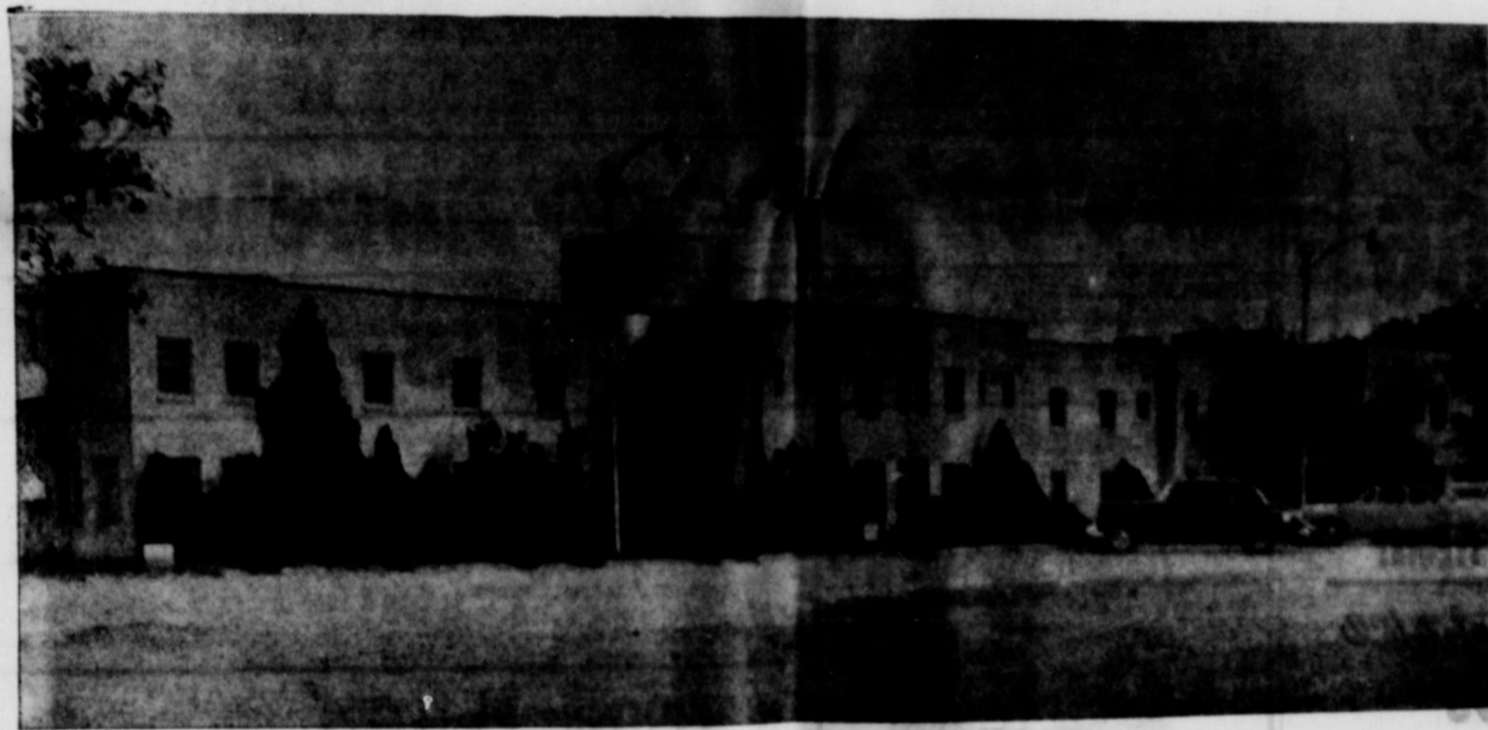

The city championship. A suitable trophy will be presented to the winning team at the end of the season. Competent coaches will be in charge of these teams.

The "Little League" will be composed of boys 10, 11 and 12. All ages will be determined by the date of June 1. A boy 13 before June 1st, will not be eligible, and a boy must be 8 before June 1st, for this program. The "Little League" will have four teams, each team having two sponsors. The teams will be: The Giants, sponsored by Rutherford Co. and Kimbell Gin; The Red Sox, sponsored by Neal Insurance and Layman Bros. Butane; The Yankees, sponsored by Earth News-Sun and Brown-White Equip. Co; and the Cardinals, sponsored by Dent Farm Supply and Earth Motors. Each "Little League" team will play three games a week, Tuesday, Thursday nights and a double-header Saturday evening. Their season will begin Saturday, June 1st with a double header.

Each team in both leagues will have 15 players, each team having an equal number of players from each age group. The players will be selected this Saturday, May 18, at the Earth ball field beginning at 9 a.m. Every boy from 8 through 12 in the Springlake School district who is interested in playing ball this summer must be at the

field at that time with an application form filled out and signed by a parent or guardian. The boys will be covered by insurance, but we must have the consent of a parent before a boy can play.

Each boy is to provide his own glove, sweat shirt, sweat socks, and shoes. It is recommended boys in the "Little League" wear official Little League shoes with rubber cleats. No steel spikes will be allowed. The Pee Wees may wear Little League shoes or rubber sneakers. All Little League suits are to be kept up by the boys or their parents, and they are to be turned in to the coaches at the end of the season.

Parents are urged to see that the boys attend all practices and scheduled games. If a boy consistently misses practice or games unexcused, the coach may, at his discretion, dismiss him from his team and replace him with another boy who may be available. Boys are requested to notify their coach in advance, if possible, if they must miss a practice or game.

Jimmy Hadaway, now attending West Texas State College, has been employed by the Earth Community Recreation Association to direct our baseball program throughout the summer. His duties will begin June 1st. He also will coach the Pony League boys, there will be one Pony team composed of boys 13 and 14 years old, and it will be sponsored by the Earth Citizens State Bank. Try outs for this team will be held June 1st, the exact time being announced later.

The Pony team will probably play in a league with Dimmitt, Olton and Nazareth, and their schedule will begin around the middle of June.

It is hoped every boy 8 through 12 will be able to play regularly this year in a organized league, the reason for adding a league for the 8 and 9 year olds.

Since there can be only one Pony League team for the 13 and 14 year olds, the team will be selected on a competitive basis after several weeks work out and trials as conducted by coach Jimmy Hadaway. The team will carry 15 players on road trips.

As in the case in any worth while cause, there is a continued need for funds for this program. Last year a new field was made ready with new lights and equipment. The town supported the program in a wonderful way, allowing us not only to have funds for the field and equipment, but providing a small balance which we can use for expenses this year. However, in getting ready for the season, we see this balance will not quite take care of the program, since we have expanded it by three teams. Thus, we once again urge all who are interested in the youth of our community to contribute to the Earth Community Recreation Association as heavily as possible

so that we might not only pay the salary of our director, Jimmy Hadaway, but have funds to provide insurance for the players, buy necessary equipment for the field, repair the backstop screen, replace broken lights, & take care of other necessary expenses that are included in a program as large as this, and which is benefitting such a large number of our youth.

The Association expects at least 140 boys to take part in the program.
