In Matthew the nineteenth chapter we have a very wonderful and yet heartheaking story of a man going to Jesus asking what to do to have eternal life. It is a wonderful story because it teaches a great lesson for us today. It is heartbreaking because the result of the answer which Jesus gave the man is so com-

Notice some of the characteristics of this young man who asked the question. He was bonest and sincere, Because of the general feeling of people toward Christ, it was not the popular thing to be found talking to Him. This man was morally clean, as evidenced by the fact he had kept the ten commandment law of God under which he was then living. Yet, even though he had manifested a faith in God he felt there was something lacking, thus he asked, "What Lack I Yet?"

Perhaps we believe we are following God, but we still need to always realize there can be something lacking in our life. May we always investigate to know for certain we are with God.

Jesus told the young man to do the one thing he had not done, to go sell what he had and give to the poor. This was a sacrifice the man was not willing to make, and he went his way sorrowing.
