Witnesses said the semi was parked on the railroad tracks while waiting for a traffic signal to change, and was pinned in by vehicles in front of and behind it.


The truck driver was not injured, but 24-year-old Joe Reyes of Muleshoe was treated and released at Muleshoe Area Medical Center after being hit by debris. Reyes' van was struck by pieces of the

age, and the train pushed the truck's trailer all the way across the northbound lanes of U.S. 84, closing all four lanes of the highway.

## **Combest predicted Senate OK of farm bill**

U.S. Rep. Larry Combest said Friday morning in a teleconference with area media representative that he believes the Senate will approve a farm bill with funding in the range of \$5.5 billion, rather than the \$7.5 billion being pushed by some Senate Democrats. Late in the day, the Senate did just that rather than face a possbile Bush veto.

Combest pointed out that President Bush had said he would veto a bill calling for the higher figure.

Combest, chairman of the House Agriculture Com-

mittee, is a major force behind the \$5.5 billion farm bill, which was reported out of his committee last week.

He said senators understood that the choice was not between \$5.5 billion and \$7.5 billion—"it's a choice between \$5.5 billion and nothing."




