Kay attended Freed-Hardman College before going to Eastern

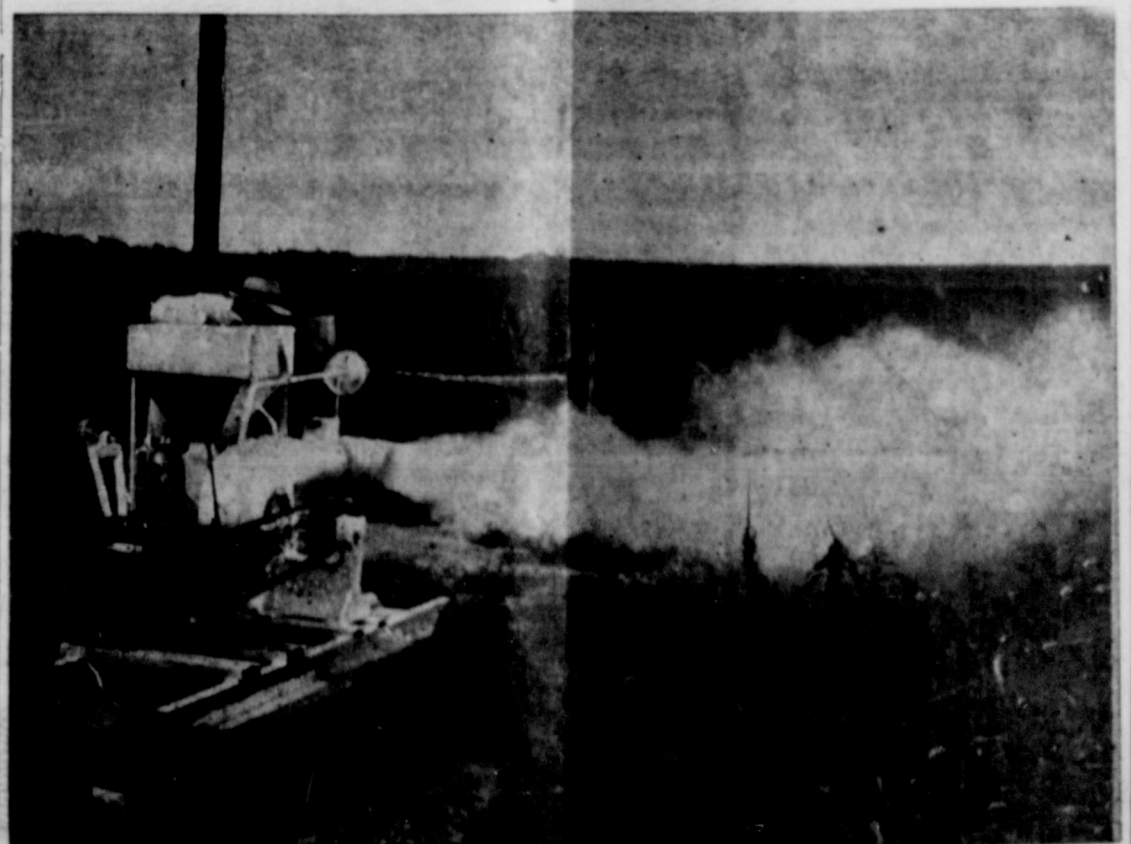
New Mexico University where he earned his B. A. and M. A. degrees. He has studied toward a doctorate at the University of Colorado.

## City Puts Machine Into Action



THEY'VE DONE IT AGAIN! Your City Councilmen have accomplished several things during their term of office for which the city should be grateful. They have purchased a maintainer to maintain our streets, they have also improved our main street and made improvements in our water and sewer system.

The latest and most important thing that has been done, is the building of this fogging machine to control insects in our city.

Although they could have purchased a fogging machine, instead they put their heads together and decided to build one and save the money for other city improvements. By building the machine they have saved the City approximately \$2000. Councilman Herschel Belew and son Bob built the machine. We congratulate all the councilmen for the wonderful and conscientious work they have done while serving us.

Earth now has its own insecticide fogging machine and it was put into action for the second time Monday morning.

For several years we have been in need of some system to rid the City of mosquitoes and flies. Due to the heavy rainfall this spring and summer the mosquitoes have been more plentiful than usual. The City felt that some method of applying the insecticide was a necessity at this time.

They decided to try to build a machine similar to the one they had previously used here. This was accomplished by City Commissioner R. H. Belew and his son, Bob, who built the machine at a cost of \$2000.00 to the City.

Factory built machines similar to this one would have cost approximately \$1500 to \$2300, thus saving the city \$1200 to \$1700.

The machine will be used at any time there is a need, providing the weather permits. It only takes about one and one-half hours to spray the entire City and can be operated by one man. The City has asked that the residents please keep all alleys clean and clear of vehicles so they can come down alley instead of the streets to spray. There is also an added attachment on the pickup that sprays the garbage barrels and trash cans.

Leonard won the city championship two years in a row, his Red Sox winning last year by a good size margin.

Especially do we thank the ladies, Georgia Stockard in particular who had charge, for their wonderful work with the concession stand.

Last Saturday an ice-cream picnic was given the boys, and a program was given in which the Little League all-star team was selected by the coaches was announced, and also the winners of the special awards were announced. The Methodist men are awarding sportsman-ship awards to the Pee Wee and Little League teams winners. Joe McGeath of the Red Sox was selected as the sportsman of the year for the Little League, and Ruel Cortez was awarded the same honor in the Pee Wees. A "Most valuable player" award was given to pitcher Jerrell Hadaway on the Pony team, and Stanley Irvine won the "sportsmanship" honor on the Pony team.

Fifteen boys were selected for Little League all-star honors and will be given silver plated miniature baseballs to identify their selection. 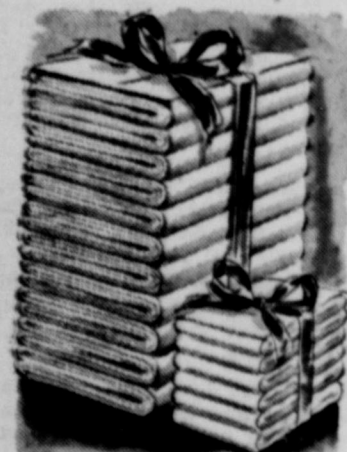

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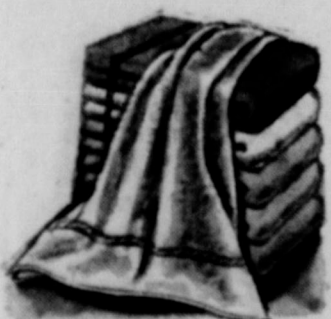

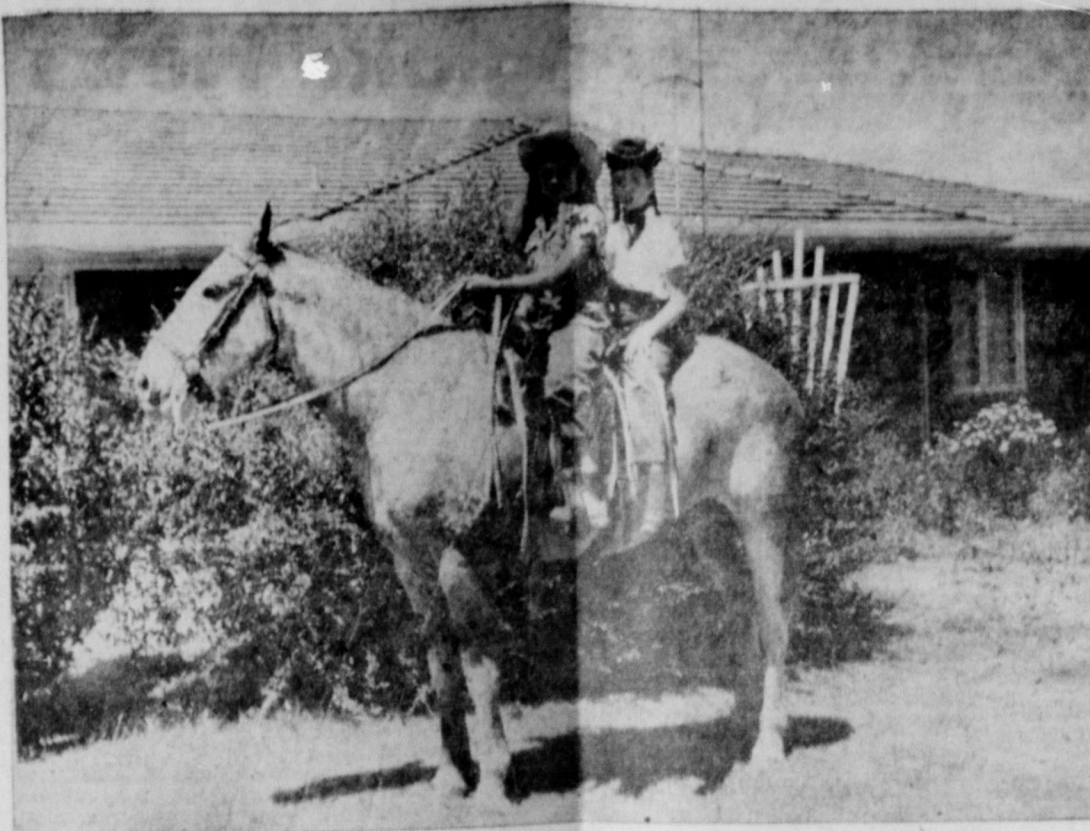

## Now Is The Time For All Good Parents To Get Those Birth Certificates

AUSTIN — "School days, school days, all around the state," may stray somewhat from the original song, but it means that come September, around 263,000 little Texans will be off to school for the first time.

In anticipation of this the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the Texas State Department of Health is getting itself for the annual last minute onslaught of thousands of requests for birth certificates photostats.

It seems that each year the situation repeats itself. Most school districts require proof of birth in the form of a birth certificate or photostat for students entering school for the first time.

Harried mothers all too often forget about this requirement until middle August. By then the Bureau of Vital Statistics is flooded with thousands of similar requests for photostat copies resulting in a delay in the receiving of the copy for two weeks or more.

In efforts to speed up the process the bureau each year hired extra help and works overtime, in addition to using certain speed-up techniques to aid in the location of the original certificates kept on permanent file at the Department of Health.

Most of the requests will be for six-year-old children. Knowing this, vital statistic personnel arrange the record books containing the 217,476 certificates of birth for the year 1951 and part of the "stacks" for 1950 so that access will be easier and quicker.

The removal and replacement of the certificates for photostating is done at the "stacks" by the extra personnel instead of at the photostat machine by the technicians in the usual manner.

In this way a staggering pile-up of record books is avoided and the issuance of birth certificate photostats is greatly speeded.

State Registrar Don Carroll asks that requests for photostat copies be made as soon as possible to avoid the rush. Contact your local health department or send the request to the Bureau of Vital Statistics, State Health Department, Austin, Texas.

Be certain to include the child's name, name of both parents, and the date and place of birth. Enclose (\$1.00) with your request. Cash is requested.

Write tonight to be sure to get your photostat on time.

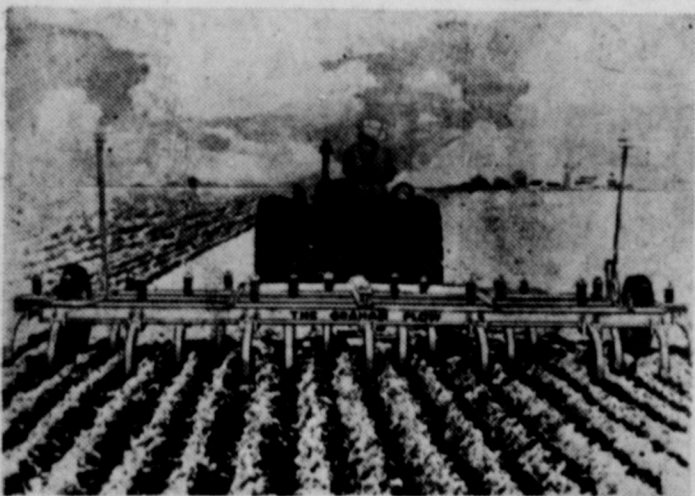

## Turkey Still Tops Plentiful Foods List

College Station — Turkey, for the second straight month, is the featured food on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's August plentiful foods list.

Supplies of turkeys are abundant reports the Agricultural Marketing Service, and consumers may look for excellent buys on these birds.

Fresh fish is another protein food chosen for the plentiful group, as August is in the height of the fishing season, both in Gulf waters and in inland streams. Supplies probably will vary with the region.

August plentiful foods also include numerous summer vegetables, although some will be found more abundant in one region than in another. Fresh peaches and pears will be in excellent supply. Lemons and limes will continue on the USDA list.

Vegetable fats and oils and peanut butter are shelf items which will remain on the plentiful list through August.

## Fifty Varieties Of Soybeans Planted At Halfway Station

HALFWAY, TEXAS: Research projects on soybeans at the High Plains Station include ten varieties in 100 foot plots, four rows to the plot. Each plot is repeated four times with a total of 160 rows in irrigated plots. One variety is being tested in the dryland area at the station in four plots.

Fifty varieties of soybeans have been planted in observation tests plots, 22 feet long. These observation plots are also repeated four times.

The fertilizer program for soybeans include 60 plots with 40, 80 and 120 pounds of phosphate and a standard application of 40 pounds per acre of nitrogen each.

Forty plots of soybeans have been planted to test the method and rate of planting for this crop. Method of planting includes one row per bed and two rows per bed with rows in the latter being 14 inches apart.

There are five different rates of seeding with 40, 50, 60, 70 and 80 pounds of seed per acre planted.

These soybeans tests will give some of the answers to questions raised by farmers on soybeans in the High Plains area.

## Loans For Grain Sorghum Storage Facilities Available

College Station — Time for providing storage space for your grain sorghum is rapidly growing short. If you do not have enough storage space and need financing for this, you will find loans available through the Commodity Credit Corporation, according to W. S. Allen, extension agricultural engineer.

These loans are available through local banks or directly from the CCC, says Allen. Owner-operators, share tenants, share landlords, and producer partners are all eligible. Applications can be made at the local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee office.

These loans can be paid off over a four-year period beginning on the first anniversary of the loan. Interest is a 4 percent per year. Storage structures price-support program, points out Allen.

"Adequate storage space means getting a better price for your crops after the usual low harvest-time price levels have passed. If you could use more space, why not drop into your local ASC office and discuss the possibilities," suggests Allen. "They can give you the details as they apply in your particular area."

## Springlake News

### Insects Show Increase In Some Areas

Varying amounts of rain fell throughout the area during the past week. In many localities the rains have been sufficient to maintain satisfactory growth and fruiting of cotton. Where hard rains fell, populations of thrips and fleahoppers were reduced, but continued showers will furnish ideal conditions for bollworm activity. While some insect infestations have been sufficient to require control, no general heavy infestations have developed.

Thrips were reported in light infestations throughout the area. While many plantings of cotton showed excessive shed of tiny squares, thrips infestations were generally too light to indicate such shed resulted from their feeding.

Fleahoppers occurred in light to medium infestations in some fields in all counties. Heavy infestations were reported in Briscoe, Floyd, Garza and Howard Counties.

Lygus bugs were present in light infestations on most cotton. Medium to heavy infestations were reported in some fields in Crosby and Lynn Counties. Populations have decreased in scattered fields, even where no insecticide applications have been made.

Bollworms were present in an increasing number of fields. While infestations were light in a majority of plantings of cotton, the worms were present in sufficient numbers to require control in a limited number of fields. Medium to heavy infestations were reported in Crosby, Garza, Howard, Lamb, Mitchell and Yoakum Counties. Increased bollworm activity may be expected if showers continue. Cotton should be checked frequently for the bollworm, and control effected as soon as damaging infestations appear. Small worms are easily killed and control at this stage greatly reduces farm damage.

Garden webworms were reported on cotton in scattered fields in Bailey, Lynn, and Terry Counties. Heavy infestations were present in fields which had heavy weed growth in Bailey County.

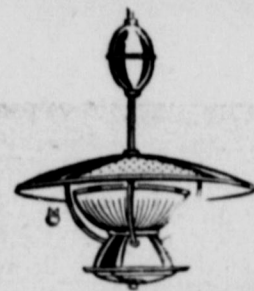

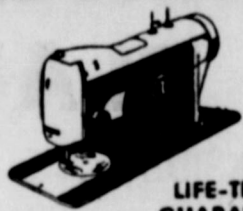

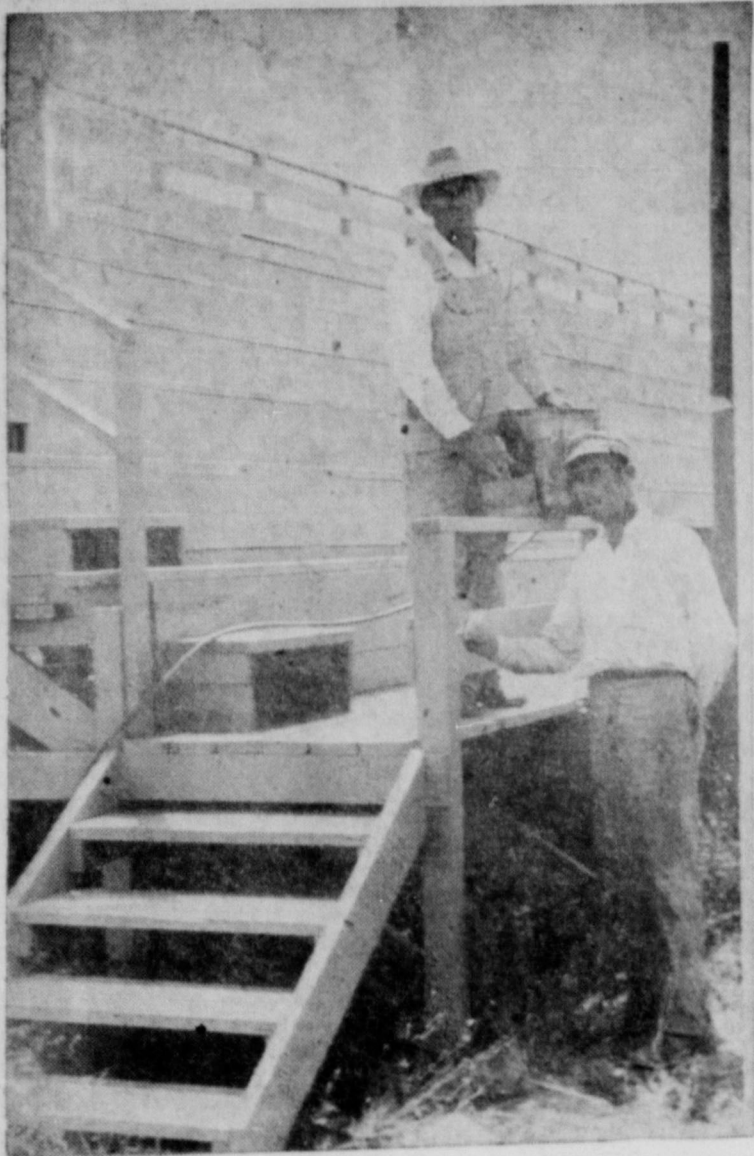

## The Hard Way Awards Given

Donald and Cliff Lawman, owners of Layman Bros. Butane Co. and Clyde Knight, who is employed there, recently won awards in "The Hard Way" contest by not being involved in any kind of accident for the past year.

Seeking safety honors "the hard way", a group of more than 700 Texans has entered the second year of a statewide effort to reduce accidents. Listed in the contest are employees and management representatives of nearly 150 firms of butane gas dealers in an industry-wide program created and sponsored by the Texas Butane Dealers Association.

"The 'hard way' contest goes far beyond the average accident elimination effort," explains Jack Walcher of Midland, president of the dealers' organization. "In order to win a certificate in this contest, an entrant must complete a full year without accident of any type — highway, traffic, at home, off-the-job, etc. Any type of accident involving a contestant eliminates him from competition." President Walcher explained.

"We don't believe that practicing safety in any one field of activity is enough," Mr. Walcher said. "If a man runs up a perfect traffic safety record and then by his own carelessness is injured in a home accident, he can't be called a safe operator. Our contention is that to be safe, one must practice safety in every activity."

Although the "hard way" makes attaining a perfect safety record extremely difficult, 650 persons received awards at the end of the first year of this contest recently. Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., head of the Texas Department of Public Safety, personally passed out the awards to representatives of the firms listed in the contest and paid a high tribute to the butane dealers' organization and to the individuals taking part in the effort. "Safety has to go all the way," he said, "and this group has demonstrated that it can be completed with unceasing care and constant alertness to hazards."
