



Area Receives Welcome Rain Past Week

Though the area has not as yet yelled drought, the prospect seemed high when drenching rains moved in Friday night to give relief from the heat as well as moisture to dry farm land. Reports over the region ranged from .50 to 1.50 of an inch Friday. There were no reports of hail or crop damage though standing water on the highways caused alarm to travelers, and farm roads had their usual muddy condition.

Tuesday, a front entered the Panhandle, resulting in rain and wind reported up to 100 mph in Seminole, with almost flash floods in the business district of the city. There was also extensive damage to farm buildings by the g-shes of wind.

Though Earth received very little rain early Wednesday, what was received was a slow soaking one, which alters a great deal the temperatures. The cold front, from which the rain resulted, altered temperatures as much as 19 degrees in the Panhanole.
