Red Cross To Give Aid To S. Vietnamese

Lamb County Red Cross Board met at 4 p. m. September 2 in the Red Cross Office. Mrs. Bonnie Haberer, chairman, presided.

Supply items, and projects, that the Local Chapter will participate in due to Red Cross commitments made necessary directly, or indirectly, by Vietnamese conflict were discussed. The American Red Cross has joined hands with sister societies around the world in providing supplies and money needed to help relieve the suffering of approximately one million civilians in South Vietnam displaced by the war. The Midwestern Area, of which Lamb County Chapter is a part, were asked to produce 7,200 layettes for shipment to and distribution by the South Vietnamese Red Cross Society. Plans were made to participate in this needy program.

A report by the executive secretary of case work was made as follows for the month of August: 47 services to military, 26 services for Veterans, and 33 to civilians.

A first aid class at Sudan will be taught September 20, 22, 27, and 29, sponsored by the PTA of Sudan through Lamb County Red Cross Chapter. The instructor will be Bill Weige, Lamb County Red Cross First Aid Chairman.

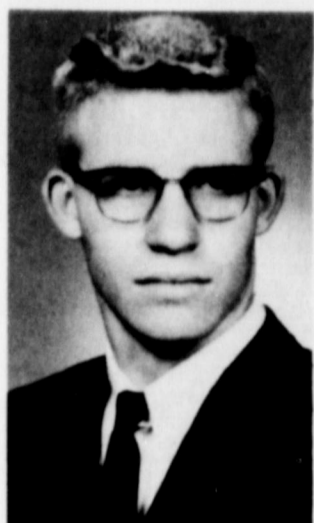

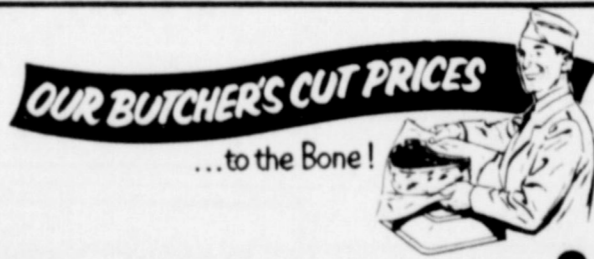
