Monday morning found the foursome traveling by car to Utrecht, Holland. From Utrecht they rode a train to Amsterdam.

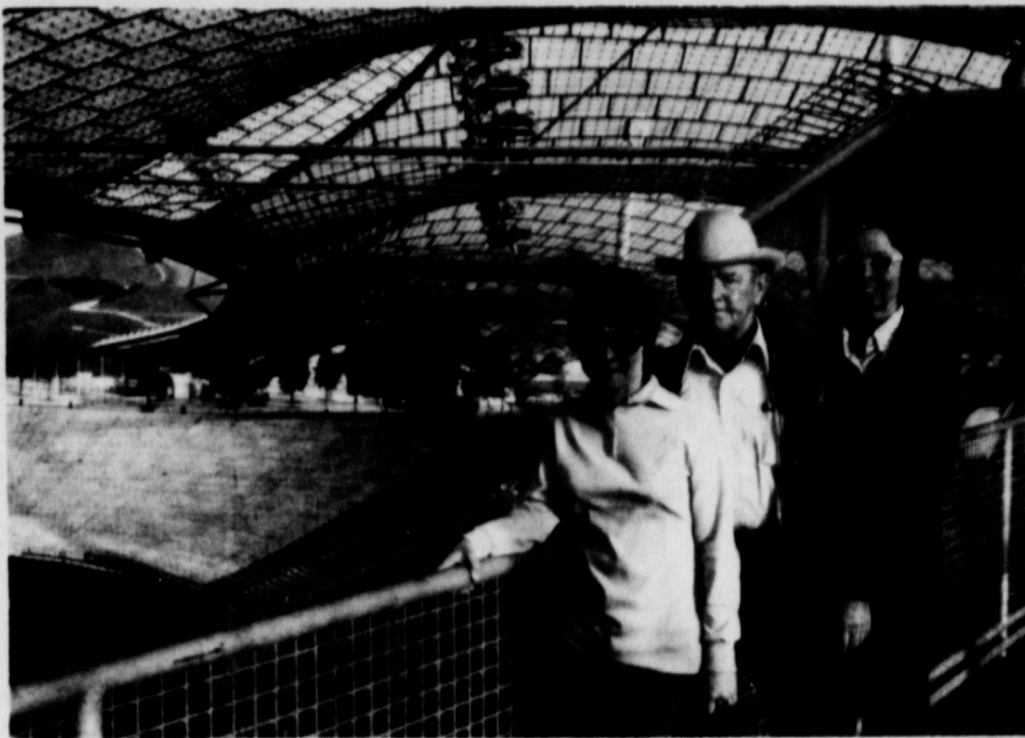

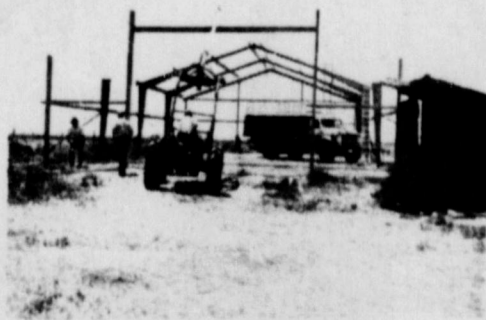
