

What is a Federal Price Reporter? A man or woman appointed by Adminis "tor Peden to check prices as charged by retail merchants for li-censed commodities of foodstuffs. What is their duty?

To check the stores in their respec tive communities not less than once a week on forms sent out by the Price Section of the Federal Food Administration for Texas.

How many are there in Texas?

The list for August shows 300 names but it is growing daily. Appointments are based on population and the plan is to have one reporter for each town of 1500 or over; two for each town of 5000 or over; three for each town of 7500 or over; four for each town of 10,900 or over; and so on adding one Price Reporter for each 2500 addition al population

How are the Price Report blanks checked?

Every retail store should be covered. by the Frice Reporters at least once a week, and as near a check made upon every community as possible. When the reports are received by the Price Section at State headquarters for the Federal Food Administration for Texas, the lists are checked against the Price Interpreting Committee fain price lists for the district in which they originate, and where there is evidence of excess profits the County Administrator is notified of the name of the offender, the date of the of fense, and the person making the check. An adjustment is then up to the County Food Administrator.

How are the Price Reporters co-re lated with the Price Interpreting Committees?

Wherever possible the County Food Administrators should link the Price Reporting Committees with the Price Interpreting Committees. The two de partments should work in close har mony and Price Reporters should thor oughly familiarize themselves with the interpretations of the Price Interpret ing Committees, noting carefully changes from week to week, and understanding the economic factors which enter into these changes. To not so UNDERSTAND is to miss completely the viewpoint and to render the work insufficient.

Are Price Reporters volunteers? Yes-just as the Food Administra tion is essentially a volunteer work. There is no higher following today than that of Service 'o the Nation in one field or another, and men and wo men who are designated as Price Re porters should accept their appoint ments in the same spirit as the man ng the army under the Selective Draft reports for duty and remains "on the job" until the war is won.

lies and our soldiers. "Saving of money to the consumer is a secondary job. This money is saved through the elimination of speculation, through elimination of profiteering, and through stabalization of all food prices. In general, the Food Administration claims to have steadied all food prices by keeping the public informed of the presence of cheap and abundant foods, such as potatoes, and by urging conservation of less pay the enormous tribute formerly abundant foods, particularly going to private insurance companies those foods which can be shipped and that undoubtedly the government abroad. Two important foods



**Two Packing Companies Charged** by Federal Men With Selling Army Spoiled Meat.

That the disloyalty of the profiteers knows no bounds and that they do not even hesitate when the health and lives of our soldiers are involved, has been demonstrated by latest revelations concerning two big Chicago packing companies, charged by the Federal Trade Commission with selling tainted meat to the United States armies in Texas.

Regarding these charges, the Fed-Trade Commission has authorral

"Complaints have been issued by the Federal Trade Commission, making the serious charge against Wilson & Co. that they have sold and offered to sell meat and other food products to the government with the knowledge that these products were be used as food for American soldiers and that these products were spolled and unfit for human consumption.

Spoiled Meat For Sale.

"Thousands of pounds of unfit meat were offered for sale to Camp Travis, Texas, according to the in-formation on which the complaints are based. Indictments were returned against the two packing concerns by grand jury in the United States District Court for the Western District of Texas, charging violation of the fourth section of the food law, but these indictments failed. It was found that no penalty for violating provided.




