Senate bill No. 206, which be came a law June 16 1919, prohibits the use of a "glaring" auto-mobile headlight, which is defined to be one so bright as to "serious-ly interfere with the vision of or temporarily blind the sight of a driver of a vehicle approaching

from the oppisite direction."

Full Stop Required.

Senate bill No. 206 also contains a provision requiring motor vehicles to come to a full stop before attempting to pass rail road trains, interurban cars or street ears, stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging

passengers. Theft of Automobiles.

House bill No. 417 went inte-effect June 16. This bill is designed to prevent the theft of automobiles, by making it imposs-

It prohibits the transfer of a econdhand automobile that has not been registered. It requires that a license receipt correctly PROFESSIONAL PHOTOdescribing the car to be sold, be indorsed and delivered to the purchaser at the time the car is transferred. It also requires the delivery to the purchaser of a bill of sale in duplicate.

The full text of the bill is as follows

House Bill No. 417.

Be is enacted by the Legisla-ture of the State of Texas:

Section 1. From and after the taking effect of this act it shall ed at the Dallas meeting. be unlawful for any persons in this State to have or retain in his or their possession, or sell or offer to sell any motor vehicle from which the engine number has been removed, or obliterated. Every such owner of a motor vehicle from which the engine number has been removed, erased, or destroyed in any manner, before using the same upon the public highways of this State, or selling or offering for sale any such motor vehicle, shall make applica tion to the Highway Commiss for an engine number, and the number assigned by the Highwa; Commission shall be stamped with a steel die on the engine of such

Sec. 2. The State Highway Com. mission shall cause to be kept in the State Highway Department a separate register in which shall be recorded the engine numbers assigned to owners of motor yehieles, from which the original engine number has been removed, erased or destroyed in any manner, and before assigning any such number the commission shall

SENATOR W. S. BELL KILLED AT CROWELL

Young Bell and Mrs. Jim Gafford Wounded. Three Arrests

The following account of the killing of State Senator W. S. Austin, Texas, June 21.—Sev- Bell is quoted from the Childress

Bell married a daughter of Jim Gafford. The young people were only 17-years old. After living together for about 6-months the young wife died rather suddenly The Gaffords thought she had been poisoned although the fact was never established.

"The death of the young wife created a feeling between the families, perhaps more so on the were seated in their automobile show Mrs. Gafford attemptel to shoot young Bell. The pistol misfired and Senator Bell struck the woman over the head with a pistol perhaps with the thought of only preventing her from killing his son. About this time other shots rang out. Gafford has a young son. When the shooting ended Senator Bell was in a dying condition. Buck shot had torn his teeth out and the top of his head was ripped open with shot. He lingered four hours before death claimed him.

"Young Bell was shot through the leg the bullet breaking the bone. It is thought that Senator Bell accidently shot his son. Jim Gafford was downed by a bullet through the groin. His condition

"The Gaffords are prominent people and have resided in Foard county for many years. They own a large farm and the farm home is in a mile of the business section of Crowell.'

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




