OUTLINES HIS POSITION

Inaugural Address of President William H. Taft. Pays Tribute To South. Wants Her Friendship.

[CONTINUED FROM LAST WEEK] Some type of canal must be constructed. The lock type has been selected. We are all in favor of having it built as promptly as possible. We must not now, therefore, keep up a fire in the rear of the agents whom we have authorized to do our work on the isthmus. We must hold up their hands, and speaking for the incoming administration I wish to say that I propose to devote all the energy pos. sible and under my control, to the pushing of this work on the plans have been adopted, and to stand behind the men who are doing faithful hard work to bring about the early completion of this, the greatest constructive enterprise of modern times.

The governments of our dependencies in Poto Rico and the Philippiaes are progressing as favorably as could be desired. The prosperity of Poto Rico continues unabated. The business condition in the Philippines are not all that we could wish them to be. but with the new passage of the new tariff bill permitting free trade between the United states and the Archipelago, with such limitations in sugar and tobacco as shall prevent injury to the domestic interests on those p r o ducts, we can count on an improvement in business conditions in the Philippines and the development of a mutually profitably trade between this country and the islands. Meantime our government in each dependency is upholding the traditions of civil liberty and increasing popular control which might be expected under American auspices. The work which we are doing there redounds to our cridit as a nation.

I look forward with hope to increasing the already good feeling between the South and the other sections of the country. My chief purpose is not to effect a change in the electoral vote of the southern states . That is a secondary consideration. What I look forward to is an increase in the tolerance of political views of all kinds and their advocacy throughout the South and the existance of respectable political oppositoin in every state; even more than this, to an increased feeling part of all the people in the South that this government is their government and that its officers in their states are their officers. The consideration of this question can not, however, be omplete and full without reference to the negro race, its progress and its present condition.
