### To Fit Rejected Men For Army

Washington, Aug. 10 .-- A bill appropriating \$1000,000,000 for camps to rehabilitate men rejected for army service, because of curable physical disability, was introduced today by Senator Pomerene. Officers would be assigned by the War Department for the training of the men and they would be given such medical attention as is necessary until the physical disability had been removed.







The sea moss on the Irish coast, called by some "sloak," is really laver. In Ireland it is called "Sloucaun" (with the "c" hard), and "Slope" for brevity. In Ireland, as in England, it is prepared by washing, to get rid of sand, etc., and then boiling.

When boiled, a little butter or bacon fat is added and a dash of lemon juice completes the preparation. It is eaten with fish, and by some with mutton instead of jelly.

In Wales a great deaf of laver is used, mostly in the form of "laver bread," says the London Chronicle. The boiled laver is mixed with a proportion of catmeal and shaped into Wednesday. round cakes.

"Laver bread," or "lava bread," as it seems to be pronounced, is on sale in all the Welsh markets anywhere from St. Louis, conveniently near the coast.

### WINTER CARE OF THE SHEEP

Fleece of Good Quality Cannot Be Secured From Half-Starved Animal -Give Succulent Food.

If the sheep are neglected and allowed to run down in flesh when the winter sets in the fleece will be in-

jured in both weight and quality. A fleece of good quality cannot be grown on a poor half-starved sheen. If the ewes are allowed to get poor during the winter the chances are that the lambs will be weak and will perish for lack of nourishment and from cold, while the lambs from a wellcared for ewe will be much abler to

stand the cold if they should happen to be dropped when the weather is

The dams' will have more milk for their young, too, if they are well cared

Sheep need some succulent food during the winter. They should have some rough feed such as corn stover or clover hay, and, above all, they should have a ration rich in both protein and mineral matter.

### MANURE IN THE BOX STALLS

More Bedding Is Required to Keep Animal Clean-Ideal Breeding Place for Flies.

(By J. N. ALLEN.) The production of manure in the box stall is probably the best of the old methods, since it requires the least expenditure of labor. However, more bedding is required to keep the animal clean and the accumulated manure furnishes an ideal breeding

place for flies. The manure so produced, if kept evenly distributed over the floor, will be thoroughly compacted and will sustain only a small loss of nitrogen so long as the animal remains upon it. but if the manure is allowed to remain in the stall after the animal is removed there will be constilerable loss of nitrogen both as ammonia and as free nitrogen, due to the drying out and breaking up of the uric acid into ammonium carbonate, and to the action of the bacteria on the organic nitrogen com-

### WARM, DRY PLACE FOR HOGS

Animale Will Not Thrive and Give Sat-isfactory Returns If Allowed to Shiver in Cold Pen.

By all means give the pigs, whether they are intended for store hogs or pork hogs, a warm, dry place in which to sleep. No hog will thrive and make satisfactory returns when compelled to shiver on a hard bed in a cold pen, or to huddle up or lay against the side of the building where they are suffering from cold.

Do not allow too much air above the pigs. It is better to make a false covering over the nest to keep the cold air from coming down from above.

While we are anxious to exclude the cold air from the nest, there should growing of pasture grasses and forago always be an abundance of pure air for the animals to breathe, as it will enable them to do much better work in digesting the feed than if confined to a close pen where the air is impure.
