



Note the parallels. We had, first of all, indignant citizens who felt that they could not accomplish anything at the polls and who therefore armed and drilled in preparation for fighting. Next we had the senator ordering out troops to quell them; next, a public hearing at which the senator tells about a widespread plot to asassinate him.

The thing had an odor of comic opera, to be sure; but it followed the blueprints of the real thing, and it leaves one with an uncomfortable feeling that next time it may go whole hog and end up with shooting. It was just a little too life-like to be really funny.

What is happening, obviously, is that in this one state American liberties as we have known them are giving way to one man rule, which is bolstered up just as one-man rule in Italy and Germany is bolstered. The Huey Long model of Fascism is running an ominous parallel with the Mussolini and Hitler models.

Now it is argued, in defense of all this, that Senator Long was preceded by an unscrupulous and overbearing political machine so that he is really accomplishing much for the plain people of his state even while he takes their civil liberties away from

But even if we grant, for the sake of argument, that all of this is true, there is one more fact to remember:

This is precisely the excuse that dictators everywhere give for their acts. Mussolini, Hitler, Leninthey all know that tale by heart, and chanted it in season and out of season. The lesson ought to be clear.
