## To the Cotton Raisers of Hall County

The recent conflict has been one of right against might, or rather of right against wrong and right is the victor.

In this world struggle our vision has been broadened and in the reconstruction, great reformation has taken place and others must take place in the conduct of our affairs.

Right ought to and must prevail to a much larger extent than ever before. But not withstanding the great lesson that stands facing us on the world's horizon, we believe the cotton farmer is confronted with and is now undergoing some wrongs.

- (1) We ask is there any reason why middling cotton should sell for practically 4c a pound less in Memphis than in Houston, the freight rate being 66c per hundred?
- (2) Is ther any reason why farmers shold be asked or compelled to weigh their cotton on a public weigher's scales or on anybody's scales when the law provides for bonded weighers the same as it does public weighers?
- (3) Is there any reason why a merchant can price and weigh his merchandise to us and we as farmers can't price and weigh ours?
- (4) Is there any reason for cutting a bale of cotton twelve times and taking a pound each cutting when the law says that the ginner shall prepare a sample and the cotton shall be sold by the sample?

(5) Is there any reason why the farmer should sit idly by and not ask the next legislature to fix a sufficient penalty to the warehouse sampling law to prohibit the cutting and appropriating of this immense amount of cotton.

We believe there are no just reasons for these things, and that they ought not to exist; and that by proper co-operation things can be set right. Eleven years ago the Farmers Union Warehouse Co., was organized for the purpose of protecting the farmers against existing wrongs, and has continuously fought for the rights of the farmers, and shall continue without ceasing. Our efforts depend on your co-operation. Our stock is always for sale, and we have a plan by which any farmer can procure stock without paying money, his business will pay for the stock. We have paid back in earnings \$16,300.00 to the farmers within the last four years, who have furnished the business, the greater part being paid to farmers who do not own the stock. Ask your farmer neighbors, they know.

Will you patronize a concern that is working for your interest, or will you disregard our every effort to see that you get justice along all lines? Give us a chance to sell your cotton; ask about our plan of selling.

This is a co-operative institution owned by farmers and managed in the interest of the farmers and we are ready to help you get the worth of your cotton. We saved \$200.00 on 15 bales of cotton last year for L. Morrison and we believe we can help you. Come to see us and talk it over. We ask you at any rate to stand fair and square and price your cotton and weigh it on any lawful scales you wish. This system of requiring farmers to weigh their cotton on any particular scales must have migrated from the far south land where the atmosphere and complexion is different from what it is here in the Panhandle. We ask you to come here and sign a petition to the legislature for the amendment of the warehouse law as above suggested. Below is a list of stockholders see how many farmers names appear.





Pledges made to invest in United States Government War Savings Stamps are due for payment now Liquidation must be made before December 31, 1918.

War Savings Stamp pledges are binding obligations upon the persons who made them. All necessary steps to assure their liquidation will be

War Savings Stamps may be purchased from postoffices, banks, United States mail carriers and designated agencies.

War Savings Stamps are not subject to taxa-

S pledger has been called upon to meet the obligation he assumed to invest in United States Government War Savings Stamps. While December 31 is the last day of grace for the liquidation of W. S. S. pledges, the Government is requesting that every pledged person pay his pledge before Christmas.

The price of each War Savings Stamp is \$4.23. On January 1, 1923. the Government will redeem every War Savings Stamp, paying the owner \$5.00 for it. These Government securities yield 4 per cent interest, compounded quarterly. War Savings Stamps worth \$100.00 can be purchased this month (December) for \$84.60. War Savings Stamps worth \$1000.00 can be purchased for

Money lent to the Government through the purchase of War Savings Stomps is used to feed and soldiers and saflors and bring them to their homes in the United States. In other words, War Savings Stamps mean tickets home for the fighting men.

Through the mails, by proclamation and public notice the Government is now calling for the final setMement of these pledges.

While, therefore, the plans of the American Red Cross in this direction cannot be formulated specifically, in advance of the general relief program of the Allied governments, the American Red Cross is nevertheless planning to develop its permanent organization in this country upon a scale never before contemplated in time of

"The commissions which are now conducting the activities of the American Red Cross in foreign countries, as well as the temporary war organization in this country, will as a matter of course ultimately merge their energies with those of the permanent organization of the Red Cross.

With the war has developed the striking and important fact that many en and women, some of whom have met with great success in devoting their lives entirely to business, came into the Red Cross organization at the outset of the war simply that they

realized such a satisfaction to themselves in the opportunity to serve mankind that they now desire to become a part of the permanent peace organization of the American Red Cross.

"There may, therefore, be perfect confidence that the peace activities of the Red Cross will be conducted under able and inspiring leadership. The chapters will maintain their organizations upon a scale adequate to the new demands to be made upon them. Local committees will indeed appreciate more and more the value of having in their midst strong and efficient Red Cross chapters. The divisional organi. arise. zations, with honorary and permanent staffs, will be maintained, always ready for service, and national headquarters will have a large and efficient personnel to direct the activities of the organization as a whole.

"Study is being given by the national country for enlarged home service, the development of nursing, the care and prevention of accidents, and other correlated lines which may contribute to the health and happiness of men, women and children. 
