





High School Will Offer Pre-Flight Course This Term


Juniors and Seniors to Be Given Opportunity to Lay Groundwork for Aviation

JUNK NEEDED FOR WAR

THE intensified over-all campaign for salvaging vital war materials which is now in progress throughout the nation, and will reach a climax in Hall County with a big "junk rally" Friday, August 28, must have the unqualified support of every organization and individual if it is to accomplish its purpose. This means not only that every man, woman and child should worked toward gathering needed materials, but everyone must be ready and willing to assist in other ways if called upon.

The rank and file of Hall County people have responded cheerfully and effectively to previous campaigns for salvage and a wealth of much needed materials has been channelled into the war effort from this area. But previous successes should not be allowed to lead to complacency or blind anyone to the at over-all drive. In the very nature of things, there are yet quantities of the desperately needed materials, metals, rubber and fats remaining in the county. The cream has been skimmed off, of course, in previous drives, but what remains to be done-and it is urgent in the extreme-is to glean every last pound of scrap metals and discarded or unessential rubber, every last ounce of fats so that they may be transformed into the machines, guns and explosives which our fighting men need to beat down the ruthless Axis enemies. Perhaps you feel that you have already done your share, you are tired of salvage drives, or you feel that the little you can do doesn't amount to anything in the tremendous task of winning the war. Well, doubtless the people of England grew very tired of the death and destruction rained upon them from the skies before their outnumbered, but dauntless air force managed to beat off the raiders. No doubt the patient Chinese are very tired of the whole business of war. "after six years of it. Perhaps the hardy Chetniks in the mountains of Serbia get tired of endless battling against overwhelming odds. You may be sure there are many in conquered France. Belgium, Holland and Greece who often feel that their feeble efforts at resistance are of small avail. Don't you suppose that the brave Russian soldiers are tired of falling back before the crushing onslaughts of the German war juggernaut? But they don't quit, and we can't afford to quit. In free America, you are not threatened with punishment for failure to turn in your junk, which is all the more reason you should co-operate fully and freely.
