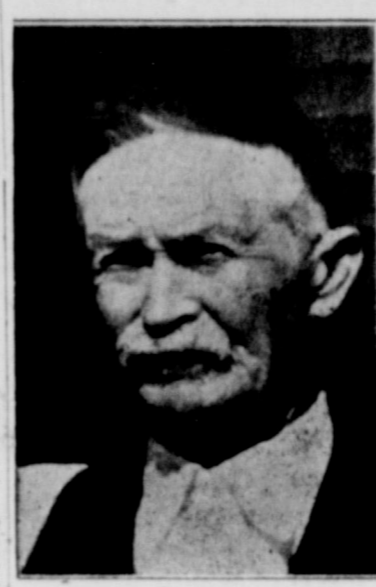
Memphis Jersey Breeder Awarded Bull in Contest

Here's a listing of a few of the jobs for which applications are now being taken (further information may be obtained from Thompson at the Memphis post office): To establish an immediate supply of trained personnel and to create an adequate reserve of skilled manpower, the Navy department, the Army Signal Corps, Ordnance Corps and Air Corps, have instituted mechanic learner training programs for unskilled men and women. Applicants to qualify for these positions as a mechanic learner must be 16 years old or more, must be in good physical health, and must pass a civil service mechanical aptitude examination. Glynn Thompson, secretary, local board of U. S. Civil Service examiners, announced today. Initial wages range from \$5.40 to \$6.66 an hour. Persons with special abilities will be promoted rapidly. Complete information may be obtained from the local civil service secretary at any first or second class post office, or from the Manager, Tenth U. S. Civil Service District, Customhouse, New Orleans, La. Civilian radio instructors are urgently needed for duty in connection with the war program at Kelly Field, San Antonio, the Tenth U. S. Civil Service district announced this week. Two years of experience as a commercial radio operator are needed to qualify for appointment at \$2600 per year. For appointment at \$2000 a year, possession of a First Class Radio Operator's license, a First or Second Class Radiotelegraph Operator's license, a Restricted Radio Telegraph operator's license, or a Class A Amateur Radio Operator's license will qualify, or six months of appropriate experience as a radio operator. Junior stenographers who can take dictation at 96 words per minute are also urgently needed in Washington, D.C. \$120 per month is the entrance salary for junior stenographers, and 18 years the minimum age limit. Positions in Pearl Harbor and the Panama Canal Zone for various craftsmen are also open, with applicants urgently needed, particularly in aircraft and marine lines. SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Humanity Must Learn to Live Without Wars
The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Aug. 16. Text: Genesis 26:18-31.
SONS do not always inherit or manifest the good qualities of their fathers. But Isaac, the son of Abraham, in one respect at least, emulated his father Abraham in his love of peace and in the practical way in which he sought it. We have seen how, when there was strife between the herdsmen of Lot and Abraham, Abraham magnanimously gave Lot his choice of the country so that there might be no strife. Here in our lesson Isaac was faced with something of the same problem with the Philistines, the traditional enemies of the Israelites. Abraham had dug wells, very necessary for the maintenance of life and for their herds of cattle. The Philistines had filled up these wells and stopped them after the death of Abraham, and now when Isaac's servants dug a well in the valley and found there a well of springing water, the herdsmen of Gerar fought with Isaac's herdsmen, saying, "The water is ours." Peacefully disposed Isaac dug another well, and they strove for that also. But when he went on to another place and dug a third well, they left him unmolested. Isaac prospered so greatly that his enemies evidently became alarmed, and they went to him seeking to establish a covenant. Isaac accepted their proposal and they went from him in peace. If there had been more Abrahams and Isaacs in the world, we would not have had the long history of devastating wars, and men would have learned to live together under covenants of peace. The present war will not have a successful issue unless it does result in new covenants of peace between nations. But we need more than covenants. We need the character that keeps them, and that sort of character is not found among those who destroy wells. The diggers of wells, the builders of civilization, must have protection if peace and prosperity are to have their place in humanity's future.

Laundries Warned

Following reports that some laundries had dropped their less expensive services, such as "wet wash," "family finish," "rough dry" and "thrift service," and were requiring customers to buy higher-priced services, the OPA warned that laundries must continue to offer the same low-priced services they sold last March.

Lamb Price Ceiling Ordered

With the issuance of a 60-day temporary ceiling on lamb prices at the wholesale and retail levels, OPA has completed price control over every major meat item except poultry. The temporary regulation sets the ceiling price at the highest price charged by each seller during the period July 27 to 31, 1942.

Food Outlet Surveyed

In a move designed to amplify OPA's existing information on price control problems relating to distribution of food products, field representatives of the Bureau of Labor Statistics Monday began a survey of wholesale and retail grocery establishments in the Southwest. Region OPA officials emphasized that the survey has no connection with compliance or enforcement investigations.

Auto Part Turn-In Liberalized

Liberalization of WPE limitation order L-158 governing purchases of auto replacement parts has been announced. Under the ruling, a car owner may purchase a new part for his car without immediately turning in the old part, provided the replacement is not installed in the car by the distributor from whom it was purchased.

Iron, Steel Barred From Mattresses

Manufacturers of mattresses containing iron and steel must on September 1, under terms of revision of WPE's order, Studio couches, sofa beds, lounges in which iron and are used may not be produced after November 1. Processed iron and steel for use in mattresses was banned as of August 1.

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49a, requiring all bills passed by the Legislature on and after January 1, 1945, appropriating money for any purpose, to be sent to the Comptroller of Public Accounts for his approval, and fixing the duties of the Comptroller with reference thereto; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by the General Revenue Fund on September 1, 1943; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.

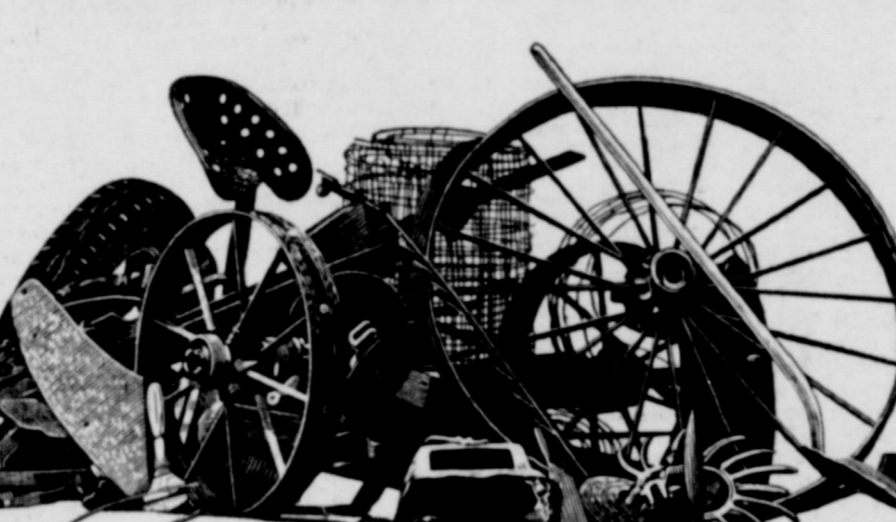
