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

Farmers to Get Aid Through FSA

L. H. Hauter, regional director of the Farm Security Administration, announced here today that instructions have gone to all county rural rehabilitation supervisors for making loans to farmers dropped from WPA rolls in Texas who are eligible under FSA regulations and who have or can arrange to get adequate land to carry on their farming oper-

Instructions to the field force Mr. Hauter said, followed the reent agreement between FSA and WPA to consider for rehabilitation loans farmers dropped from work relief rolls in 12 southern

It was emphasized, however, that the FSA would be able to make loans only to those applicants who had adequate land available for farming or could

"In view of the fact that WPA was forced to reduce its rolls, we are glad that the Farm Security Administration can be of assistance to an additional large number of farmers in Texas," Mr. Hauter said. "Farmers who are eligible under this plan may expect us to make every effort to help them during the months while their regular income from farming is at a minimum."

FSA officials said no estimate former WPA workers who would be covered by the agreement, be cause the number would be de meet the land qualifications. The Farm Security Adminis-

tration's rehabilitation program is designed to get farmers, who are on relief or near relief, back onto their feet. More than 600,000 farmers have been made loans under this program to get a new start. Along with the loans they are given advice on sound operation of their farms. Surveys have shown that although they are made to farmers who cannot get credit elsewhere, the great majority of the borrowers are regaining independence through live-at-home programs and are repaying their loans.

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



Depletion of Soil Resources Not Only Problem

Social Evils Included In Farm Problems Is Belief of FSA Man

The problems of impoverished lands and poor people, deficient schooling, declining church attendance, and economically sound communities are closely allied with the short tenure system in American agriculture, in the opinion of Floyd F. Higbee, farm managmement adviser, in charge of tenure improvement for the Farm Security Administration m Region Twelve.

"The United States," Higbee says, "recently has become alarmed over the rapid depletion of its soil resources. Most research has been centered on land-use adjustment problems and we have often lost sight of the fact that the only reason we need be concerned about these problems i because of their relationship to human welfare and the security of our business life.

"We have become solicitous a bout the erosion of the soil and nave been willing to spend more time and money in correcting it than we have been willing to spend in assisting the human beings liv ing on eroding land to adjust themselves to a new economy where they can attain social and economic security for themselves and their children.

Higbee contends that one of the most direct approaches to a new economy for farm tenants is their farms, adequate leases for



Truck Regulation Is Illinois' Answer to Rural Banditry



Off to market-but with an armed guard on the lookout fer "rustlers"-goes this cattle truck

'ACING a los, in 1938 estimated as high as \$2,000,000 through poultry and livestock stolen from its farmers, the state of Illinois is moving to check the depredations of rural marauders by a special truck law.

The proposed truck law, pre-pared by the state Uniform Motor Vehicle Laws Commission, is scheduled for introduction in the state legislature in January and will, its supporters say, quickly curtail losses from poultry and livestock thefts.

Under the law every truck owner in the state would be required to paint his name, address and a special number assigned by the State Department of Public Works on the side of his truck. A simple form of bill of lading or bill of sale for contents of the truck also will be compulsory

It is expected that such identification would make it easy for police to stop trucks at random and find out quickly where the driver got his load The law's sponsors point out that such a procedure would make the haz-

the truck regulatory law is Representative F. Wood Lewis. "The hunt for criminals in our bigger cities has grown so relentless," says Lewis, "that organized bands of city robbers have been driven out to prey on the comparatively unprotected rural sections. Use of high-speed

makes capture of such criminals

by local deputy sheriffs or con-

stables extremely difficult. "More than \$750,000,000 worth of livestock, poultry and other personal property is thus exposed to these organized bands of criminals who operate with little fear of detection, purusit capture or punishment. Illinois farmers last year lost in stolen poultry alone \$1,486,000. This is more than three times the amount stolen from the 120 banks held up and robbed last year in all parts of the United



WASHINGTON LETTER

Wild Ducks and Geese Increase Due to Bag Limits and We BY SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT

WASHINGTON.-Water fowl hunters in the United States have polished their guns and put them on the rack, except the southern states, where the season ends Dec. 29. Before the ducks and geese fly south again and sportsmen follow, the birds will have been trailed as far south as the jungles of Mexico and as far north as Labrador by scouts of the Department of Agriculture's Bio-

One of the first experiments in balanced economy initiated by the New Deal was an investigation begun in 1933-34 of the "water fowl depression." Largely because of the Department of Agriculture's efforts in this field, there has been a steady increase since 1935 in duck and geese populations.

It was possible during the current hunting season to relax some of the stringent rules in force to protect the birds from greedy sportsmen. When water fowl were plentiful the open lasted about months.

The season was restricted to 30 days last year, and this year was open for 45 days. By limiting each hunter's skill to 10 a day; by outlawing baiting and the use of live decoys; by re-3-shell repeating guns, and by duck and geese refuge projects, the government has reduced the chance that water fowl may become so scarce they will longer be "fair" game.

and the flock is about its business of eating, scratching and laying on a 12-hour schedule, long before daylight. Dusk has settled before the chickens roost and the day ends

at 6 p. m. when the lights are automatically turned off in a new electric "egg factory" in the 164acre farm of Charles Wendig on the Old York Road near here. He anticipates that egg produc-

tion may increase from 10 to 30 cent during the winter months when prices are highest, although it is not expected that the annual production of the hens will be greatly increased.

The poultry farm has been completely electrified with more than a half mile of wiring, and a distribution panel which controls the system of electric brooders. the daily task in a half hour as violet ray lamps, fans. egg cleanars and egg graders.

Electric motors do the work of grinding feed for the chickens and 23 electric lights have been installed in the new modern three-story hen house.

Electrification has extended beyond the poultry plant and the Wendig home is equipped with electric refrigeration, electric dish washers, water heater range, spinner washer and iron-

Eight manufacturers of electrical equipment have combined their knowledge of farm problems to set up a model poultry farm here for experimental pur-

The egg grader, which saves two hours time each day, operates like the glass enclosed scoop shovels which dig into piles of penny prizes at amusement parks. The four buckets automatically pick up the eggs and set them on four scales which operate ejectors to sort the eggs of different weights. 
