ETZATLAN, Jalisco, Mexico, Feb. 11 .- A band of Mexican kianapers have fled into the mountains of Northern Jalisco with two American mining men, seized in a surprise assault of the offices of the Ampara Mine Company here. The kidnaped men are Samuel Sa neuss, assistant manager, and Paus Avery, engineer of the mining company.

George Winter, the American Consul at Guadalajara, said that he had requested the military autherities to withhold troops from pursuit of the bandits until ransom negotiations had been under taken. The kidnapers apparently had advance information as to the identity of the victims, as they picked the pair out from several men in the mine office at the time of the raid.






