

> **Blind To Get Aid Under Social Bill**



Head Play's 1935 record now shows victories over Azucar, winner of the \$100,000 Santa Anita Handicap; Cavalcade, considered one of the best developments in years, and Discovery, Cavalcade's hardy rival of 1934.

Even Head Play's staunchest admirers inever conceded that Mrs. Silas B. Mason's horse was anything better than a superlative mudder-his bad underpinning seemed to mitigate against fast track running-but his Suburban was run over a fast track, refut ing this contention.

Not only that, but Head Play hit the mile and an eighth pole in that race in near world record time. He finished out the mile and a quarter, unpressed by Discovery, in 2:02, fastest time of the year for the distance. Not a dozen horses in American history have equaled or shaded this mark.

Ever since the day three years ago when he won the Hawthorne Juvenile Handicap in Slashing style, Head Play has been a horse of tremendous promise. Yet misfortune has dogged his trail from the beginning, only permitting him to show occasional flast is of his true form.

By GORDON K. SHEARER (UP Staff Correspondent) AUSTIN, June 15 .- It was ust 12 years ago that oil was disovered on land belonging to the University of Texas. In that 12 years it has greased the way for a rapid advance from a small campus, dotted with wooden shacks, to one of the best equipped college plants in existence.

"The benefits of education are essential to the preservation of a free government," wrote Gen. Sam Houston when Texas set up its free government 99 years ago.

So the great expanse of land that came to Texas with its independence was apportioned largely to public schools and to the University of Texas. Income from such lands cannot be spent directly. It goes into permanent funds. The permanent funds are invested and the income from the investments, alone, is available for current use.

When oil was struck on land leased by the University, the land income grew to such size that regents visioned a comprehensive building plan. Tugwell's enemies are licking their chops. They suspect that the Rural Resettlement Administration will prove to be a millstone around the young doctor's neck. Many of Administrator Tugwell's friends

fear exactly the same thing. The RRA is his big part in the workrelief program. Secrecy veils the build-up and the planning activities of the Tugwell organization, on the theory that the less said now, the better. One gathers from what seeps out that this is the most conspic-

uous piece of good judgment of which RRA can yet be accused. It's nothing new to find a New Deal agency floundering around. seeking its bearing. But the character of the personnel being recruited for this one, with a very few outstanding exceptions, is such as to make Tugwell's admirers break into frenquent spasms of tear

No shabbier trick has been pulled in this administration than when the powers wished on Tugwell the expensive, minmanaged Subsistence Homestead program, which seems to stand as New Deal Mess No. 1. It appears now that Dr. Tugwell is trying to wish Subsistence Homesteads back on the Interior Department and it will be well for him if he is spared the head-

ache of liquidating it. He will have enough grief without that.



Such a way of speaking is natural. We seem to be unable to make a hero out of a whole army. And no army is ever much stronger than the man who leads it; if he cannot diffuse some of his own fire and determination into it, it will fail, no matter how brave and sturdy its individual members may be.

And yet there is a great deal of injustice in this habit of ours.

For the real hero of Ypres, like the real heroes of all the other great battles of the World War, was not any bemedaled general. He was a bowed, weary, dirty, nameless private soldier, a man who lived in mud and ate his food, when he got any, in the hideous reek of the battlefield, and endured terror and strain and agony greater than anything even Dante could imagine for his inferno.

This man has never had his just dues. Probably he never will get them, because the only men who can really understand what he went through are the men who stood at his shoulder and suffered with him, and they do not talk much about it.

But we must not forget him when we start talking about the "hero" of this battle or that battle. His were not the mistakes of command. He never sacrificed a company, or a batallion, or a whole army, because of stubborn pride, or misunderstanding of the conditions of modern war, as some of the generals did.

He never sent someone else out to go through a hell that he himself did not have to enter. He was there, in the thick of it. silent and dogged and heroic with a heroism that passes all ordidary understanding.

It is no use trying to learn his name, for there were millions of him. He came from every nation and wore every uniform: he left his bones at Ypres and Cambrai, at Verdun and along the Somme, by the Masurian Lakes and on Gallipoli peninsula.

The glory of war passes him by. The titles and the medals go to the generals. But the real hero of the war was the unsung private soldier.

And there sems to be evidence that the Roman emperors, who wanted to get rid of certain friends or enemies, did not hesitate to administer mushroom poison.

There are more than 80 specles of poisonous mushrooms in this country, the most deadly type being the Amanita phalloides. It is responsible for more than 90 per cent of the deaths from mushroom poisoning.

And there are almost as many tests for poisonous mushrooms. Most are unreliable. The case I have recalled shows that even the silver test, one of the most popular in use, can't be depended upon.






