


I thank you and your citizens for the invitation, and certainly will speak at Memphis during the campaign.

# Returned From the East.

Lakeview, Texas, August 31,09. I. W. Thomason, and family have returned from a trip to Denton County and reports it dry and hot. August 16, 17, and 18 hotter than has been in Denton for years. On the 18th the government thermometer registered 114 at Denton town, and in some parts of the country in Denton the thermometer registered 110 at sun down.

Well about an average for cotton in Denton county will be 10 acres to the bale and just about all open at this writing, Cotton bolls that isn't more one-third grown are drying up and cracking open. To my best judgment about 30 days will wind up the picking of the cotton in Denton county. Corn will possibly make 10 bushels to the acre the county over. Wheat average something like 8 bushels, but was a good grade of wheat. Oats average as near as I could get at about 18 bushels, and was light. We'l as for fruit and vegetable crops were very light, Mr. T. G. George had some fine peaches that I helped to devour. The farmers are preparing to sow large small grain crops this fall but lots of land yet to break, for wheat sowing. I have lived in Denton County for eight years, and left there and came to Hall County, which I like much better and a much better place for a poor man to live. I saw back in Denton lots of my old friends who are in worse shape financially than they were four years ago. I have lived in Hall county four years and can say I had rather live here than any place I ever lived. I bought a home and paid for and improved it in three years. But land is getting a little high now, but will go higher in the near future.
