



Estelline and vicinity received the greatest benefit of any locality in the Area, with one inch of precipitation reported there this morning. Tell reported "an inch or better"

Other localities reported light showers. Memphis had received approximately .15 of an inch this morning according to J. J. Mc-Mickin, and Lakeview and Turkey reported similar showers, with light rains still falling.

The forecast for Memphis and vicinity is continued showers.

Heavy rains were reported by Fort Worth and Denver railroad mail clerks and others coming over the route this morning all the way from Fort Worth to Vernon, with veritable cloudbursts at Henrietta and other points southeast of Wichita Falls. The main body of the rain apparently extended south and east of Memphis.

North and west of here, the precipitation was slight. Snow was reported falling from Claude to Texline in slight proportions, with heavy fall at Trinidad, Colo.

The unpaved highway between Memphis and Amarillo was said to be "slippery" but easily passable and not dangerous.

Light showers fell over most portions of the North Plains, with Pampa and Dumas in the center. The Plains precipitation did not exceed a half inch, however.






