ment canning kitchens in Hall county will begin sometime next week, if equipment continues to arrive and there is no delay in installation work, according to Judge A. C. Hoffman, county relief administrator.

Work in preparing the buildings to house the plants has been going on since Monday of this week and additional equipment has been arriving almost daily.

To Run Nine Weeks

One of the plants will be located in Memphis and one at Turkey. The combined cash outlay for operating labor alone has been set at more than 4,000 for the nine weeks period of operation, as okeyed by the Texas Relief commission recently.

The kitchen will be operated primarily for the purpose of processing cattle purchased on the government's emergency drouth relief program, but canning for individuals will also be done by the two kitchens in the county, it has been pointed out.

Equipment Arriving Pressure cookers, canners and sealers will be used in the two kitchens. Most of the equipment arriving for use in the Hall county plants is being sent from plants that have been discontinued in other sections of the

Laborers for the operation of the plants will be selected from the county relief rolls. Supervisors for the two plants will be selected from non-relief labor, selection to be made jointly by the county administrator, the county agent and the district home demonstration agent, Judge Hoffman has pointed

Labor to Rotate Approximately eight or 10 persons will be employed daily at each of the plants in the county, and laborers will be rotated on the relief work plan in operation in

Announcements as to the exact date for operation to begin will be made later, Judge Hoffman said

USEFULNESS OF BANKHEAD LAW CHANGES

THE fight for the Bankhead Cotton Control law presents a rather strange situation in President Roosevelt's recovery program, which, if one were looking for an opportunity to criticize the New Deal activities, might be called "just another slip-up".

However, one could hardly blame the administration for the circumstances that have caused the entire outlook to be changed.

A few months ago Senator Bankhead introduced a bill in Congress that was designated to cut down on the amount of cotton raised in order to wipe out a price-ruining surplus. The plan of the bill was to prevent the farmers of the south from raising too much cotton.

Now, Senator Bankhead and others favor suspension of the law because the cotton raising industry as a whole cannot possibly equal the allowable under the law, anyway.

But we have a different idea about the matter. We consented to cut down our cotton because of the good it would do the industry. Now we are depending, in many cases, upon the cotton that we "do not raise" rather than that we do produce to carry us over this winter.






