

STRIKES, which thus far in our story of civilization seems to be a necessary evil that goes hand in hand with industry, entered the Panhandle this week when unions of oil workers in the Pampa field staged a walk-out in an attempt to gain recognition and as the result of controversies over contracts and verious issues evolving from NRA.

At the same time, the oil companies involved armed themselves with injunctive writs to prevent the striking workers from interfering with their activities.

However, the two companes involved did not attempt to renew activities yesterday and the situation was still peaceful. But when they do re-open, legal maneuvering probably will not get very far in preventing the strikers from interfering if they so desire. Although they have the law on their side, there is not a great deal the companies can do to halt this interference. Guards may be stationed about; tear gas probably will be brought into play; a number of people will be injured and perhaps a few killed before either side will agree to compromise, if this strike follows the usual trend.

EXPERTS STILL BELIEVE IN BATTLESHIPS

DECISION on America's ship-building policy at the taking off wet clothing. The child ance, because it determines the coming disarmament conference is complicated by the fact that there is still a good deal of uncertainty about the type of ships the American navy ought

Naval authorities in the main stand firm for a fleet built about a strong nucleus of capital ships, or battleships, seasoned by a considerable number of heavy cruisers. Yet there is a wide belief that the battleship has outlived its usefulness, and that the terrific expense of maintaining these costly vessels is one the navy might very well avoid.

Add to this the growing feeling that airplanes and submarines are revolutionizing naval warfare, and you have a situation in which decision on a naval program would be difficult enough, even if it were not necessary to adjust our program to the programs of foreign powers.

A good exposition of the theory that the battleship is still the backbone of the fleet came recently in a public address by Read Admiral Joseph K. Taussig, acting chief of naval operations.

America, says Admiral Taussig, needs the battleship because of its lack of naval bases-the battleship, with its wealth of heavy guns, serving as a kind of floating base which can protect lighter ships against superior forces.

Furthermore, says Admiral Taussig, the improvement of the submarine and aerial branches of naval warfare has made the battleship even more indespensable than before. It is the only warship which can be armored and protected sufficiently to withstand

the shock of bombs and torpedoes. Here we have a brief and understandable outline of the majority viewpoint in the navy; and it is worth reading, as an antidote to the free and easy talk one constantly hears about the obsolescence of the battle-
