No Worksheets, ... No Subsidy

Farms not covered by worksheets under the 1937 farm program must be covered before their owners can draw subsidy on the 1937 crop, a letter re-ceived late last week by County Agent R. E. L. Pattillo from the state agricultural office revealed.

Mr. Pattillo is urging all farmers whose land was not covered by worksheets during 1937 to turn in that information at their very earliest convenience. Between 200 and 250 farmers have not been signed, he said.
