INSPECTION IS UNDERWAY

Rural Aid and Standardization To Be Decided Upon

Official inspection of Hall county rural schools for rural aid and standardization began yesterday morning, with Bryan Dickson, district deputy state superintendent, in charge of inspection. Visits and inspections of every school in the county, except Memphis schools, will be made during the 10 day inspection tour.

With every school prepared and their school work under full swing, it is believed by local school officials that 21 out of the 22 rural schools in the county will be standardized this year. If this expectation is true, it is likely that this county will have the largest number of standardized schools in the state. Hall county was second in number and first in percentage of counties with standardized schools last year with 19 standard scale schools out of 20 applicants.

Yesterday visits were made to the Gammage, Newlin, and Salisbury schools, and today the inspection party will visit the Webster, Brice and Churchman schools. The party was entertaiend at the noon hour yesterday with a luncheon at Newlin, prepared by the Home Economics class. Entertainments and programs are being given at (Continued on page 8)

COUNTY SCHOOL Bankhead Vote Is Set December 14

Wooden Gun? We've Heard That One Before!

LONGVIEW, Dec. 4. - The Dinninger wooden gun stunt failed to work here yesterday, Johnny Bowman, sentenced

Bowman was convicted here wo weeks ago and was being held in the Gregg county jail pending transfer to the state

Friday, Dec. 14, has been definitely set as the date for the national referendum on the Bankhead cotton bill, according to notification received this morning by County Agent James

A. Jackson. The nation-wide vote will be taken to see whether or not participating cotton farmers desired the enforcement of the Bankhead bill in 1935. There is little doubt that the bill will carry in Hall county by a big majority. Mr. Jackson said this morning, but the biggest difficulty in this county will be in getting out a representative vote.

Thirteen polling boxes will be established in this county, and it has been estimated that approximately 2,850 farmers will be eligible to vote.

In pointing out the necessity of a full vote, Mr. Jackson emphasized the fact that the vote will not be tabulated by counties or states, but will be figured on the popular vote on a nation-wide scale. "The need of the Bankhead bill in Hall county next year is apparent, but we want to impress the farmer with the need of his vote to help carry the national vote" Mr. Jack-



NO REDUCTION IN STATE EXPENSES

ACCORDING to members of the senate tax investigating committee, there is not likely to be any reduction in the cost of government by the forty-fourth regular session of the Texas Legislature. In their opinions taxes already have been reduced as far as possible without injuring departments and other in-

The forty-third session reduced expenses between 12 million and 13 million dollars, including a cut of two millions in salaries. It is likely that the next session will not increase expenditures, but neither is it apt to consider reducing them further.

T. J. Holbrook of Galveston, member of the commission, believes no reductions will be justifiable.

"It must be remembered," he said, "that Texas has grown to a remarkable extent, that we have developed many resources and industries, that we have 6,000,000 population, 254 counties and great systems of highways, railroads, buses, trucks, oil and gas fields and agricultural pursuits. Perhaps more important than all this is the stopping of tax leaks. Senator A. P. Duggan, chairman of the tax investigating committee, is pinning much faith in the plugging of these leaks as the means of covering the enormous deficit in the general revenue. If the majority of these leaks were stopped, the government would receive huge sums that heretofore have not been obtainable and at the same time would not increase the burden of the average citizen. In fact, when that is done, then the tax burden might be lightened without crippling any of the state's executive departments.

VICE-PREMIER Stanley Baldwin of England tells a Glasgow audience that Great Britain's fleet will never be used in the armed blockade of any country on earth until the government has first consulted the United States government. 









