THIS WEEK the Memphis Chamber of Commerce, through the cooperation of Memphis retail firms, attempted to launch an intense trade-at-home patronage drive. Such a drive is not entirely new in the realms of smaller cities, whose merchants often suf- fer the loss of their own patrons to near-by cities. Since the beginning of better highway construction such a trend in trading away from home has been active.

Even though such conditions have been existing for many years, and even though merchants, newspapers and civic leaders have preached "Trade at Home," in their most forceful efforts, the practice has never been completely halted . . . and perhaps never will be.

Facts regarding dollars spent in other cities have failed to impress Memphis shoppers. On many occasions local citizens have made purchases in other cities with the belief that they could not obtain the item or article in Memphis. Many times they are entirely innocent of the local merchant's stock because he has failed to advise them that he has the exact article in his store at perhaps even less money.

In part, some merchants have permitted this tradeaway-from-home trend to exist, through their failure to encourage local patronage both in advertising and rendering prompt service once the customer has called at the store. 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UNEMPLOYED ESTIMATED AT 264,000

T HAS BEEN PREDICTED that Texas' unem-¹ ployed total will be approximately 264,000, when the final figures of the Federal census is announced. This estimate will give Texas a ranking of eleventh in the United States. The estimate, computed on a state population of 6,150,000, gives Texas an equivalent of 4.3 of its total population on the unemployed list. Considering the size of Texas as compared with Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and other states with larger unemployed rolls, the estimate places this state exceedingly high in economic revival.

The normally unemployed in Texas is about 18,450.

WASHINGTON LETTER_ Financing New Farm Bill Adds to Worries of Special Session BY SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT

WASHINGTON, Nov. -The tight in Congress over the farm bill is on. But agriculture officials here do not expect any tinal action on farm legislation until the regular session which will follow the current or special session. They believe Congress is willing to give the country a new farm law, but that there will be debate and delay before a decision is reached on the point of how the cost of farm legisla-

tion shall be met. When the Senate bill reached the floor, Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg of Michigan, Republican, pointed to the section on appropriations which reads in part: "Beginning with the fiscal year commencing July 1, 1938, there is hereby authorized to be appropriated, for each fiscal year for the administration of this Act and for the making of Soil Conservation Act payments and parity payments under this Act. such sums as are necessary."

Senator Vandenberg protested that the bill as presented to the enate does not specify how much money is needed or for what purpose it is to be used.

Senator Ellison D. Smith of South Carolina, chairman of the Senate Committee on Agriculture amused his colleagues more than informed them with his answer "Well, I don't know what the new farm program will cost. It will be on a sort of sliding scale."

WHATEVER is finally agreed upon as a fair estimate of the cost of the new farm legislation, there will be much difference of opinion over whether it should be paid for by processing taxes or by a general sales tax.

Chairman Marvin Jones of the House Agriculture Committee is tavor of a processing tax, while Chairman Ellison D. Smith of the Senate Agriculture Committee is opposed to this method. It is fairly representative of con-

gressional sentiment on the question that one of the secret votes taken in the House Agriculture Committee to decide whether a processing tax on wheat should be recommended was 14 to 8 against that measure. . . .

SECRETARY of Agriculture Henry Wallace and agriculture officials believe a processing tax is the way out. With the assurance that there will be \$500 .-000,000 to spend on the farm program and the fore-knowledge that it will cost from \$250,000,000 to \$500,000,000 more to complete the program, they reason that a processing tax would raise the necessary funds by building up the consumer-price of commodities for which the market price is low.

To objections that this is unfair to the consumer their answer is that any price increase is a tax on the consumer, but that it is better for the consumer in the end to be required to pay 1/3 cent more for a loaf of bread because a processing tax on wheat had been imposed, than to pay a sales tax of 1 cent more for every loaf of bread. This widespread tax on sales they insist boosts the price of farm products and manufactured articles alike, and in many cases increases prices which are already unreasonably high.

There is provision in the Senate bill for payments to farmers who cooperate in soil conservation programs, and its authors claim for the law that it will provide an adequate and balanced flow of cotton, wheat, corn, tobacco and rice in interstate and foreign commerce. The methods suggested for achieving that end so closely resemble those employed in the outlawed Agricultural Adjustment Act that the question of its constitutionality is certain to be brought up trequently in the fight ahead.
