TRACTOR PROVES PRACTICAL FOR **CULTIVATING CROP**

Local Dealer Demonstrates Practibility of Tractor in Crop Cultivation.

C. A. Powell, manager of the ion, has proven by actual demonstration that the tractor he sells is practical for use in making a crop in this section and that the use of teams is not necessary.

The demonstration was conducted upon 80 acres of land just west of town; the following operations being performed:

First. Cutting stalks. This work was performed with two ordinary horse implements, in about one-fourth of the time it could have been done with a team.

Second. Listing. A two-row lister was used and about 30 acres a day listed.

Third. Re-listing and planting cotton. This work was done at about the same rate of speed as the first listing. Fourth. Harrowing. The 80

An organization of Christian workers, co-operating with the activities of the Hall County Red Cross Public Health Nurse. Organized in December, 1920; operated under an adopted form; outlined by Miss Anne F. Pritchett, Hall County Fublic Health Nurse, and R. B. Morgan, Chamber of Commerce Secretary.

This Association was organized for the purpose of caring for the charitable sick, assisting the needy in any way, promoting in a general way the prevention of disease, and stands for and promotes any proposition that tends toward the betterment of the citizenship of Hall County.

CONSTITUTION AND BY LAWS

Adopted Sept., 1921 CONSTITUTION.

Art. I This organization shall be called the Hall County Public Welfare Association.

Art. II. The purpose of the Association is to increase and render more effective service in Public Welfare, Social Service and Relief Work. (Relief work outside of County given as deemed by the Mayor and Advisory Board profitable to our interests.)

Art III. The members of the Association shall consist of members of the different churches of the town and County who desire to co-operate in the activities for which this organization stands.

Art, IV. The Executive Board shall consist of Pastors, Doctors, Presidents and Secretaries of Women's Organizations of the churches,-also, Superintendents or Lead ers of Young People's Societies and a layman from each church appointed by the pastor. Seven shall constitute a quorum of the Board of Directors.

Art. V. (a) From the Board of Directors shall be appointed an Advisory Board or Committee composed of five members, three of whom shall constitute a quorum, This committee shall have active and general control over the business of the Association, except when it is especially intrusted to others, and shall see that the purposes for which the Association has been organized, are fully and liberally earried out; and they shall have power to make rules and regulations with reference to the character and advise amount of help that will be given in cases or relief.

Art. V. (b). For each town in the County there shall be appointed a member of the Advisory Board who will be representative in his (or her) community to report and supervise those instances needing assistances.

Art. VI. The finances of the Association shall be put in the keeping of a finance committee who will promote plans to meet the financial demands of the Associa-

Art. VII. The officers of the Az sociation shall be President, Vicepresident, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Supervisor of Relief Work, and Supervisor of Social Service Reforms. All officers shall be etected by ballot at the regular bus-

iness meeting in December.

Art. VIII. This constitution may be changed at any regular meeting of the Association, provided proper public notice of the proposed change has been given.

BY-LAWS.

Art. I. The regular monthly meeting shall be held on the third Tuesday night, of each month, for the purpose of reports, conferences, and study of welfare con-

Called meetings may be held at any time at the call of the President or Public Health Nurse.

Art. II. Duties of Officers. The president shall preside at all meetings of the Association, Board of Directors, and called meetings of the Advisory Board, and shall be the executive head of the Association.

The Vice-president shall co-operate with the President of the As socition and, in the absence of the President, shall assume full duties and authority.

The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct all correspondence of the Association and shall do the regular corresponding to the county papers concerning the work of this body.

The Recording Secretary shall keep correct minutes of all meetings of the Assocation and Board of Directors and see that the meetings are properly announced, and officers of the Association are properly notified prior to each meeting.

The Treasurer shall receive all funds paid into the Association and shall keep a correct account of all receipts and disbursements. All funds paid out by the Treasurer shall be by the order of the President. A report of the financial condition shall be made at each monthly meeting.

The Supervisor of Relief Work shall have charge of the local relief situation and all instances of need or opportunities of service coming to the notice of the Red cross Nurse or any of the members of the Associatin shall be reported to the Supervisor of Relief, who shall notify the proper officers where these instances are related to anyone of the different church-... In event of no church relationship, the case; shall be reported to the Advisory Board and they shall apportion the help to be rendered as is wise and necessary. The Superintendent of the Department of the Women's Socities of the Churches shall compose a committee to assist the Supervisor of Relief Work.

The Superintendent of Social Service Reforms shall become thoroughly informed regarding all laws concerning civic improvement, moral conditions, and with a representative from each church, shall form a committee to put into effect any movements that will tend to make our community the very best, socially, physically and spiritually.

Art. III. Any member of the Association is at liberty any time to present plans or means by which we may launch enterprises for the welfare of the public.

Art. IV. These By-laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Board of Directors.

Report of Work Done.

We take pleasure in informing the public of the activities in which the Association has been engaged since its organization and invite your earnest consideration of the progress made.

The relief situtation claimed our first attention, and severe cases of illness including seventeen operations have been cared for, with the loyal support financially of the County Commissioners. (Fifteen of these seventeen operations were from the various communities of Hall County.) Every call for aid brought to the notice of the Associatin is investigated by the Advisory Board and assistance giv en (or not) as is justifiable. The many cases needing the attention of a physician, and the counsel of the Public Health Nurse neces tated a permanent place where the work might be carried on properly. Realizing this would be a great asset to public welfare, the Association secured rooms, one door north of the Willard Battery Station on 7th Street-an ideal lo eation for a "Health Center." The office of the Public Health Nurse is here, also rooms where children may be weighed and measured, a table of literature to aid parents as a guide to health, and equipment for performing operations.

The Hostesses for the Health Center are Mrs. B. F. Shepherd, Mrs. Ed. Lofland, Mrs. R. A. Bos ton and Mrs. W. H. Lindsey, who with volunteer assistants will keep the Health Center open.

A Growth Class or Health Clinic for children of pre-school age on Tuesday, for school children on Thursday and Saturday as Rural Day is one of the features of the Health Center.

A Child Health Conference was held at the Health Center in May under the supervision of Miss Pinkney, who is sent out by the State Board of Health. Seventysix children were examined in the two days. Volunteers assisted Miss Pritchett in conducting the Conference. These Clinics will be held regularly and will be of real benefit to the parents and children.

The Public Health Welfare Association desires to serve, and we want you to include the Health Center in your plans when in Memphis.

We have a great County Program including every community interest; so give public health and the best interests of the children first place.

The Association desires to co operate with every public movement for the good of our town and County, and appreciates the cooperation thus far of the Council, Chamber of Commerce, County Commissioners, and those doctors and workers who have assisted in earrying on the work.
