Information as to formula and how to best use this poison may be secured from Mr. Pattillo.

A bill appropriating \$630,000,-000 has been completed by the House for the Federal Agriculture Department and Farm Credit Administration during the year starting July 1. The measure goes to the President for his signature. The biggest item in the bill is an appropriation of \$500, 000,000 for benefit payments to farmers participating in a soil conservation program.

The Federal Senate appropria tions committee voted an additional \$3,335,000 for Western reclamation projects; \$2,008,965 for the bureau of Indian Affairs, and \$2,523,500 for national park service. The respective amounts for these major interior department units, including the committee's increases now stand at: Reclamation, \$42,316,600; Indian Affairs \$33,104,013, and National Parks, \$21,134,880.
