Think of the corn and seed and hogs to come from the east, and the cotton and grain and cattle from the west, all seeking a market in the Queen City of the Red River Valley! Attracted by the modern church buildings, the influence of high grade schools, and the abundance of pure water flowing in crystal purity right into our homes, many people will seek locations here where everything points to peace, plenty and prosperity.

Not many years ago numbers of people spent one day out of six hauling water to use, and now the money value of lost time, wasted energy, and unnecessary hard work on man and team, in getting the products of the farms to market, and getting fuel and supplies back home would be sufficient to build a road from Wellington to the Cap Rock.

A railroad passing east and west through or nearby the rich farming land now idle and unproductive, would change the face of the country.
