

LONESOME SOLDIER WRITES HOME FOLK

Says He Doesn't Like to Recall Unpleasant Experiences of The War.

> Flogny, France December 12.

Dear Home-Folks Just wrote a letter home a few days ago but will write again.

Dad, I received your letter of 11-18th. this evening, of course was proud as usual to get it. I feel awful lonesome and blue tonight, kid-like, guess I am getting pretty homesick. Looks like ought to overcome such childsh ness but I don't suppose I will, and I don't care if I don't; because I have had enough of run ning around and when I get back

I am going to try to do something. Papa, you mentioned my writing of my experiences. Well, in the first place, I don't like to recall them, and that sort of thing is hard to write about, you can't seem to express what you want to, you have to make it too brief. have written you something about what happened but I am in hopes that I will get to come home soon, and you know I wont forget anything. If I should attempt to write it the story would be old when I get home and attempt to

Well Dad, we are having some of France's "beautiful" weather it seems. It has been cloudy continuously for over a week now. raining more or less all the time. It is naturally inclined to be muddy here anyway, so you can immagine how disagreeable it is. I have just been listining to the wind howling through the cracks, you know how it sounds when it is cold and it has an inclination to make one lonesome; especially when one is far away from home in a srange land among strangers who speak a strange tongue. There is a fire-place in my room and I have a big fire in it and have been sitting with my head in my hands gazing into the flames drawing mental pictures. I imagined could see the folks at home sitting around the stove, about this time at night, getting ready for bed. Little Helen sitting on mama's lap while she is being undressed and her night-gown being put on, old Joe, wanting Dady to untie his shoe; Edward, Sis, and Myrtle all getting ready for bed. There sits old Dad with his magazine on his lap, but he has fallen asleep.

Well this kind of stuff is not much news or much of a letter for you but it is just like I feel.

I understand that our President is to land in France tomorrow, I surely hope that peace will be signed before long. I also hear that Germany wants more time but I can't see why she should need more than was provided for when armistice was signed.

I suppose, Papa, that Gooch's folks have learned the troth about Glenn by now. It makes me feel bad to think of what happened; but of course, some had to pay the price for Sam Hamilton was here from freedom and liberty.
