





TREE PROGRAM FOR 1936 IS ANNOUNCED

Set Nearly \$2,000,000 Aside for Work

There has been allotted \$1,-990,958 from the Emergency Relief Appropriation funds to carry on the 1936 Shelterbelt program, Director Paul H. Roberts announced today. With the allotment, it is planned to plant about 1400 miles of shelterbelt srips and 6400 acres of farmstead planting.

This allotment of ERA funds, i is estimated, will furnish approximately 700,000 man days of la bor during the Fiscal Year 1936. With the exception of a limited number of technical supervisory and facilitating personnel, employment will be from the Federal relief rolls and from the nearest available sourse to the locations where the work is to be done. The relief laborers will be paid semi monthly, at wages prescribed by the Federal Relief Administrator for the locality in which the men are working. The maximum period of employment will be during the spring planting, but there will be considerable employment during the fall and winter in the nurseries, and for ground preparation, fencing, and other incidental work.

The State Directors will be in direct charge of the work in their respective States. They have been authorized to start acquiring land for planting under a cooperative arrangement made with AAA administrator, to use lands in cluded in crop reduction contracts for shelterbelt planting. These lands will be used whenever an agreement can be reached with the landowner and a lease-option agreement secured, which will pro-vide for purchase or extension of the lease of slected lands, at a stipulated price, should the Government desire later to exercise the option.

The nursery stock for the 1936 planting program is now being the Shelterbelt States, Barring unforseen climatic disaster or insect infestation, an ample supply of seedling will be available for next spring's planting.
