## General Exam-Survey for Dam Promised

### County's First Fat Stock Show Is Saturday

Plans have been completed for the first annual fat stock show to be held here Saturday, sponsored by Riley W. Carlton, Walter Labay, and Roy Dunlap, vocational agriculture instructors at Memphis, Estelline, and Lakeview, respectively, and R. E. L. Pattillo, director of 4-H Clubs in the county.

Approximately 80 calves and 40 hogs have been entered in the show. They will be brought to the show grounds, located on the site of the old Roberts & Olver Lumber Co. on East Main street, Friday night. The exhibition will open at 9 o'clock Saturday morning. Judging will be made by J. K. Edwards, agricultural agent for district 3, and will begin at 11 a. m.

Around \$125 will be awarded in premiums, numbering 24 in all. \$112.50 will be given by the Memphis Chamber of Commerce, to be supplemented by prizes made possible by Estelline and Lakeview merchants. The chamber of commerce has also ordered ribbons to be awarded.

### Criminal Cases Tried in District Court This Week

Herman Ellis Sentenced to Penitentiary; 90 Days Given Lamkin to Perfect Appeal

The third week of the present term of district court opened here Monday morning with the impaneling of the jury by Judge A. S. Moss. Cases on the criminal docket were brought up for trial this week, and will probably continue through the fourth week of court, it was stated.

John Lamkin, charged with operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated, was found guilty by the jury and received a sentence of 90 days in jail and a \$200 fine. Defendant gave notice of appeal; request for 90 days to perfect appeal was granted by the court.

The jury returned a verdict of guilty in the case of the State of Texas vs. Herman Ellis, alias "Black Diamond," charged with assault with intent to murder. A sentence of two years in the penitentiary was given.

The trial of Raymond Ballew charged with assault with intent to murder was still in progress Thursday morning.

### Attend Funeral Of Brother-In-Law

Sam Forkner of this city, in company with his son John Forkner of Amarillo went to Leon, Okla., Thursday of last week to attend the funeral of Albert Porter, a brother-in-law of J. F. J. S., and Sam Forkner of this city.

The Federal government is interested in the proposed dam on the Upper Red River and has promised an early examination and preliminary survey. That is the report brought back from Washington early this week by a delegation of the Upper Red River Valley Flood and Irrigation District.

### RANCHMAN NEAR MEMPHIS AIDS PASTURE LAND BY CONTOUR WORK

Within two growing seasons, one of which was unfavorable, grass spreading from native sod has almost covered a large dam constructed on the F. A. Finch ranch, eight miles south of Hedley and about the same distance west of Memphis, early in 1936, the Soil Conservation Service reports.

Finch, who owns 13 sections of range land, was facing a serious erosion problem in 1935 when the Soil Conservation Service demonstration camp was established at Memphis. Water, rushing down the steep slopes which had become denuded of much of the vegetation during the continued drought, was causing sheet erosion and gullying. Spots of the range were also becoming susceptible to wind erosion.

Working in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service in an effort to solve his erosion problem, Finch contour furrowed some of his range land to hold the water where it fell so that it might seep into the soil to improve grass growth.

Then, early in 1936, he constructed a dam to catch the excess rainfall that ran down the slopes, thereby checked the cutting of gullies by the runoff water and at the same time created a pond for the use of his livestock.

Finch fenced the dam to prevent the structure being damaged by the trampling of livestock, and then sodded the barren dyke to provide protection against both water and wind erosion which might destroy its usefulness.

The dam was spot sodded with native buffalo and blue grasses in the Spring of 1936, the clumps of grass being placed a foot and a half apart. Sweet clover was planted on the structure to add nitrogen to the soil and to aid in grass growth.

Although the 1936 growing season was unusually dry, 95 per cent of the sod survived and made a fair growth, Superintendent J. T. Reese of the Memphis Soil Conservation Service camp reports.

With improved moisture conditions in 1937, the grass spread almost solidly over the dam and now provides good protection against both water and wind erosion.

Finch has increased his pasture grasses by the use of contour furrows, and the dam provides a pond of water for use by his livestock. At the same time, gully and sheet erosion have been checked by the soil conservation structures.

Superintendent Reese reports that 53 stock water ponds and 38 dams for the control of runoff water have been constructed by farmers in the Memphis demonstration camp area in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service.

Texas political leaders in Washington. The delegates were guests of Congressman Jones at a luncheon in the House dining room Thursday noon with interested officials present. Discussion of plans for a dam on the upper Red River lasted long after the luncheon period and drew the support of Senator Sheppard, chairman of the Senate's Military Affairs Committee; Congressman Mansfield, chairman of the Rivers and Harbors Committee of Congress; and Congressman Rayburn, a powerful Democratic House leader and supporter of the Red River project at Denison. This discussion, Mr. Dunbar points out, resulted in the passing of the resolution by the Rivers and Harbors Committee late Friday afternoon. The resolution, on stationery of the Committee on Rivers and Harbors, House of Representatives U. S., was as follows:

Resolved by the Committee on Rivers and Harbors of the House of Representatives, United States, That the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors created under section 3 of the Rivers and Harbors Act, approved June 13, 1902, be, and is hereby, requested to review the reports on Red River, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, and Texas, submitted in House Document Numbered 378, Seventy-fourth Congress, second session, and in previous documents, with a view to determining if improvements in the interest of navigation, flood control, water power, or irrigation is advisable at this time, and particularly with a view to construct dams on the upper section of the river and the tributaries.

Adopted February 25, 1938. Attest: J. H. McGann, Clerk. This action, on the part of the House committee, automatically called for an examination of the plans and preliminary survey to be conducted by the Federal army engineers at an early date. Such surveys are made under the direction of the Senate's Military Affairs Committee of which Morris Sheppard is chairman, it is understood.

### FOOTBALL DISTRICT IS DIVIDED

**WHEN SCHOOL OFFICIALS** of district 3-B met last week and elected to divide the district into halves they deprived Memphis fans of several quarters of grid thrills during the 1938 season. However, depending on the point of view, it may save them considerable shame.

In placing Memphis in the half with Clarendon, Lakeview and Wellington, the Cyclone team of 1938 may be deprived of the opportunity to seek revenge at the expense of Shamrock, who all but smothered the locals last season. Wellington, regional champion, is expected by "drug-store authorities" to repeat again next season, which, if proven true, will remove Memphis from the race early. At the same time fans may look for Clarendon's reorganized eleven and Lakeview's ever-strong Eagles to provide a few of the season's major upsets.

The north half, composed of McLean, Lefors, Mobeetie, Wheeler and Shamrock, is expected to afford 3-B fans a full season of thrills. Three strong teams are standouts and the winner will be no push-over for Wellington in the playoff tilt.

The Democrat doesn't claim to be an authority on America's favorite sport nor can it attempt to predict the season's result this early. Stringing along with the drug store crowd doesn't mean this newspaper is against the locals, but, this is intended to be a fair warning to the Cyclone squad of '38 as to what will happen if it doesn't put forth its very best at all times.

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### INDUSTRIAL EXPANSION FOR MEMPHIS?

**IN A RECENT ISSUE** of Texas Weekly it was pointed out that the process industries spent nearly sixty million dollars more for construction and modernization in the South during 1936 and 1937 than in all the rest of the country. The same publication shows that, with the exception of Florida, more money was spent for construction by the process industries in Texas during the period than in any other state of the Union.

"... the present trend of industry is toward the small town, the little city of around 5,000 population." Memphis considers itself within the "little city" classification and it goes without saying that the smallest of industrial expansion here would greatly benefit this entire area of Texas. Hall County this year produced near 50,000 bales of cotton. Enough cotton to encourage prospective mills to locate where the raw material is abundantly obtainable.

The Democrat agrees with the Texas Weekly when it says, "... some method of concentrating industry-seeking activities in Texas needs to be devised." Memphis and Hall County must seek industrial expansion. We must not stand by while industry is seeking new locations, but must invite prospective factories, mills and industries to locate where water is ample, climate is favorable, factory sites are available at reasonable rates and where they are most wanted.

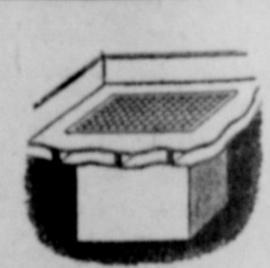

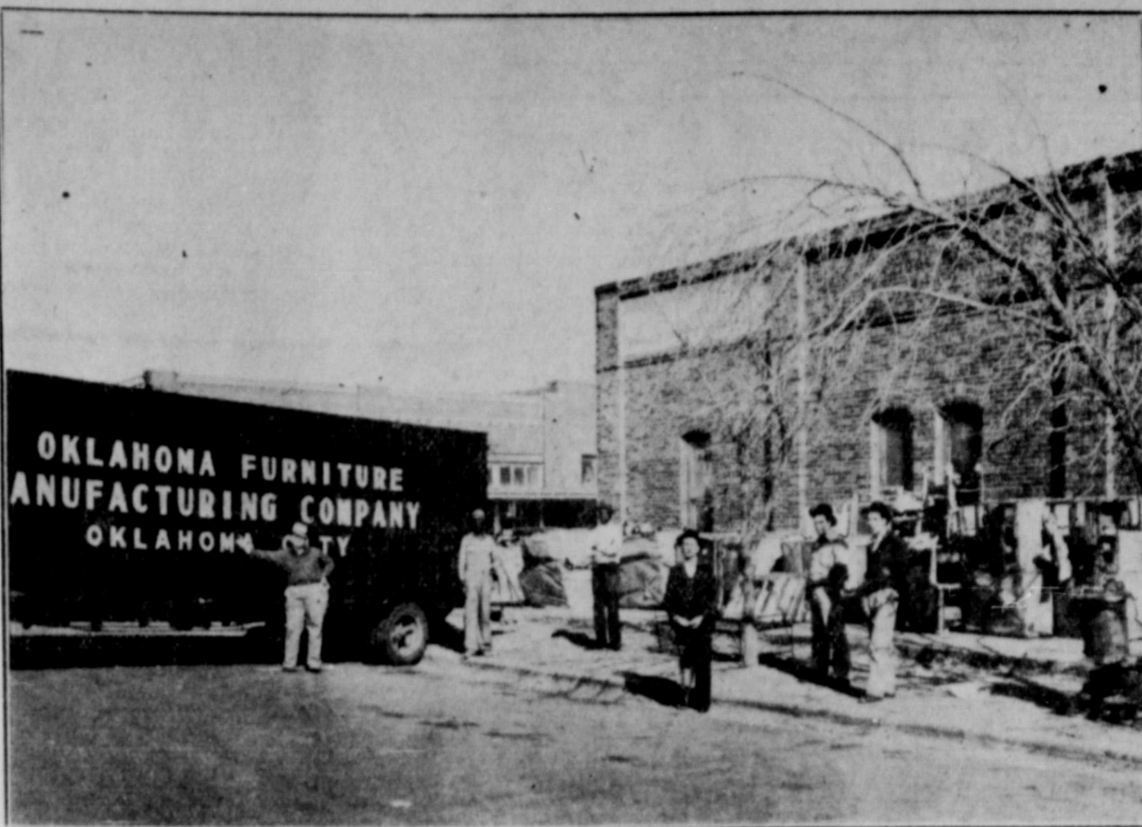

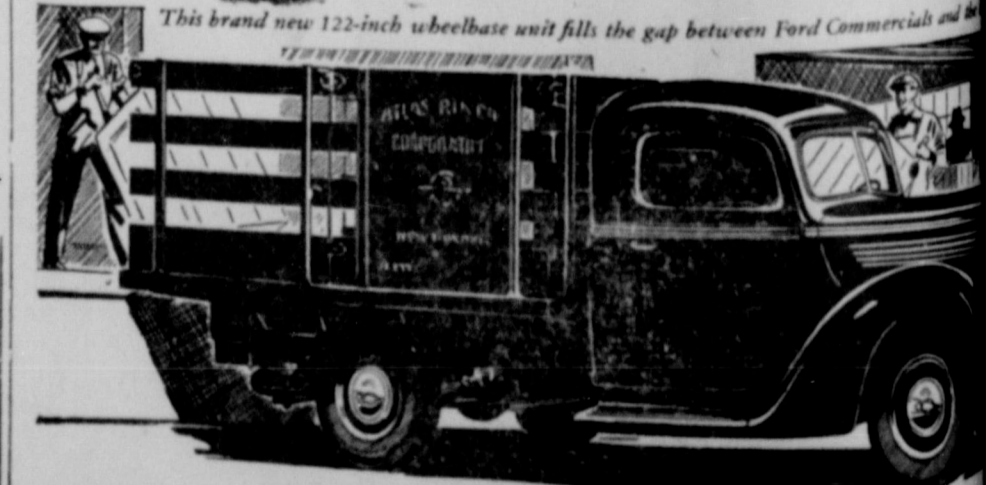
