THE CATTLE SITUATION IS 'SERIOUS'

WITH approximately 4,000 head of cattle listed for sale by the government under its drouth relief program in Hall county and others being listed almost continuously, take it from James A. Jackson, county agricultural agent, that the situation is still serious.

This is the case despite the fact that the county was recently granted a purchase of 500 head. Mr. Jackson states that it is not necessary that every one of the 4,000 head be disposed of, perhaps, but that unless most of them are purchased by the government they are likely to face starvation this winter.

This is nothing new on the cattle ranges during the past few years. But this situation, combined with the condition in Childress county, gives us a firsthand example of the manner in which the administration of such government affairs blunders along, apparently never realizing the facts of the situation.

In the last appropriation by counties, both Hall and Childress received orders for the purchase of 500 head each. While the ranchers of this county are wondering how they are going to save their stock, Childress county, which raises far fewer cattle than are maintained in Hall, is wondering where it is going to find 500 cows.




