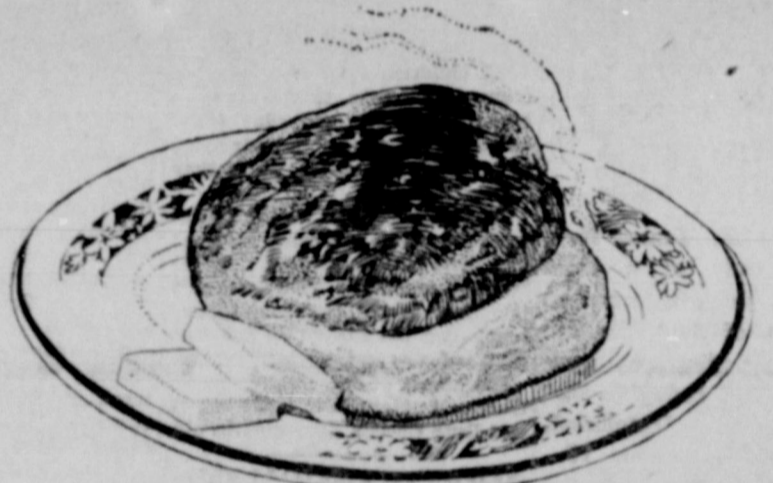

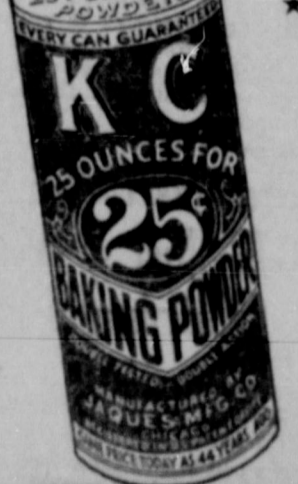

NEGRO SCHOOL OPENS LAST MONDAY

55 Are Enrolled in Morningside; Has Two Teachers

The Morningside negro school was opened for enrollment of the first term's work on Monday, November 5. The teachers for the school this year will be Carl Shelton, principal, and Mrs. Henry Anderson, assistant. Fifty-five students have been placed on roll up to date and it is thought that a considerable increase in attendance will be made within the next few days. Last year the complete enrollment for the school was 65 students.

The local negro school offers courses in grades from one to seven and teaches the same work as the ordinary school. The school is divided into two rooms, one of them made up of grades one, two and three, and the other, the fourth, fifth, sixth, and seventh. Mrs. Anderson has charge of the first three, and Mr. Shelton the latter four.

The building has been worked over this year and considerable improvements have been made. All the inside of the building has been ceiled and redecorated and many repairs have been taken care of. The material which was required for the ceiling of the interior was obtained when the Fair Park association tore down some of their buildings on the local park property. The exterior of the house will probably be painted in the near future, which will take care of the only present lacking improvement. The school has practically new blackboards and a good stove has been installed.

According to Principal Shelton, the school is making rapid progress this term and many new methods in classroom procedure are being inaugurated. This year the school is using standardized

Laboratories Move To Bottom Floor; Change Beneficial

A change was made in the High school this week when the chemistry and physics laboratories were transferred from the third story of the building to the bottom floor. The switch will prove very beneficial to both the faculty and the students.

The change was necessary for several reasons. In the first place both the chemistry and physics laboratory classes were crowded before and the new locations provide more room. It will be possible to have only two laboratory sections instead of three and arrangements have been made so that both the science classes will have their own lecture rooms. Previously the chemistry classes were forced to attend lecture classes in part of the building away from the laboratory.

During the past few weeks it has been necessary for the seniors to meet in a separate study hall from 11:30 to 12 each morning due to the fact that the regular study hall is not large enough to accommodate the entire student body at one time. Since the physics laboratory has been moved down stairs, the library will be moved into the old physics room and a reading room will be provided. With a sufficient number of

students using the reading room it will be possible for the seniors to occupy the study hall and avoid studying in a class room during the 20 minute period before the noon hour.

It will prove beneficial to the teachers due to the fact that it will be possible for Mr. Gore and Mr. Cowan to remain on the ground floor during the greater part of the day.

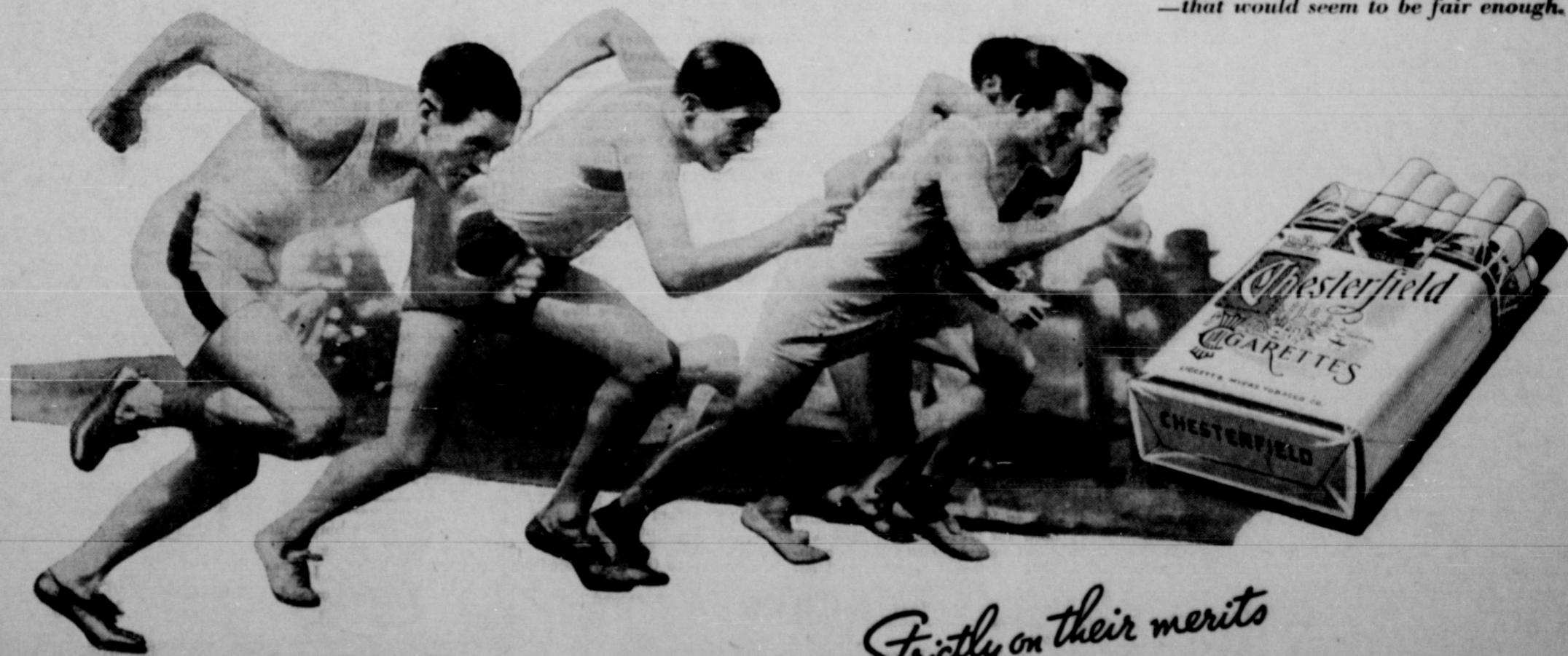

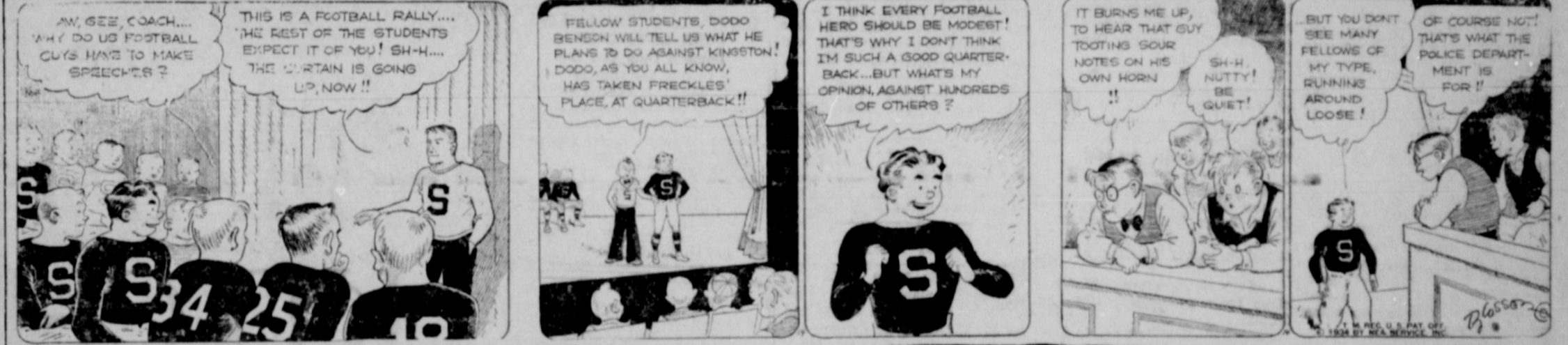
