



IT is obvious that alcohol is the occasion of an immense amount of propagandism. For many years those who favor total abstinence and who have been opposed to the liquor traffic have carried on extensive and highly organized propagandism, while of late years propagandism in defense of the traffic or in advocacy of moderate drinking has also been extensive, if not on an equal

Propagandism in itself is neither good nor bad. Education, the preaching of the gospel, movements for better social conditions, advertising, and publicity are all forms of propagandism.

Effort to distort or to overstate the facts either against, or in favor of, the drinking of alcoholic beverages will in the long run defeat the purpose of the propagandist. The speedy enactment of prohibition with its speedy repeal ought to remind us, whatever our viewpoint, how great and quick reaction can take place where people are influenced by high pressure propagandism without being fundamentally convince

The Bible as a whole undoubtedly commends total abstinence, though some passages are and have been of disputed bearing. History con-firms what the Bible has to say about the effect of strong drink

What should we do? Face the facts. Encourage frank and open Avoid censorious mise the truth. No habits that are sound, and no cause that is right, has anything to fear from the fullest investigation, inquiry and discussion.

"The job ahead of us is far bigger than most of us realize," Secretary Morgenthau declared in making the table public. "I know that the American people are ready to do their part to win the war. One of the ways we can do much more is by intensifying our effort in the purchase of Defense Bonds.'

While persons without dependents may be able to set aside more than the suggested figures, persons with several dependents, or with other heavy family obligations, may be unable to save at the suggested rate, the Treasury Department pointed out.



- An Examination of the above figures reveals the following facts: For the period from Jan. 1, 1937, to Jan. 1, 1942, the bonded indebtedness of Hall County was reduced. BY CASH PAYMENTS, by the sum of \$378,000.00.
- This reduction, in five years time, lacked only \$1,000.00 in being equal to all reductions for all the previous years of the existence of this indebtedness the great major portion of which was incurred in the years 1923 to 1929.
- Through securing State assumption of Hall County's proportionate share of State-wide assumption of this kind of county indebtedness, the State assumed, for the County, during this five year period an additional sum of \$589,000.00, making Hall County outstanding bonded indebtedness stand fixed at \$381,753.00, whereas at the beginning of this period it was \$1,691,000.00. This, in these interest bearing obligations, represents to the County a total reduction of \$1,309.

- The above reduction represents 78% of the indebtedness as of Jan. 1, 1937. The average interest rate being just above 51/2%, the annual saving in interest to Hall County taxpayers, as between Jan. 1, 1937, and Jan. 1, 1942, is approximately \$72,000.00.
- The above schedules do not, in any manner, take into consideration any cash balances belonging to these funds nor cash credits at Austin belonging to the same accounts.
- The above figures and resulting requirements may be somewhat disturbed through conditions brought about on account of the war but such contingencies are beyond the power of anyone to forecast or determine.
