O. B. Spradling, aged 67 died at his home here Sunday night after a long illness, Bright's disease being the immediate cause of his death.



HANDICRAFT FOR BOYS



A MODEL AEROPLANE.

This model aeroplane is built along the lines of the models that have won records for distance flights.

The triangular frame consists of the two pine side sticks A (Fig. 1), 1/4 inch square and 32 inches long, and two bamboo stick B and C, 1-16 inch thick and ¼ inch wide-B 8 inches long and C 41/4 inches long.

The bow end of sticks A must be tapered on the inside edges as shown in Fig. 2, so they will come together. and slots must be cut through these sticks for the ends of sticks B and C to stick through (Fig. 3). Cut the




slots for B 21/2 inches from the stern end, and the slots for C halfway be tween these and the bow end. Slip separators B and C into the slots, and ther | and Ranch. bind with strong linen thread.

Bow hooks D (Figs. 1 and 4) sup port the bow end of the rubber motor and are bent out of a piece of heavy piano wire. Bend the wire V-shaped to fit the bow ends of sticks A, and bind to the sticks with thread (Fig. 1)

The bow ends of sticks A must have metal bearing-plates similar to E (Fig 5) bound to them with thread. A pair of accurately made propellers

can be purchased at toy stores. The propeller shafts (G, Fig. 8) are

made of heavy plane wire. Bend one



end into a hook (Fig. 7) to receive the end of the rubber motors, then rur the other end through the hole in bear ing-plates E (Fig. 7), slip a glass bead (H) over it for a "thrust-bearing," and run it through the propeller hub and bend over the side of the hab (Fig. 8).

The motors are made of strands of rubber. Rubber bands can be looped in one another, end to end, to form the strands, but strands all in one plece are better. Twelve strands are needed for each motor. Fasten the



(Fig. 6), so they may be slipped on and off hooks D quickly.

With the motors in place, the "ele-(Figs. 1, 9 and 10) remain to be made. Elevator I is made of two wooden side strips 15 inches long, 1-16 inch thick, and 14 inch wide, connected with wire separators bent and joined to the strips in the manner shown in Fig. 11. The end wire tips should extend beyond the wooden strips 21/2 inches, and be bent to the angle shown. Cover the frame with china silk. Sew or glue this on to the frame, then give it thin coat of shellac.

The planes should not be fastened ecurely to the model aeroplane framework, but be held to it by rubber bands so their positions may be adjusted to the points where they will give the model the greatest stability in flight.

To Insure Land Titles.

The economic loss sustained in difficulties and legal uncertainties of land titles amounts to millions every year. When a man gets ready to sell or buy land his first difficulty is to secure a lawyer who knows land titles. The seller must then bear the expense of having an abstract of the title made which may or may not be accepted by the attorney of the buyer. Insurance of the title may be required which costs heavily. There may be many minor abundant grounds for litigation. Or the abstract may not show all the minor technicalities.

Why not establish the principles of the Torrens system of registering and insuring titles? . The Torrens system provides a sure title at a minimum of expense.

The Torrens system provides that the state give a certificate to the land owner when his title has been examined and his claim verified. This title is then registered in the owner's name. All that is necessary to transfer this title is to surrender the certificate and issue a new one to the buyer. No reexamination is needed, no attorney required.

There may be minor heirs or other claims valid in law. To protect the owner against these, an insurance fund is created. It has been found that one-tenth of one per cent of the valuation of the property is sufficient to take care of this insurance or one dollar on the one thousand dollars valuation of the property.

This prevents claimants from disturbing the title. They cannot even cloud the title. Those that have valid surance fund.

With the passage of a rural credit law there will be a greater demand for a change in our present expensive, tedious way of transferring land titles. Before loans can be secured under rural credit laws now pending one must have clear titles. The Torrens system is greatly needed to insure the titles to homes.-Farm

BIRD ENEMIES RODENT PESTS

Hawks and Owls Found to do More Good Than Harm to the Texas Farmer.

Many hawks and owls, whch any one is now at liberty to shoot, should be strictly protected because of their usefulness in preying on mice, grounsquirrels and pocket gophers, say specialists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture who have studied the problem of ridding Texas of these pests. By destroying harmful rodents, it is said, hawks do the farmer more than enough good to offset the loss in poultry caused by a few individual

of ground squirrels are doing considerable damage in Texas. Nearly tively as chicken hawks, feed upon these rodents, killing them in large In this work Swainson's hawk, a large, sluggish, slow-flying species, and the long-tailed, whiterumped marsh hawk are most efficient, but many ground squirrels are eaten also by the ferruginous roughleg, the red-tailed and Harris' hawk. Even the little sparrow hawk attacks the 13 striped ground squirrel, and the rough-legged hawk is sometimes known as the squirrel hawk because of the numbers of this pest which it


Prairie dogs are quicker in escaping from hawks than the ground squirrels. The ferruginous roughleg, however, secures considerable numbers.

The barn owl and the great horned owl find many victims among pocket gophers and these animals are often captured in daylight, by the red-tailed and Swainson's hawk, as they thrust dirt up from their underground runs. The great blue heron also kills numbers of the gophers, stunning them with one blow of its bill as they appear upon the surface.

Practically all hawks feed upon the various rats and mice common throughout Texas. The short-tailed meadow mice, in fact, furnish a large part of the food of the long and shorteared owls, the barn owls, and the marsh, Swainson's and the red-tailed hawks. House mice and gray rats also are eaten commonly by these birds and the cotton rat is the prey of the short-eared owl and red-tailed

In addition to the birds that prey upon the pests mentioned, there are many species which are beneficial in other ways. Thus, all of the 60 varieties known at present to feed upon the cotton boll weevil are found at some season in the State. Among these may be mentioned the painted bunting, the barn and cliff swallows. he orchard and Bullock's orioles, and the meadowlarks. A host of other bids do good in other ways and, with few exceptions, should be encouraged to make their home on range and ranch lands.

Farmers Are Losing Cattle From Eat. usband-The sign language.-Smart ing Acorns-Take Precautions to Keep Poisons Out.

It is dangerous to give molded or spoiled hay and other feeds to live stock, especially horses. Such feed is apt to cause sickness and even death. We have heard of instances where farmers have lost a number of valu able animals from this cause. Care should be exercised to see that all feed is in good condition. Hay put up when too damp may mold, corn and oats often harbor various kinds of fungous diseases that may be poisonous to stock, and corn silage when improperly stored may cause trouble. The food an animal eats has a marked influence upon its physical well-being. We are Informed that, in Wisconsin, farmers are losing cattle from eating acorns picked up in the pastures. Young cattle are particularly affected. Sheep and hogs can eat the acorns without bad effects, and milch cows seldom die from this cause, but young calves are poisoned and little can be done for them. It is the part of wisdom to take precautions to keep feeds known to be dangerous away from animals, and give them only that which is in good and sound condition.—Farmer's Guide

Flies Have Killed More People Than The World's Armies

CCORDING to an eminent author-A ity flies have been responsible for the death of more human beings than all the armies of the world. Flies are nature's champion spread-

ers of disease. If you were to examine a fly's legs through a sufficiently pow erful microscope you would see a good deal of decayed animal and vegetable matter and millions of ugly wriggling things, more repulsive looking than the worst nightmare monsters.

They are disease germs which the fly has picked up in the course of its travels. Diphtheria, enteric, typhoid and scarlet fever, influenza and many other diseases are doubtless resting on the legs of the fly. Every time be alights on your bead

he leaves a few germs. Presently be will crawl over your food and leave some more germs for you to eat. Perhaps he will drown himself in your milk jug. That will suit the germs, be cause they breed quicker in milk than in any other medium If you are in good health you may

not come to much harm.

It is to children that flies are most dangerous. Whenever there is an extra number of flies the infantile mortality always becomes abnormal.

One of the reasons why there is less infantile disease, comparatively speak ing, in the large towns than in the country is because there are fewer flies. The pigsties, cow sheds, stables, refuse beaps and fertilizer piles of the country breed 90 per cent of the

It is never too late to start. Keep your rooms clean, cool and dry. Keep all food in a cool, dark pantry, and place covers over it if necessary. See that the lids of your garbage cans are always on tight, and do not allow rubbish to collect in your garden.



BUYING ON TIME

It is our impression that a good many farmers—and other people too, no doubt—get their cash and their credit wrong end to. They are careful about making a purchase for cash, but rather less careful about making one on credit; they would hesitate somewhat longer about buying the new implement if they were going to plank down the money for it than if they were only going to sign a six-months note.

Of course it ought to be just the other way. A man can afford to take more chances with his cash than with his credit, He ought to be more wary about making a given purchase when he cannot pay for it, but must give a note, than if he had the money in the bank. If a man loses a hundred dollars in cash through an unprofitable purchase he has lost a hundred dollars, and that is the end of it. If he signs a note and cannot pay it he stands to lose finally not only the money but his credit too.

Obviously a man can afford to take chances in proportion to the width of his margin over and above necessities. If he makes questionable purchase on credit he is gambling below the margin. This will look pretty self-evident, we think, to anybody who studies it. THINK IT OVER.
