Car Stolen From Here Is Located

Deputy Sheriff John R. Turlington went to Vernon Wednesday of last week and brought the remains of the 1936-Model Ford V-8 Sedan belonging to Jess Rosenwasser to Memphis. The Rosenwasser automobile was stolen from the Thompson Brothers Warehouse here on the night of September 3, by two unidentified men who broke the lock off the warehouse front door and escaped with the automobile and several tractor and truck tires. The car had been stripped and abandoned about 15 miles west of Vernon last week when it was found. Almost all that was left of the car was the body and bumper, as the motor, the tires, the wheels, the radio, the radiator, and the battery had been stripped before the car was abandoned. Another step toward the assistance of Hall County and Northwest Texas farmers hard hit by the drouth has been announced with a reduction by the Texas Railroad Commission of freight rates for shipment of livestock feed into this section and shipment of cattle out. 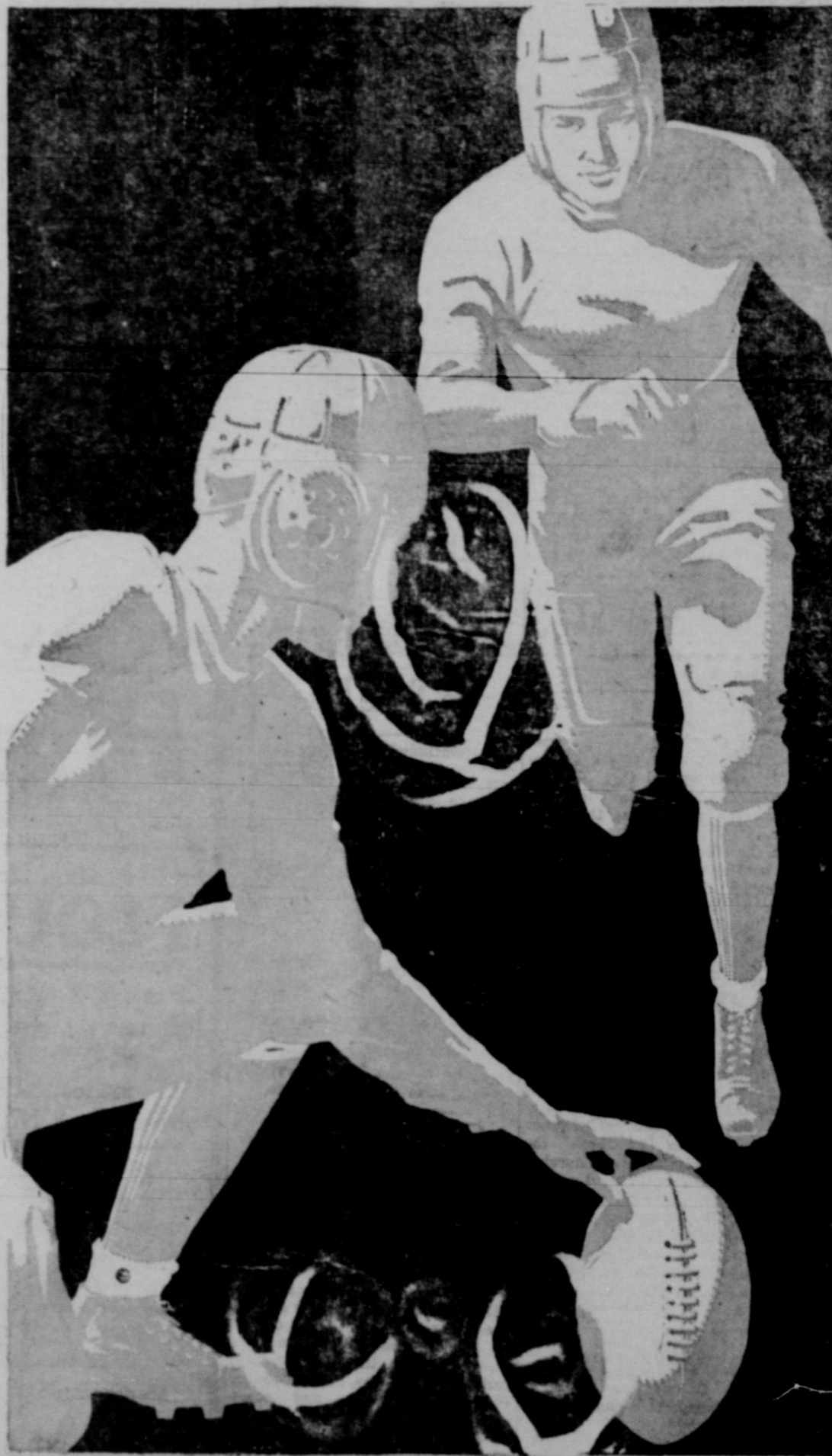
