FLOYD WORST OKLAHOMA BADMAN SINCE JENNINGS, DALTONS

Bu Associated Press OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 23.

-A bloody trail of murders. bank robberies and kidnapings was left throughout the Southwest during the last four years by Oklahoma's phantom bandit Charles Arthur (Pretty Boy)

The most notorious outlaw Oklahoma has known since the days of Al Jennings and the Dalton Brothers, the elusive Floyd sneered at frantic efforts of officers who charged him with a list of crimes staggering enought to awe the most fearsome bad man of the roaring

At least seven murders-six

of the victims officers - and more than a score of bank robberies and kidnapings have been laid at the door of the swaggerring desperado.

Hike Insurance Rate

For two years after he returned to Oklahoma in 1930 following an escape from Ohio police who wanted him for murder, Floyd and his tall lieutenant, George Birdwell, staged so many bank robberies and kidnapings that Oklahoma insurance rates became the highest in the nation.

Floyd and Birdwell repeatedly wriggled through the lines of the law to reach carefully hidden hideouts in the mountains of western Arkansas and eastern Oklahome orin the Seminole oil fields.

Activities Slowed Floyd's activities slowed, however, after Birdwell was killed

in an attempted bank robbery in the negro village of Boley. Okla., two years ago. Floyd did not take part in that foray. Throughout Eastern Oklaho-

ma and at Sallisaw where he was born, Floyd reputedly was known to some as "Robin Hood" who gave his loot to indigent hill people, who in turn, gave him shelter.

Driving a fast automobile, Floyd would drive up to the door of a bank. Leaving Bird-

well manning a machine gun in the car, he would compel bankers and customers to lie on the floor, obtain all cash in sight, kidnaping the banker, would flee. The banker would be re-

WOMEN TAKE STAND ON AMENDMENT

THE Texas Federation of Women's Clubs has taken a stand against the proposed amendment to the state constitution, to be voted on November 6, fixing the maximum amount of taxes which can be collected and expended, through its president, Mrs. Volney Taylor, who recently addressed club women of Memphis.

This stand added much strength to the opposition, already led by the state's school officials.

Mrs. Taylor attacked the amendment on the ground that it is a tax-shifting amendment rather than a tax-reducing measure, and insisted that its effect would be to reduce state taxes paid by large corporate interests and increase the burden on the small taxpayer.

Mrs. Taylor's statement also said that "the adoption of this amendment would inevitably mean the reduction or elimination of state aid to the rural and other public schools, making necessary the transfer of this load to the local communities.'
