It was the Bohemia, barely modernized, of Murger's novel, and the shifts to which these raw recruits in art de scended furnished Whistler for life with some of his raciest stories. Once when an American friend unearthed him Whistier was living on the proceeds of a wardrobe. One bot day he pawned his coat for an iced drink. Invited once to the American embassy, he had to borrow Poynter's dress suit. But the best story of these frolkesome days arises from the eternal copying in the Louvre, either on commission or on "spec." which kept them alive between remittances. Whistler's chum, Ernest Delannoy, had done a gorgeous replica of Veronese's "Marriage Feast at Cana" that took when framed the pair of them to carry it. 
