LOUSE SPREADS DISEASE

Insect Said to Be Responsible for Million Deaths ... Carry Typhus Germs

London, Jan. 2 .- Of the insects responsible for the death or disablement of hundreds of thousands in the war zone, the louse is declared authoratively to have been one of the most deadly and Job's friends and their debate, to have accounted for at least a million persons.

This disease spread over Russia, Austria, Germany and the Balkins generally.


