These hogs, which have an undivided hoof, similar to that of a mule, are a hardy and quite thrifty breed; 62 Organizing Boys' and Girls' but for general purposes they are easily surpassed by half-dozen or more standard breeds and have been bred pricipally because of their peculiar hoof; although the men who breed them often insist that they are best, particularly for range hogs because of their extreme hardiness, and freedom from the ordinary diseases afflicting high-grade hogs is often claimed for them.

Numerous well-authenticated instances of these hogs being afflicted with cholera makes it certain that they are not immune, though they may be somewhat less surceptable to ordinary disease than other hogs.



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
